



## LAST MEETING 23 JANUARY - DR DAVID HANCOCK & TOOTH PROGRAM

David, a Newcastle Dentist, spoke to us about the invaluable work of the Royal Flying Doctor's Outback Oral Health (TOOTH) program started four years ago to provide dentists to remote and isolated communities in outback NSW. The program treats indigenous and non-indigenous children and adults.

David, with his wife Jenny, spend a week each year as volunteers driving a purpose built van (with inbuilt surgery) hundreds of kilometres from the RFDS airbase at Dubbo to provide the clinics.

Following his retirement later this year, David plans to spend up to eight weeks a year volunteering in the program. The enthusiasm and energy that he commits to this important RFDS service was very impressive.

In 2013 the childrens' oral health was that of a third world country with an average of 5 rotten teeth per child (5X the national average) with consequent significant impacts on their general health and self esteem. Most had never seen a dentist. The incidence of rotten tooth extraction has now been halved. Funding initially provided by David Gonski and Investec Bank has now dried up threatening the future of the program.

President Peter presented David with a cheque to the RFDS for \$5,000. This will be spent on a hand piece oiler for the van which will automatically clean and oil the hand pieces increasing the life of the bearings. The hand pieces are in use continually and currently have to be manually cleaned and oiled.

The program will need more significant, permanent and sustainable funding. The Club may be able to assist by investigating further initiatives with other Clubs and District 9670 (which encompasses much of the operating area of the program).

In an email to Neil from Dr Hancock, he comments;

*"Neil I have approached Lyn Mayne the director of dental services previously about volunteer drivers , She said the problem is the logistics of what to do with the drivers for the days the clinics are on and organising accommodation meals etc, so she was grateful for the offer but at this stage it is too difficult to organise. I will let you know if this changes".*

# 2018 FUN RUN

## PROPOSAL BY MIKE HARROWELL

### Roseville Chase Rotary Fun Run 2018

#### Introduction

The run will be on Sunday 29 July 2018.

To reverse the trend in falling numbers, the club should consider what can be done to promote the event. The proposal being put to members tonight is to approach primary and secondary schools in the area to participate in an interschool competition. There are 115 schools in the lower and upper North Shore of Sydney, and apart from Roseville College and Monte, there is no school specific representation in the event.

#### School Competition Proposal

The School with the most students participating in the event will win the Schools Competition. The event gets paid by attendees, hence the emphasis on numbers not fastest runners.

The Winning School will have the school name engraved on a shield which the School can retain over the next 12 months. The Shield will be collected from the school one month before the next year's event.

The Club may also decide to award the winning school/P&C with a donation, as an additional incentive.

"Most Students" may be defined as the most students in absolute terms, or as relative to the total school enrolments.

It doesn't matter which event the students compete in (2k 5K 10K).

#### Members action

We need members to approach specific schools to canvas support and identify issues. The approach to the schools may include to the principal, the head of sport and the P&C.

The club is seeking to optimize the event so that is established quickly and once established, will not have its clientele stolen by a competing run. To that end, the members are seeking a dialogue with the schools on what would make the event attractive, not just a yes/no on participation.

#### Possible Issues

Timing of event relative to the schools sporting calendar

Recognition for the fastest runners from the schools.

Special participation fee rates. We would probably look to change the age where we go from child rates to adult from 16yr to 18 yrs, and allow schools some kind of bulk rate. The rate for 16 and under is A\$18/head, but most children compete in a family, which is A\$90 for up to 6 ie A\$15/head.


