When Rotary President Arch Klumph made his suggestion in 1917 that Rotary create an endowment fund "for the purpose of doing good in the world," chances are few people in the Atlanta convention hall remembered his words.

Fortunately, his idea did catch the attention of the Rotary Club of Kansas City, Missouri, USA, which donated \$26.50 to "be deposited to the Endowment Fund suggested by President Klumph." That small contribution — about \$536 in today's dollars — did not inspire an influx of others, but it helped to establish an endowment fund. It also set Arch Klumph off on a lifelong mission to build a powerful force for good that officially became The Rotary Foundation in 1928.

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#### Rotary Meeting – Monday 20th November, 2017

Hmmm. An interesting evening tonight.

We had Phil's neighbour along for a 2<sup>nd</sup> visit - thanks for coming along again Ahmadul .

We also had a couple of chappies from the Beecroft along for the ride. What's going on there? They spies or something? Or did they get left off the bus when they weren't looking and the rest of their club nicked-off without them. David & Lionel, no matter, you're welcome here fellas. Clavdivs (that's the correct Roman spelling of Claudius) made a spectacle of himself again. This time, he eschewed the late & dramatic entry in favour of a new approach – the On Time one. Heavens to Betsy. However, he then reverted to type, and skived off to the bar for the next 20 minutes.

A relatively quiet night on the directors and activities reporting front. Then Theodore did his usual, and fleeced all and sundry.

Tonight, Commander John was giving us a brief on the 2<sup>nd</sup> Voyage of the Beagle, the one with Charley Darwin on board.

A background on Charley first – he was one wealthy dude. His mum was one of the Wedgewood family and his dad was doing OK too – he was a doctor & a financier. Charley was the 5<sup>th</sup> of 6 kids and a bit of a naughty young chap. After failing in his adventure to Edinburgh University (to be a doctor), he did a BA at Christ College Cambridge. There, he became interested in natural science. His mentor John Stevens Henslow received an offer from Commander Robert FitzRoy of travelling on a survey ship, HMS Beagle, as a "scientific person" or naturalist. Henslow passed this on to Darwin.

Henslow described the position "more as a companion than a mere collector", but this was an assurance that FitzRoy would treat his guest as a gentleman naturalist.

FitzRoy himself wasn't short of a quid either, being born in Suffolk into the aristocracy in July 1805.

Important to know – the Admiralty was paying for the voyage and the professional crew. Charley was paying for himself. Lucky he was a wealthy young buck.

While the expedition was originally planned to last two years, it lasted almost five.

The main purpose of the expedition was to conduct a hydrographic survey of the coasts of the southern part of South America. This was a continuation and correction of the work of previous surveys, in order to produce accurate nautical charts showing navigational and sea depth information for the navy and for commerce.

Interesting to note, that the accurate marine chronometers needed to determine longitude had only become affordable since 1800;

the Beagle carried <u>22</u> such chronometers to allow corrections (22! all in FitzRoys cabin – so wouldn't that have been a noisy place to relax and sleep!). FitzRoy also engaged a mathematical instrument maker to maintain them. The ship was to stop at specified points for four-day rating of the chronometers and to check them by astronomical observations.

Darwin himself spent most of this time exploring on land: three years and three months on land, 18 months at sea. Early in the voyage he decided that he could write a book about geology, and he showed a gift for theorising.

At Punta Alta he made a major find of gigantic fossils of extinct mammals, then known from only a very few specimens. He ably collected and made detailed observations of plants and animals, with results that shook his belief that species were fixed and provided the basis for ideas which came to him when back in England, and led to his theory of evolution by natural selection. And we all know where that led.

Vice Admiral Robert FitzRoy, 2<sup>nd</sup> Governor of New Zealand, died by his own hand 30 April 1865 aged 59.

Charley popped his clogs on 19 April 1882, aged 73, and was buried in Westminster Abbey.

Good on you Commander, once again you have sought & succeeded in educating our pitiful members.

Guess what, Pres Alex won't be about next week. So we all know who will be driving the ship then! See ya.
