#### Meeting Report - August 16th, 2023

This meeting was led by joint president Jason Terry who arrived just in the nick of time. Our guest speakers, Lana Waddingham and Tom Passe de Silva, were welcomed and their fathers. Jason then ran through some announcements – reminder of Carlingford Club's meeting on the Voice to Parliament; the club board meeting next week; the trivia night of the West Pennant Hills/Cherrybrook Club at which we have a table booked – those attending are Jim F, Pam & Peter H, Theo & Georgia G, Ida, David & Heather F, and Jason. The Social Night at the Monkey King Thai Restaurant on August 30 was discussed with Daisy the contact person for booking. It was also announced that the nominations for D9685 RYLA in January 2024 at now open and we are looking for suitable nominations to sponsor. Anoop indicated that he may have someone suitable.

Jason then ready an email he had received from one of his Rotaract colleagues promoting a dental project in the Sepik area of Papua New Guinea, with the main call being for volunteer dentists and dental assistants. This will be reviewed by the upcoming board meeting.

John Ellis, our Youth Chair, then introduced our speakers, first explaining that they had been enrolled for the usual Summer RYPEN in February. However, this was cancelled, so they had been offered places in the Winter RYPEN at Springwood which they both accepted.

Lana and Tom are both in year 10 at Pennant Hills High School. Lana spoke first, and explained that they had a maths test on the Friday morning so could not skip school and thus arrived at the camp at midday. As part of the introduction they were put into colour groups (she in red and Tom in green) with matching T shirts (see the

photo). Lana then went on to describe a few of the activities during the next 2 days of the camp. After describing each activity she reflected on what it had taught her either about herself and others, or about aspects of leadership and personal development. Perhaps her favourite activities were the Tower Building exercise using limited items where she realized the advantages of teamwork and encouraging all to be involved, and the Talent Quest which she felt brought everyone together and allowed you to laugh with each other, not at each other. Lana was impressed with the final activity on the Sunday with everyone invited to write something about the others at the camp and place them in an envelope for each participant. She then got to read the items that were placed in her envelope. She thanked the club for sponsoring her, saying "I learnt a lot about others and myself and I believe it has improved my leadership skills and my ability to communicate with others."

Tom, unlike Lana, spoke without notes. He explained that he had been very excited to be going to RYPEN with the expectation of learning about leadership skills. He felt that what he learned could be applicable with his part-time job as a crew leader at a McDonalds store. He then made a few observations on the camp. He felt it was an advantage not knowing anyone else attending. He thought the catering was 'amazing'. One of the activities at night was a trivia night which demonstrated the various interests of the other attendees. He also commented on the Tower Building exercise, his team building a tower 30cm tall but which ultimately was a failure! Another activity which he thought was a good exercise in leadership and trust was the Walk The Plank activity. He was quick to acknowledge that the green team, of which he was a member, won the dress-up before the Talent Quest 'wedding' in which he took a major role. He also expressed his appreciation to the club for sponsoring him to the

## An Update from Shelterbox. Sudan/Chad - Conflict

The escalating conflict in Sudan has led to nearly <u>3 million people</u> fleeing their homes. Of these, over <u>217,000 people</u> have travelled to Chad, adding to the pressure on the already limited resources in the country.

In April 2023, long-simmering tensions between Sudan's military and main paramilitary force erupted into violent clashes, risking civil war. Over **217,000 people** have fled to Chad from neighbouring Sudan, leaving their homes behind, and many are without adequate shelter. It includes people who were already internally displaced by previous conflicts in Sudan as well as refugees from other countries that had previously sought safety in Sudan. The majority of the refugees are women and children.

ShelterBox is working with local partner, INTERSOS on Project 1, aiming to support refugee and returnee families displaced by the conflict in Sudan with emergency shelter in the form of family tents and tarpaulins, rope and locally procured household items.
