

MEETING REPORT - 9th APRIL

As Pennant Hills Golf Course Clubhouse is still under renovation the meeting was held at the Pennant Hills Hotel in the large function room. Meals and drinks were at the member's discretion to order. Some lively complaints were made by members who were sharing a buzzer with other members saying that the meal they ordered must have been something very special as they were served last.

Once meals were finished, President Alex called on each member for a report.

David Firth talked about scheduling of upcoming events which include Pride Of Workmanship awards night and the PKU presentation. Due to the PHGC room availability it was suggested that the POW night be moved to June as well as a new date for PKW as the speaker is not available on the night planned. David also asked for other nominations to be put forward and was looking to contact the new principle of Pennant Hills Holden. David also asked for nominations for Community Service awards. A couple of suggestions made were a man who has taken on the task of maintaining the gardens at the corner of Cardinal Ave and Boyd. After a poor effort from council this man stepped up and made good. Another example was a fellow who manages the local Neighbourhood Watch program. He virtually runs it by himself to ensure neighbours know what is impacting the area.

An initiative was put forward to follow on the Rotary International President for each member to plant a tree. President Alex endorsed the proposal and was advised that Hornsby council will provide the trees along with an area of where the trees can be planted. This would need to be co-ordinated with members and residents to ensure the trees are planted in the correct area and survive.

John Ellis outlined the National Youth Science Forum for Jan 2019 in that there is an applicant but has not yet completed the application and John is looking to follow up with him and the school.

Terry Pankhurst talked about the PKU night and firming up a night with Phil and Prof Christodoulou, the guest speaker. As the Rotary changeover is due for the 25th of June there are a number of events to be planned and enough time between events. David and Terry believe the best night for POW would be the 4th of June as the following week is the Queen's Birthday long weekend.

Adrian talked generally about his upcoming role of president and what programs he would like to be put in place.

Jim Fraser confirmed that the 'Bowelcare' kits are now available in local pharmacies. He also talked about the amount of Junk Mail and requests for funding the club receives. David commented that the majority of payments (60-75%) for POW are direct deposit and not cheques. David believes that online banking needs to be arranged such that payments can be made by fund transfers rather than cheques. The treasurer will be required to ensure payment slips have two signatures to ensure authorisation and book keeping is kept accurate.

In Spokes David outlined the St Lucy's Master Plan that has been prepared and made public. With this there has been some preliminary discussion between the Pennant Hills Rotary and Wahroonga Rotary about a joint fundraising program might be put forward for the two clubs that aligns with the St Lucy's master plan.

To validate this it was proposed that the principal of St Lucy's, David Raphael, be invited to a PH Rotary club meeting so the funds raised last year can be presented. David Raphael can outline some of the proposed plans which may provide some guidelines on what support/role the two rotary clubs might provide. David is to discuss this with Phil.

Alex reminded everyone that the District Assembly takes place on the 29th of April and to ensure that everyone has registered.

Next meeting to be held at Lutanda Manor next Monday.

The Rotary Club of The Hills-Kellyville Inc Indigenous Literacy Program Bourke Breakfast Club

Background

Members of our Club felt that we wanted to help the kids in disadvantaged rural communities get an education so that they had a chance to "Break out of the circle". A significant part of the problem was getting the kids to school and ready to learn. Teaching professionals told us that children who started the school day with a full belly were more attentive, learnt more quickly and were less disruptive.

The Bourke Project.

We selected a proposal from Bourke Public School to help them set up a series of programs aimed at improving indigenous literacy at their school.

The first part is the **Breakfast Club**. Starting at 3 days each week and now on all 5 days, breakfast is provided in the school's kitchen classroom.

Each week we provide more than 200 free breakfasts of fruit juice, toast or cereal and milk or Milo. The breakfast is prepared by 2 members of the school staff and Rotary assists with their wages as well as providing most of the food. So far we have provided about 50,000 breakfasts.

The second part is the recognition of those children whose schooling has benefitted most from the Breakfast Club. Two children from each year are given **Certificates** and **Vouchers** redeemable at the School or the local Newsagency for school related expenses.

The final part is to introduce Mentoring and role model programs in order to help the children overcome some of the negative influences they are exposed to.







The outcomes

- School attendance has improved to about 92%
- Student suspensions have reduced
- Academic results measured in years 3 & 5 have improved
- Less disruption in class

The Bourke Breakfast Club project is now registered with Rotary Australia Benevolent Society and all donations are tax deductible.
