Rotary Meeting – Monday 27th November, 2017

So where was our president? Fortunately PP Adrian sprang to our rescue to take up the presidential role for the evening. Was this a little bit of promotion on his part with the AGM and **Elections** looming? What ever, he did a great job while Alex relaxed in Malaysia - perhaps he is just trying to maximise his frequent flyer points!

There were a number of announcements. John Ellis, with his Youth cap on, advised that we have accepted a referral from district of a young lady from Hornsby who has applied to go to RYLA in 2018. He then announced that he had been successful in attracting two nominations (a girl and a boy) from Pennant Hills High School for RYPEN in the new year. And then he related an email he had received from Pennant Hills High School inviting him to represent the club at the school speech day on Tuesday 5th December and seeking agreement for the club to present 6 leadership awards this time - previously there had been 4. After discussion, it was agreed to make the 6 awards but to also seek the school's support for the club's activities and its membership drive.

Theo Glockemann sought support for a sausage sizzle at Bunnings Artarmon raising money for our Timor Leste RAWCS project. This was organised by Angelo Raveane of the Crows Nest club who has been a leading light in the project for many years.

The sergeant leaped to his feet following the main course, almost before our acting president could finish announcing him. He showed no mercy for those of British birth re the cricket; our rugby stalwarts over the Scotland test debacle; then followed the usual contrived fines for all and sundry. Cross fines managed to partly redress the imbalance with the sergeant fined for failing to take his place at the head table next to the president.

Adrian then invited Ian Chappel to talk about the Rotary Foundation, the appropriateness of this being that November is The Foundation month in Rotary and this year marks the 100th anniversary of the Foundation. Ian commenced by relating how Arch Klumph proposed the idea of an endowment fund at the 1917 Rotary Convention, the idea taking root with a donation of \$26.50 from the Rotary Club of Kansas City. Continuing on, Ian talked about the operation of what became the very familiar Rotary Foundation.

The Foundation Mission Statement reads: "The Mission of The Rotary Foundation is to enable Rotarians to advance world understanding, goodwill, and peace through the improvement of health, the support of education, and the alleviation of poverty."

The Foundation is a not-for-profit corporation supported solely by voluntary contributions from Rotary members and friends of the Foundation who share its vision of a better world. This support is essential to make possible projects, funded with Foundation grants, that bring sustainable improvement to communities in need.

The Foundation has identified specific causes to target to maximize local and global impact. Through global grants they help clubs focus their service efforts in the following areas:

Peace and conflict prevention/resolution

Disease prevention and treatment

Water and sanitation

Maternal and child health

Basic education and literacy

Economic and community development

Global grants support large international activities with sustainable, measurable outcomes in Rotary's areas of focus. A key feature of global grants is partnership, between the district or club where the activity is carried out and a district or club in another country. Both sponsors must be qualified before they can submit an application. The minimum budget for a global grant activity is \$30,000.

District grants fund small-scale, short-term activities that address needs in your community and communities abroad. Each district chooses which activities it will fund with these grants. You can use district grants to fund a variety of district and club projects and activities.

Ian was thanked for his very informative talk and the meeting concluded in the normal way.
