
St Lucy's School Master Plan

The Master Plan was revealed at a special presentation to parents of students, various supporters and St Lucy's staff and board members last Thursday evening. We were represented by John Ellis and David & Heather Firth. The chairperson of the board, Ms Kathleen Guerin, gave an overview of the plan, followed by a more detailed presentation by the principal, David Raphael.

The essence of the new Master Plan is that the school is moving forward to provide education for Kindergarten to Year 12 students instead of the current K to Year 6. The announcement was greeted very enthusiastically, particularly by the parents present. They are no longer faced with the difficult task of finding a secondary school placement for their disabled children.

Of particular interest to us was the knowledge that Stanton Dahl are the architects who have developed the building plan which will see students accepted into Year 7 in 2019, and the completion of the project by 2024 by which time there will be 240 students enrolled across all classes. No doubt there will be new opportunities for us to contribute!

MEETING REPORT - 26th MARCH

This meeting was held in the common room of Lutanda Village whilst the Golf Club renovations precluded our presence there. The meeting was opened by PP Theo Glockemann who lives just along the way and introduced President Alex Thomas. Our President welcomed our guests, David Boyce from the Rotary Club of Dili and two Lutanda residents, Lesley and Steve Jackson. This grand opening was delayed a little as the steaks and snags were proving a challenge to our cook, Adrian Bell, who claimed prior experience to his task. The menu was planned and presented by Georgia Glockemann. Club notices followed and Pat Parker covered the invitation from St Lucy's School to attend the school on Thursday 5 April at 6 pm when the school's Master Plan for development will be presented. An email on this invitation has also gone out. We have been scheduled to assist at the new Ronald MacDonald House on 13 June. To date details of this venture have yet to be finalised. Ian Chappel covered a Federal Government initiative, via the Heart Foundation, of group walks. Such regular walks will be in one's area with the aim to get everyone away from their I-pads and TV screens. You all know who you are. Fundraising for PKU, Ian continued, is aimed at commercialising a pro-biotic drink that will allow a PKU person to process more protein. This would mean access to a more palatable diet. A relative of Terry Pankhurst is planning to swim the English Channel later this year as part of this fundraising. David Firth apologised for the late delivery of Spokes, explaining that the printer let him down at the last minute. It seems shouting at the printer was insufficient. David also explained that our next meeting will need to be away from the Golf Club and suggested the Bistro at the Pennant Hills pub on Monday 9 April. This was accepted with enthusiasm. David drew our attention to page 3 of Spokes, a proposal by RI President Riseley for Rotarians to plant a tree for every Rotarian in the world, that is 1,200,000 trees. This will be discussed with Hornsby Council. Pride of Workmanship night will be 14 May and awardees are being sought. Then the Sergeant rose to his feet and demonstrated to his Lutanda neighbours just how diverse his punishment themes can be.

Our visitor, David Boyce, was introduced by Theo Glockemann. David, an agricultural scientist, who went to East Timor over 25 years ago to advise on improving techniques in crop growth and production. It would seem he is quite skilled in this expertise, except when planting jacaranda seeds. David remained in East Timor and is a charter member of the Rotary Club of Dili. He has been invaluable in background work in the RYLA and RYPEN programmes introduced into East Timor by Theo Glockemann. David gave us an overview of his Club's activities that include a youth exchange programme with Clubs in Brazil as well as the RYLA and RYPEN programmes. They have initiated vocational training in Queensland for two men and two women. During this two month course, the candidates acquire skills as mechanics, nurses and in IT. David covered the importance of RYLA and RYPEN to the East Timor community and how alumni have formed five Rotaract Clubs. President Alex thanked David for his address then closed the meeting.
