These competitions are highly entertaining and worth listening to. I would hope as many of the Members as possible attend to show support for these fine young students. **Partners are more than welcome to attend.**



END POLIO NOW UPDATE

Following news of two further wild polio virus cases in Pakistan, I am pleased to forward the following in depth Polio campaign comments from three of our outstanding international leaders and commentators – including inspirational words and encouragement from Bill Gates. Bill Gates leaves no doubt on the absolute vital nature of ongoing support from Rotary – along with his commitment.

We now have 24 confirmed cases of polio this year – 7 in Afghanistan and 17 in Pakistan – all as a result of the ongoing hostilities along the border between the two countries.

Let's ensure a high percentage of clubs honour the request from RI President Barry Rassin for clubs to contribute \$1,500 each in a special 'one off' donation this year.

ROTARY FOUNDATION ANNUAL FUND - CENTURION CONTRIBUTION

Last year several members made our personal Centurion contribution of A\$100 to the Foundation's Annual Fund. This year the Club has also given A\$6,000 as its contribution to the Annual Fund. The Annual Fund is vitally important as the Fund that primarily finances the funding of Club projects through Global and District Grants.

For those of you that are currently Centurion donors please consider renewing your membership by making a further contribution of A\$100 before 30 June. For those of you that are not current Centurions, please consider becoming a Centurion by also donating your A\$100. It is important that payment be made by no later than mid June to ensure that the contribution is received and accepted for this year.

Each year the Foundation returns to District 9685, 50% of the contributions from the clubs in the District as District Designated Funds (DDF) on a 3 year cycle. The other 50% goes to the World Fund which also funds matching amounts to District DDF funding and Club funding of Global grants as well as funding District Global Grant Scholarships and Peace Scholarships. For some years, through additional funding from the World Fund, District 9685 and the Clubs have received (by having more projects including scholarships than other Districts) more funds from the Annual and World Funds than has been contributed to the Annual Fund on the 3 year cycle. Our District through hard work has the highest success rate of all the Districts in this respect.

Unfortunately this year in District 9685 there is a significant lag in giving generally from Clubs and personal donors to the Annual Fund, which as at 30 April, is running US\$70K behind last year at this time. Donations are very much needed if our Rotary charity is to continue funding our projects so successfully.

Years later, Juan sends a picture of himself to his birth mother.


Upon receiving the picture, she tells her husband that she wishes she also had a picture of Ahmal.
