John F. Germ is board chair and chief executive officer of Campbell and Associates Inc., consulting engineers. He

joined the firm as an engineer in 1965 after four years in the U.S. Air Force. He serves on the boards of several organizations, including the board and executive committee of the Public Education Foundation, Orange Grove Center Inc., and as board chair of Blood Assurance Inc. He also is founder and treasurer of the Chattanooga State Technical Community College Foundation and president of the Tennessee Jaycee Foundation.

He was Tennessee Young Man of the Year in 1970; Engineer of the Year, 1986; Volunteer Fundraiser of the Year, 1992; and Tennessee Community Organizations Volunteer of the Year, 2009. He is a recipient of the Boy Scouts Silver Beaver Award and the Arthritis Foundation Circle of Hope Award. In 2013, the White House recognized him as a Champion of Change.

John joined Rotary in 1976 and has served Rotary as vice president, director, Foundation trustee and vice chair, aide to the Foundation trustee chair, chair of Rotary's US\$200 Million Challenge, RI Board Executive Committee member, RI president's aide, Council on Legislation representative and chair, membership zone coordinator, chair of numerous committees, area coordinator, RI training leader, and district governor.

Club Meeting Monday 26 February 2018

The meeting was opened by President Alex who asked for reports. First was Adrian to remind everyone of the Big Day out on Sunday. All to meet at 10:30 at Observatory Park. Cost is \$20 per head for lunch and beverages; Adrian needs a list of attendees by Wednesday. Dinner was then served and the guests welcomed.

Director's reports: Pat Parker outlined the youth driver awareness program on Friday the 9th of March at 8:30. He is looking for some assistance from members at the St Ives centre. The session will provide Pennant Hills High school students with some awareness of issues they may encounter when driving a car and great tips on how to be better prepared.

Ian Chappel talked about the fund raiser planned to sponsor Mary Stoddart in her attempt to swim the English Channel. Ian was not sure if she had qualified during a preliminary race in Perth and was waiting on an update as there had been some issues with sharks in the area of the swim and some participants were pulled from the water. Ian also outlined that he is speaking at the Linfield Rotary club as an ambassador of Australian Rotary Health. Lindfield may be arranging a dual club meeting which will expand Ian's audience.

Theo outlined the upcoming events in East Timor which has been running for 10 years. The visit is planned for September this year for both RYLA and 2 RYPEN's. Barker College is once again attending but their program will be at the end of September. They can now run the RYPEN program themselves.

It was then the Sergeants session where Theo posed some interesting questions around the number of heartbeats that occur; how much longer a left handed person lives compared to a right handed one; the definition of the amount of calories in body fat; and whether there are more snakes or bees. He did a fine job of extracting as much money as possible. It was then time for our two speakers to talk about the recent National Youth Science Forums they attended after being sponsored by Pennant Hills Rotary. Anish Malish (Normanhurst Boys) and Tom Harris (Pennant Hills High) were the two speakers and were introduced by John Ellis who outlined the program. It has been running for 35 years and how the two speakers were chosen to take part.

Anish was the first speaker who outlined that his session took place in Brisbane at the University of Queensland campus there. Anish has an interest in tennis and squash and stayed on campus for the full event. There were a number of other participants who took part and while there, they had an opportunity to go on Lab and Science visits. Forensic science was a favourite where they were tasked with using a spectrum microscope. They had a chance to look at cells and use dies to interpret fingerprints to identify target cells. There were discussions on how various animals ended up in Australia and genetics about how changes to genes can lead to a cure. The trip ended up with a Science Dinner where they could interact with other students. Anish enjoyed the social activities where they engaged in swing dancing and dressed up in the PH table to attend a disco. There was a career expo where they could ask questions of companies about what roles might be available as well as networking opportunities for future job prospecting. Anish found the 12 days life changing and has developed a keen interest in medical research and using science to make the world a better place.

Tom Harris went to the Australian National University in Canberra where there was a number of students from all over Australia who had a love of science. This group had a focus on engineering and enhanced manufacturing. There was a number of lab visits to get a better understanding of broader sciences with talks on Stem Plus and creating a link between art and science for the dating and displaying of art. They visited a number of sites in Canberra including the Mt Stromlo telescope. The discussions outlined how science can solve problems. The discussions were highly engaging and how niche scientific research projects that can have a major impact. Tom was hosted by a family over a weekend with a large family of 6 or 7 kids but still had some time to relax. Tom said he was very lucky to have had the opportunity to take part in the program and looks forward to the options available for a career in science.

John opened up for questions and Anish said that science is a big focus at Normanhurst School with 30-40 students out of the 120 year 12 class involved in science classes. Tom said there were 3 NYSF sessions running this year and there were students from Germany, UK, Singapore and Hong Kong taking part. Pat commented on what great examples the two speakers were, and why the program should continue to be supported by the club.

The meeting was closed at 8:35 with a reminder that it is a joint meeting with Beecroft next week and there will be up to 53 extra guests to hear the speaker so a full house is anticipated.
