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Fellows, earlier this week I received the following email from Claire Geary who was a GSE awardee from our club to Turkey a number of years ago. I see her from time to time and thought you might be interested in what a past awardee of ours is doing in and for the community.



Hi Friends, Colleagues and Family,

Later this month I will be spending a week in a remote Aboriginal Community as a volunteer in the National Aboriginal Sporting Chance Academy (<u>NASCA</u>) ARMTour program. ARM stands for 'Athletes and Role Models' (it probably should be fairly evident that I am not the athlete part of that!).

NASCA works with young Aboriginal and Torres Strait islander people to build their confidence and encourage them to take opportunities to fulfil their potential. The programs target school attendance and school performance, developing career pathways and work-ready skills, strengthening cultural pride, and building life skills, personal development and long-term, resilience.

Partnering with six remote Northern Territory Schools, ARMTour is delivered largely by volunteers, for a week, three times per year in each community. The team provides in-class support as well as before, during and after-school sport, health, mentoring, and personal development activities. The program aims to increase school attendance/retention, improve student's attitudes towards school, promote positive learning experiences and improve teamwork, communication and leadership.

I have been posted to Yuelamu, which is community of around 190 people located around 300km north-west of Alice Springs, and during my week of service I will be drawing on my skills and experiences in sport (soccer and general), Scouting, music and youth work to inspire, motivate and hopefully also delight!

I am not required to pay for my travel or participation. However I have undertaken to assist the great work of NASCA by pledging to raise \$1,000 in sponsorship to enable NASCA to continue to fund empowerment programs for Aboriginal young people, their schools and their communities.



Report of the Meeting held on 10th October, 2016

The Corporal, Jim Fraser, introduced President Pam in his role as replacement for our oceangoing Sergeant Terry who is once again sailing the seven seas with Mermaid Maureen! After welcoming our Guest Speaker, David Gordon, Pam welcomed back Timor veteran Theo who gave a run down on recent events in our neighbour to the north west. These included the wedding of Amina and Eddie - an extravaganza involving 600 guests; a buffalo and several pigs provided by Amina's dad, with the guests cooking these beforehand and bringing them to the wedding ready to eat. (Sounds like a good way to cut down on the cost of weddings!) Theo also reported on the RYLA that was then conducted - "the best ever with 10 facilitators". This was followed by a week of 'seminars' focussed on different projects being run in East Timor, including the greatly appreciated and necessary 'Days for Girls'. Theo commented on the effect Rotary is making in East Timor where there are now 5 Rotaract clubs and a newly chartered second Rotary Club made up of mainly alumni from the RYLA programme there. There is a need for training of these young people in Project Management - a need which is now being addressed. The Barker College contingent of 11 students and 2 teachers arrived and then spent some time in an outlying village so that they could experience life in a third world community. This was not their only experience of East Timor, as they also saw some of the sights around Dili and also participated in a RYPEN programme. All of this had a very profound effect on these students and further visits from Barker students is assured.

Pam gave a brief account of her attending the Thornleigh club's meeting with some expectation that some of their members may assist us with our Trailer Raffle. Yours truly gave a report on our Hat Day collection at Bunnings at Thornleigh where \$120 was raised; plans for the start of the Trailer Raffle on the following Saturday at Pennant Hills Marketplace, with detailed directions as to the venue being necessary for Claude who had forgotten where he went last year; lastly, a letter was read from a member of Kew Rotary Club in Melbourne who thanked us for the Pride of Workmanship materials supplied at the instigation of their very good friend, Jack Reid.

In a departure from past practice, Pam invited Chairman Adrian to introduce our Guest Speaker, David Gordon, leaving Corporal Jim to keep his fine session to the end. David came representing TAD NSW Disability Services - TAD standing for Technical Aid for the Disabled - and asserted that "TAD are the people who make the impossible possible. They make special things for special people." The organisation began back in 1975 when a group of mainly retired engineers set out to make devices and modify items to make the lives of disabled people of all ages more fulfilling. As an example, David said that 10 years ago they made bikes for disabled kids. Now this process is called Freedom Wheels and provides normalcy for disabled kids, allowing them to join the rest of the family in outdoor activities.

Solutions are custom designed and made usually for each client with some becoming standard designs for others with similar disabilities. Modification of working environments and equipment for disabled workers is also part of the service. This is aimed at making the jobs easier and the worker more productive. Similarly, sporting equipment is modified including wheelchairs.

Currently the volunteer organisation is funded by both state and federal government grants, however David understands that that will change next year with the implementation of the NDIS. TAD will need to change how they deal with clients who cannot afford to pay for their devices. There are about 100 volunteers but this is declining. David suggested we could help by donation and by identifying anyone in need of TAD's services.

David was appropriately thanked for his talk. Corporal Jim got his chance to fleece us all and Pam closed the meeting in the usual way.
