A winner will be determined based on the participant's performance on the evening. The winner will receive their Award, a plaque and Certificate at their School at date in July to be determined. The two runner's up will receive a certificate to be presented at the Meeting.

EBHS represented Canada and Kenya, and I was fortunate enough to be invited to a school assembly to present awards to the 6 students who represented their school so well and so proudly. Thanks to teacher, Michael De La Penna, who attended the whole weekend. He was a great help and also arranged students from EBHS to be volunteers.

We had over 40 volunteers for the weekend from Balgowlah Rotary, St. Ives Rotary, Glen Haven Rotary and especially Epping Rotary Club where over 25 members and family helped.

Volunteers were also from EBHS and Macquarie Rotaract.
