Was their symbol of freedom and light.


It don't mean we owe our allegiance

2017-18 RI President Ian H.S. Riseley announces his presidential theme, 'Rotary: Making a Difference'

Rotary International President-elect Ian H.S. Riseley made the case on Monday that protecting the environment and curbing climate change are essential to Rotary's goal of sustainable service.

Riseley, a member of the Rotary Club of Sandringham, Victoria, Australia, unveiled the 2017-18 presidential theme, *Rotary: Making a Difference*, to incoming district governors at Rotary's International Assembly in San Diego, California, USA.



Environmental degradation and global climate change are serious

threats to everyone, Riseley said. "They are having a disproportionate impact on those who are most vulnerable, those to whom Rotary has the greatest responsibility. Yet environmental issues rarely register on the Rotary agenda," he said.

"Environmental degradation is one of the major threats listed by the UN's High-level Panel on Threats, Challenges, and Change.

Riseley added, "The time is long past when environmental sustainability can be dismissed as not Rotary's concern. It is, and must be, everyone's concern."

The president-elect challenged every Rotary club to make a difference by planting a tree for each of its members between the start of the Rotary year on 1 July and Earth Day on 22 April 2018. Trees remove carbon dioxide and other greenhouse gases from the air, which slows global warming.

"It is my hope that the result of that effort will be far greater than the environmental benefit that those 1.2 million new trees will bring," Riseley said. "I believe the greater result will be a Rotary that recognizes our responsibility not only to the people on our planet, but to the planet itself."

Report on the club Meeting on 16th January, 2017

President Pam opened the meeting at 7 pm. The theme of the meeting was planning for Australia Day Merit Award.

Youth Report

John Ellis provided a summary of Youth activities involving the Rotary Youth Leadership Awards (RYLA), National Youth Science Forum (NYSF) and the Young Endeavour sailors. Our club sponsored two young people for RYLA training, 1 male (manager of an IGA store) and one female (a soprano singer from Slovakia). The training completed recently and the two candidates will be invited to a club meeting to share their experiences.

Two young males have been sponsored for the NYSF conducted in Canberra. (Since 1984, Rotary Clubs have selected 10,000 young people for the NYSF).

John Ellis also advised that the Young Endeavour candidate sponsored by our club is sailing from Adelaide to Stanley in Tasmania as a crew member.

Community Report

Theo Glockemann reported on the opening of the new Ray White office in the Pennant Hills shopping village (This was the old National Australia Bank office). The principal of the Ray White Office wanted to contribute something to Rotary and be part of the opening of their new office. Ray White provided a sausage sizzle for all interested visitors who were then asked to provide a gold coin donation which was given to our club (\$160.00 was collected). Dion the Ray White principal, was happy for our club to use this event as a recruitment forum for our club. Two new prospective members are expected to be guests at our Australia Day Merit Award meeting next week. In the Pennant Hills Village, Ray White staff were handing out balloons inviting shoppers to the opening of the Ray White Office for a BBQed sausage.

Dion expects that the opening of the new office will be reported in the local paper. Dion has existing offices in Thornleigh and West Pennant Hills.

Pam was advised that Ray White has chosen Rotary as their charity of choice. Ian Huckel had met Dion a few weeks before the opening of the new Ray White Office and was advised of the intent to involve the local Rotary Club on opening day.

Pam has proposed that four times a year the RC of Pennant Hills conduct a sausage sizzle at the Pennant Hills Village to raise our profile in the local community and to recruit new members. Pam expects to work closely with the Ray White PR person for this to happen. Pam hopes that Ray White may be interested in other club projects, possibly becoming sponsors and/or volunteers for the Golf Day.

For the Australia Day Merit Awards meeting Pam has asked everyone to act as ambassadors for the club, making everyone welcome especially the potential new members and guests.

Theo said it would cost around \$3000.00 per person to go to Timor and stay for 2 weeks.


The Rotary meeting was concluded at 8:25 pm and the Australia Day Merit Award sub-committee re-convened to finalise planning.
