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

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

INTERNATIONAL TOAST

<u>Rotary Club of East Greenwich Rhode Island</u> - Chartered in 1963. They meet on Wednesdays at 12.15pm at the New England Institute of Technology.



Tonight we toast President Paul Muffoletto and their 49 members.

East Greenwich is an affluent town and the county seat of Kent County, Rhode Island, United States. The population was 13,146 at the 2010 census. East Greenwich is the wealthiest municipality within the state of Rhode Island.

Formed as Greenwich in 1677, it was named for Greenwich, England. It was renamed Dedford in 1686 but reverted to its original name in 1689. In 1741 the more rural western three-quarters of the town was set off as West Greenwich, the remaining quarter of it thenceforth being called East Greenwich. Until 1854, it was one of the five state capitals for Rhode Island. The General Assembly, when meeting in East Greenwich, used the local courthouse, which is today the town hall. East Greenwich Village is located in the northeastern part of the town and extends north about 1.5 km into the town of Warwick, Rhode Island. The town is now known for its waterfront and downtown business district. 20 percent of the land in East Greenwich consists of undeveloped woods and farmland, although development continues to bring this proportion down.

The Rotary Club of East Greenwich has many projects but one they have conducted for 24 years is their **Annual East Greenwich Rotary Club Citrus Drive**, where they sell 'cases of just-picked-from-the-tree Florida oranges and grapefruit, and delicious D'Anjou pears.' They also make up gift baskets. They take orders in advance so that they only obtain enough produce to meet orders.

World's Greatest Meal generates \$7 million to fight polio

When Susanne Rea became polio chair of Rotary District 9550 in Queensland, Australia, she was living a quiet retirement of reading books and gardening.

But as she brainstormed ways to engage her fellow Rotarians in the campaign to end polio, she had an idea, and her life changed completely.

In 2014, Rea founded **World's Greatest Meal**, a program in which Rotarians host meals, anything from two people having lunch to elaborate gourmet dinners, and ask for donations. WGM started small but has grown enormously, and, with matching funds from the **Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation**, WGM has raised over \$7 million to date. To keep the momentum alive, Rea reverse-mortgaged her house and embarked on a world tour, speaking, vaccinating, and motivating across 32 countries.

She pays her own way, and local Rotary members host her whenever possible. "We raise awareness as well as funds," she says. "I spend a lot of time explaining what goes on in Pakistan with the training of the polio workers."

Rea is a childhood polio survivor herself, but she doesn't focus on that. Instead, her motivation is to make an impact during her retirement.

Some meals bring in a lot of money, but Rea says the number of participants is more important.

"A big donation is wonderful," she says. "But my idea is that it's giving back polio eradication to the ordinary Rotarian, or grassroots Rotarian as I like to call them, because no Rotarian is ordinary."
