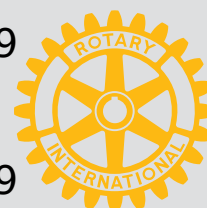

### **Hon BARRY MAHONEY QC, Retired District Court Judge**

Born at Concord, being the 4th of 4 children

Educated by Christian Brothers at Chatswood, then Lewisham.

1955 employed at Register General's Office, to work at same desk as Norm Gibson. Studied Law part time at Sydney University, whilst working as an Articled Clerk, graduating in 1962. In 1963 employed as Associate to a Supreme Court judge, also admitted to practise at the NSW Bar.

1964 -1986, practised at NSW, ACT, and Tas Bars. Took Silk (QC) in 1982.

1986 -2005 District Court judge.

Barry is married, with 3 daughters, 3 step-daughters and 13 grandchildren. A member of Circular Quay Rotary Club 1980 – 1986, Killara Probus Club since 2013, Kiama and North Ryde Golf Clubs. A modest golfer he has had two holes-in-one, is a regular scrabble player, regular but mediocre swimmer, and is interested in opera and concert music.

Tonight Barry will speak about the circuits in which he presided, the jurisdictions, the protocols and procedures associated with the District Court Judge role, and some intriguing and interesting cases over which he has presided.

The use of the local sheriff as a fund of local knowledge is valuable as some of the following recollections and interesting facts show;

- which cafe in Goulburn has the bluntest knives in the world
- the pubs in a rural town not to visit
- the excellent Chinese restaurant, and cutting his own asparagus, in Cowra
- the guy who was 3 days late for court because he didn't have a calendar, and had "cut 8 notches in a stick"
- on being asked when arriving in Nyngan "We hope you've brought some rain judge", to which he replied "I come on circuit to fill the dams and gaols".

The week after the town had its worst flood ever.

On country circuits, judges are expected to dispose of all cases in the list for that circuit, which means extending the sitting times when possible. and burning the midnight oil in a motel working on judgement and sentencing considerations.



## PRESIDENT RICHARD GREEN'S REPORT



The last meeting again showed the public speaking ability of the students who took part in MUNA (Model United Nations Assembly for Norm). The students were from Shore and Chatswood High . We would like to thank the teachers for the effort they put into preparing the students.

At this meeting the speaker will be a friend of Norms, Hon Barry Mahoney, a retired district court judge.

The past weeks have been very busy with collections at Chatswood Chase on 25/ 26 August, the Willoughby Fair and Bunnings on 1 September and the Father's

Day breakfast on 31 August. We served 570 meals at the breakfast. We collected approximately \$1500 at Bunnings.

I would like to thank the members ,their partners and the friends of Rotary for their help, without which we could not have done so much. Especially with a number of members away. We have another Bunnings on the 16 September at Belrose.

We are going to close off the donations for the head coil in early October. We have an approved district grant towards this project. Unfortunately to date only three district clubs are contributing .

Most clubs are concentrating on collecting for the drought and we have not given them a lot of notice to allow them to budget for a contribution. We have also applied for a Federal Government Grant.

With respect to Carevan we will concentrate on this in the new year, after we have completed the head coil project. We have got Carevan to apply for a Federal Government Grant. Richmond Rotary club have offered a contribution.

Chatswood Rotary club is keen to start a Rotoract club but it is unlikely we will be involved. We were involved with starting a Chatswood Rotoract club in the past with the help of a very active young man, but unfortunately it did not last.

I suggest you look at the programme and note the DG visit on 13 November, the A G M on 4 December and the Christmas party on 11 December.

The resolution topics debated were;

The attendees spoke of the time commitment they devoted over the 3 weeks before MUNA to research the policies and public position of their represented country towards each of the resolution topics. And whilst that provided the teams with the basis of preparing their principal submissions for or against the resolution, over the weekend of MUNA it was necessary to revise and prepare for debate on amendments proposed to the resolutions.

Research and the basis of their arguments quite often created a different perspective of a country to any personal perspective or views they have.

The students appreciated the opportunity for youth to be able to share their views and debate other youth in promoting or opposing others arguments which often went against their personal views. This involved diplomacy in their interaction and persuasion with other teams and blocks of teams. Participation enhanced their public speaking confidence and debating skills.

MUNA this year had 44 teams from 29 private and public schools, and a record 27 sponsoring Rotary Clubs who sponsored 38 teams, and 126 participating students.

## MEETING 23 OCTOBER 2018 “DONATE LIFE” GUEST SPEAKER– PROFESSOR PHILIP O’CONNELL

Our 22 May Bulletin included a very interesting story, from the May 2018 issue of Rotary Down Under, of a kidney organ donation to the grandson of Maurie and De Stack, from Taree. Maurie, a lawyer, is a friend and colleague of Neil Howie.

As a former District Governor, Maurie is seeking to mobilise all Rotary Clubs in Australia to urge families to register and discuss their organ and tissue donation decisions to help save more lives.

We are very fortunate to have Professor O’Connell as our Guest Speaker, an international expert on organ transplant research and on the critical need for organ and tissue donations. More than 1,500 Australians are currently awaiting transplant treatment.

Professor O’Connell is a Professor of Medicine at the University of Sydney, Director of Transplantation at Westmead Hospital and a founding Director of the Centre for Transplant and Renal Research at the Westmead Institute of Medical Research.

Professor O’Connell is a Past President of the international professional body - The Transplantation Society and was a guest speaker at the Rotary International Convention in Seoul in May 2016.

He was a member of the Australian Government Organ Donor Task Force that recommended the establishment of the Australian Organ and Tissue Authority to oversee organ donation in Australia. He is committed to the establishment of ethical solutions to the world wide organ shortage.

This is an ideal opportunity for us, our families and friends to hear what we need to know about making a decision that may help save more lives.

## SYDNEY TO HOBART YACHT RACE AND OCEAN RACING

Lindsay will talk about the 2017 Sydney Hobart Yacht race which he did as navigator on Kialoa II.

She was built 1967 and took line honours in the 1971 Hobart and won many races around the world for her original owner Jim Kilroy, the famous US yachtsman of Kialoa 1 to Kialoa 5 fame.

She was bought by a Sydney businessman in 2016, lying in Portugal and after a refit in the UK Lindsay and the crew raced the 2017 Fastnet Race, then the owner and 6 crew mates sailed her from the UK to Sydney between September to November taking 3 months.

She then competed in the 2017 Hobart and after the 2018 Hobart she will sail to San Diego for the July 2019 TransPac race to Honolulu. Then back to Sydney for the 2019 Hobart, then off to the northern hemisphere to resail over the next decade all the races she did in her heydays in the US, UK, Europe and The Mediterainian.

Lindsay is a member of the Lane Cove Rotary Club.

- advises the Sergeant-at-arms of any electronic equipment set up required

**On Sunday 21 October 2018 it's time to take ownership.**

It's time to be proud. It's time to Love Where We Live by taking part in Graffiti Removal Day!

The aim of Graffiti Removal Day is to highlight the problem of graffiti across NSW and encourage people to volunteer to remove and prevent graffiti. Graffiti vandalism costs the NSW Government and residents more than \$300 million every year and it has to stop.

The results speak for themselves –

- Since its inception in 2012, the number of GRD volunteers has increased from 597 to over 1800 in 2017.
- In its first year, 100 sites were nominated. In 2017 volunteers removed graffiti from 428 nominated sites.

Overall, roughly 120,000sqm of graffiti has been removed by GRD volunteers since the inception of the event. That equals a community service value of about \$8.8 million value in savings for private owners and the Government.

## THE Dstream HEAD 32 CHANNEL MR COIL



A project that the Club has decided to support is the endeavours of the Pink Ladies at the RNSH to assist with the acquisition of a dStream Head 32 Channel MRI coil. The equipment costs around \$75,000. The Pink Ladies have invited the club to contribute 50% of the cost.

The product enables advanced clinical applications and new frontiers in neurofunctional exams. It is designed to provide high resolution volumetric imaging of the cortex, while maintaining an excellent signal-to-noise ratio in the centre of the brain.

The Coil supports detailed morphological and functional assessment of the brain, for instance, during pre-surgical planning. Fast scanning times are possible through parallel imaging in the three measurement directions.

The club is seeking the involvement of other North Shore Rotary Clubs and has a District grants approved, to assist with the acquisition.





## FUN MOVIE NIGHT LETEFOHO FUNDRAISER, TIMOR LESTE ROSEVILLE CINEMA 21 SEPTEMBER 2018



The Parish of Lower North Shore (LNS) has twinned with the Parish of Letefoho in Timor Leste. Timor is one of the poorest countries in the world. It is also Australia's closest neighbour. The parish of Letefoho is in the highlands at the Western end of Timor Leste. The local high school has been renovated through the generosity of the LNS parishioners and has been achieving outstanding results. However, many of the children walk up to two hours each way every school day, for their education. This is extremely limiting for the students, hence the Parish of LNS is raising funds to complete a boarding house for Year 12 students and commence the construction of a second one.

To help towards this we are having a Fundraising Movie Night. The movie we have chosen is "Ladies in Black" starring Julia Ormond, Angourie Rice, Rachael Taylor, Noni Hazelhurst and Shane Jacobson.
