

John Hewko is the general secretary of Rotary International and The Rotary Foundation. From 2004 to 2009, John Hewko was vice president for operations and compact development for the Millennium Challenge Corporation (MCC), a U.S. government agency established in 2004 to deliver foreign assistance to the world's poorest countries. At MCC, he was the principal United States negotiator for foreign assistance agreements to 26 countries in Africa, Asia, South America, the Middle East, and the former Soviet Union. During his tenure, he completed the negotiation of assistance agreements totalling \$6.3 billion to 18 countries for infrastructure, agriculture, water and sanitation, health, and education projects.

John Hewko has been a public policy scholar at the Woodrow Wilson International Centre for Scholars, an adjunct professor of law at Georgetown University, and a visiting scholar at the Carnegie Endowment for International Peace.

He has published papers and articles in leading U.S. and international publications, and he has spoken extensively on political and business issues dealing with the former Soviet Union, Central Europe, Africa, and Latin America. He is also a member of the Council of Foreign Relations.

Rotary Meeting - Monday 4th September, 2017


With our president on overseas assignment this week, Immediate Past President Pam Hudson was in the chair, and Phil Stanton had stepped aside for Pat Parker to be chairman. Our guest speaker, Professor Cres Eastman, was warmly welcomed.

There were a series of announcements -

Theo Glockemann talked about the upcoming RYLA and RYPEN in Timor and the problem he is grappling with concerning the timing of the sponsorship money from Woodside Petroleum. It was good to hear that he had been able to secure a fallback position with Rotary Districts 9685 and 9550 pledging support;

Pat Parker updated progress with Christmas Trailer Raffle selling locations; Ian Chappel suggested that, as a club, we should support 'Lift the Lid on Mental Illness', the ARF's Hat Day promotion this year;

The excellent dinner menu obviously refuelled our sergeant as he then embarked on a wide ranging fine session with no-one left untouched. After all, he will now be away for several






Following the tea/coffee break, Pat introduced our guest speaker, highlighting some of his many achievements. Cres was able to recall his previous talk to our club for Australia Day 2007 when he received his Australia Day Merit Award. He had an excellent power point presentation entitled 'Protecting the Intelligence of Children' by avoiding or correcting iodine deficiency. He illustrated the problem in Australia by referring to several newspaper headline stories including the SMH on December 4, 2000 "We Are Failing Our Children", a story about Australian children doing

worse than those in Kazakhstan. Cres believes that environmental iodine deficiency during pregnancy and infancy – the first 1000 days – is the major cause of reduced child performance. Indeed, his research has suggested a connection between maternal iodine deficiency and autism and also ADHD.

Cres then gave a rundown of his work in China commencing in the early 1980's. China, at that time, had a problem with cretinism and an estimated 25% of the population suffering with goitre. His was the first Australian Aid project in China following his involvement with Bob Hawke's 1985 trip to China. Cres came up with a plan for the government to require all salt to be iodised. By 1998, 90% of all salt used in China was iodised.

In Tibet in 1998, iodine deficiency was very prevalent – more severe than anywhere else in the world. Up to 13% of the population were cretins. China were indifferent to the problem there. Cres's team came up with a different answer to the problem – iodised oil supplementation with capsules for all women of child bearing age and children up to 2 years old. The capsules were effective for up to 12 months, so the supplement was repeated 1 year later. Of particular interest was that they got 95% coverage by joining with the Rotary PolioPlus program with children receiving the polio vaccine drops and then the iodised oil drops. 30,000 babies are born in Tibet each year and, since 2005, no new cretins have been identified.

Australia presented a problem in 1990's with IDD identified as returning. Iodine was being delivered through the milk supply and a limited consumption of iodised salt. The milk supply had iodine added through the sanitization materials used on all equipment. However, changes to the sanitizers and practises cut this out as a supply of iodine. With almost 50% of children identified as having inadequate iodine levels, the governments around the country decided on a course of action. In 2008, all states legislated that all bread (except organic bread) had to be produced using iodised salt. This has certainly helped, however the worry is with pregnant women who need to up their intake to supply their baby as well as themselves. Cres believes they should be taking a supplement of 250ug daily right from conception. New Zealand had a similar problem and took the same legislative action. Following a series of questions, Pat invited members to thank Cres in the usual way. Pam closed the meeting, reminding all that next week would be a combined zone meeting – same time and place – with RI General Secretary, John Hewko, the keynote speaker.
