AUSTRALIA DAY DINNER REPORT

MC Phil Stanton introduced President David Firth who welcomed our visitors and Dr Kristen Brindley in particular. President David called on Mayor Philip Ruddock to welcome us to country.

The Mayor outlined the relevance of Australia Day to citizenship ceremonies held in Hornsby. Becoming an Australian means accepting our rule of law and our system of government. These days 50% of Australians were born overseas or have a parent who was. The Mayor reminded us that we can be an example to the world.

Anoop Sud proposed a toast to Rotary and DG Christine Owen responded, stressing Rotary's inclusion and diversity. President David then presented five Centurion certificates to Club members and outlined to visitors our major Club projects and activities. As dinner was being served each table received the Australia Day quiz sheet of 20 questions.

Following dinner Phil Stanton introduced Dr Kristin Bindley OAM, our guest speaker, mentioning her connection with the Stanton family and her award of the OAM for services to palliative care. Dr Bindley opened her address on 'Matters of Life and Death' – a perspective from the coal face of palliative and bereavement care in Australia. She then displayed a Banksi artwork – 'the elephant in the room' - to emphasise poverty, hunger, grief and loss, something difficult for us to face. If we look that elephant in the eye we would be better served. Everyone will bring their own experience of loss and grief. Kristin can offer additional assistance if and when required. She displayed a photo of a memorial service at Mt Druitt Hospital where about 150 had gathered for a bereavement service. She has arranged such services over the past decade, usually five a year.

She commenced her working life as a lawyer then encountered a friend who died following bone marrow transplant. She then encountered a counselor at Uni whose support was critical to Kristin. As her mother had been diagnosed with multiple sclerosis, Kristin felt she could assist others and then sought to establish what sort of relevant support was available in Sydney. Her photo of Daly Saunders led on to the work Daly had done in introducing palliative care to improve quality of life in a person's last days. Palliative care, Kristen explained, was not entirely for the patient but also the immediate family. Daly saw the delivery of care to a family and patient should include spiritual and social components. Kristin went on to cover her own research into the meaning of palliative care and saw the importance of the co-ordination of grief and bereavement care with appropriate services. Such care can be delivered, not just in the hospital, but at home. As she let people know of her research she centred her work on western Sydney, the arc from Auburn to Blacktown where there is a high level of social disadvantage. She gave examples of people she had sought to assist. One was a young man with angry outbursts following the loss of his father. Another was a single mother of Lebanese background with five children, one of whom had become her carer. Many of those she worked with in her research were people of low income and resources, those dependent upon Government services. Many had rental and employment problems. Across our Australian landscape we do have a high level of palliative care. She then estimated that the need for such care will double by 2050. How can we respond? We can raise awareness and support local campaigns and importantly, we can volunteer. We can reflect on our own loss and grief elephants in our room. Dr Bindley closed by reminding us that if we can face the fact that death faces everyone, then we can be better prepared. Theo Glockemann then thanked Kristin for her address.

President David called on three earlier Australia Day awardees who then presented Dr Bindley with her Australia Day Merit Award. John Ellis was then able to run through the quiz and found that Table 1, ably assisted with high priced help, were the winners. Dr Bindley then drew tickets for our raffle that raised \$300 and the meeting closed with a good rendition of the National Anthem.
