Report of the Meeting held on 26th September, 2016

PP Ian Chappel sat in for Pam as president, as Pam was not in attendance. The first topic of the night was Pat Parker outlining the times for the upcoming Christmas Trailer Raffle followed by Ian discussing the Hat Day at Bunnings for Australian Rotary Health on October 7th. The research projects started with Sudden Infant Death research but has since moved on to include Mental Health as well as veterans suffering from PTSD.

Terry was in his element once again fining people for things that should have been celebrated such as their birthdays, anniversaries or just going on holidays. He expanded his range to John for not assisting with his knowledge of Geography at a recent quiz as well as for not wanting to be president on the night.

David Firth introduced Robyn Waite who is the daughter of Past President Peter. She has a background in community affairs, school teaching and assisting the church with children. She is now the Deputy Chair and Community Engagement Officer of the Castle Hill Domestic Violence Prevention centre.

She started her review with a tale of various women who suffered from a wide range of domestic violence types. She spoke of a year 12 girl being refused permission to her formal in an attempt to isolate her from her friends; a lady who, after 25 years of marriage, found herself on her own after being under full control by her partner where she was subjected to a weekly weigh in to see if she would be eligible for her weekly house-keeping money. If she gained weight it was withheld from her as well as the family. She

spoke of a woman who was berated in front of friends for taking a second newsletter at church when her husband already had one. Robyn used these examples to show there is quite a range of domestic violence in an attempt by someone to influence power and control over someone else. The result of this psychological abuse can be as serious as any physical abuse as it can result in the inability of the person to use proper logic and reasoning when trying to live a normal life as they have had no experience or confidence in performing the task. She outlined that there are currently 46,000 women impacted by domestic violence and of those 29,000 women are homeless. But there are up to 1 million children impacted by some level of domestic violence. Up to 75% of the homeless are a result of some kind of domestic violence. There have been 49 women killed so far this year as a result of Domestic Violence and there were 80 last year. The most dangerous time for women is the time when they have made up their mind to move on and they are preparing to leave. Many just stay or if they do leave, they tend to return believing things will change. There are a number of government shelters but all are overcrowded. The Castle Hill centre provides shelter for up to 6 women and funding is in place for the next 3 years provided by QIC a specialised investment firm which owns Castle Towers Shopping Centre. Within the shelter there is also specialised support for children. The centre is well secured and the address is not published so con-

tact is made via Castle Hill Police. The women can stay for up to 3 months and while there, are assisted with medical, dental, legal and financial support services. The focus is on providing the full package where they have a safe place and someone on their side to provide advice on the basic skills so they and their children can start the transition into a normal day to day life and gain control of their own situation something many women have been isolated from for a long time. 11 women have been successful in moving on from the centre. The local community as well as Police have been extremely supportive with a wide range of donations delivered to the Castle Hill Police Station for use at the centre. Robyn had been approached by some of our Rotary members seeking ways they could be of assistance. At the end of the presentation, Robyn answered a number of questions from members on the operation and outcomes.

David thanked Robyn for her presentation and responding to the questions asked. PP Ian, as acting president, closed the meeting with the National Anthem.
