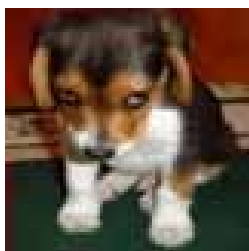

Dr Brabant graduated with his Bachelor of Dental Surgery (Honours) Sydney University and also received his Master of Dental Science (Orthodontics) from Sydney University.

He is a member of Royal Australasian College of Dental Surgeons, Pierre Fauchard Academy, International College of Dentists and World Federation of Orthodontists.

Dr Brabant is a former Secretary and President of Australian Society of Orthodontics (NSW Branch) and has previously held positions as a tutor in Paedodontics and Prosthetic Dentistry at Sydney University and lecturer to Speech Pathology students at Sydney University. Dr Brabant has presented for Invisalign at the 2014 Invisalign Summit in Singapore, ANZ Invisalign Orthodontic Forum, Queenstown 2015. Dr Brabant has worked for 32 years in private specialist orthodontic practice and his practice, Evolve Orthodontics, won a Telstra Business award in 2012.

Our story

The Carevan Foundation helps to feed the homeless and disadvantaged of rural Australia. The founder of Carevan, Dr John Brabant has worked as an orthodontist in rural Australia for almost 30 years. After reading an article in the Border Mail entitled "It's easier to turn away than to care" about the homeless and the disadvantaged people in Albury Wodonga and Northern Victoria, he decided to take action.

The Carevan Foundation aims to create a sense of identity, a sense of belonging and a sense of achievement in those less advantaged in our society. The Foundation is focused on changing "us" and "them" to become "we". After almost a year, the Carevan in Albury Wodonga has become an icon, a symbol that this community cares, and that a community through a strong volunteer network can fight hunger and poverty. "Sometimes a feeling from the heart becomes a jigsaw puzzle that is meant to be put together".

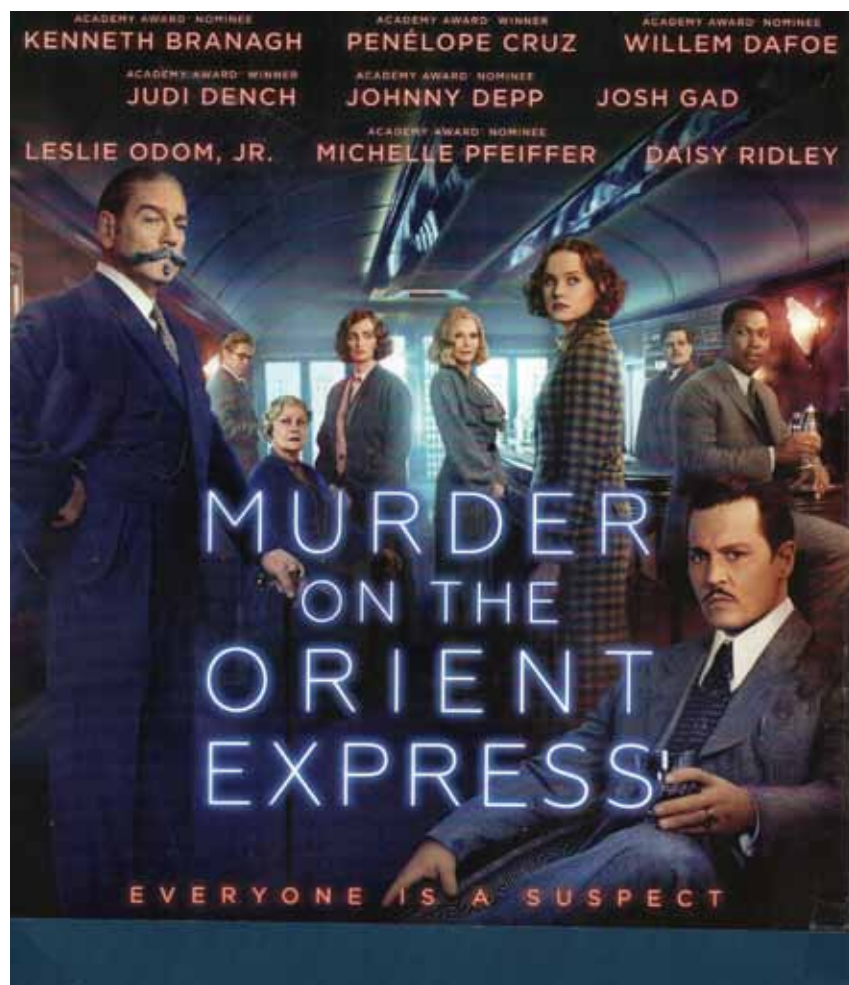
MURDER ON THE ORIENT EXPRESS

LAST MEETING 24 OCTOBER - JOHN GOH

John spoke about how his School, Merrylands East Public School, is educating primary level students. His talk was entitled "What Children can do". John has been a teacher for 30 years and for the last 12 years has been Principal at Merrylands East PS, a School with 380 students with 40 different language backgrounds.

John was one of the first Principals to alter School hours as he recognised that young students were fatigued after lunch. Parents supported the change after a 72% positive survey. He had walls removed to allow open-style learning so that in any one space there could be multiple learning activities taking place. He engaged students in the learning process and changed approaches to teaching by integrating literacy, numeracy, science, history into relevant situations.

He uses a wide range of technology. Even at the student's young age, he is developing work skills approaches to learning so that the students will be better equipped to meet changing work environments in the future.

The Rotary Foundation

In 2013-14 the Rotary Foundation raised US\$117 million, which was raised primarily by Rotarians, Rotary Clubs and Friends of Rotary. 92% of the annual expenditure goes towards projects and programs aimed at "doing good in the World" 2% is administration and 6% promotion. The Rotary Foundation has been awarded a four star rating by the Charity Navigator for eight consecutive years.

Let's Celebrate! The Rotary Foundation Rotarians in Sydney Districts 9685 and 9675 are proud of their Foundation and the work that is done throughout the world. We are also proud of the contributions made to our Foundation by the Rotarians, and Rotary clubs in the Sydney Districts and our annual dinner is a time to celebrate the good works of The Rotary Foundation and the excellent support from the members and clubs.

END POLIO NOW

The Rotary Foundation's universally best known program is Polio Plus — the eradication of Polio — which began in 1985 and is now hopefully in the final stages. Not so long ago, the world was paralyzed by the fear of polio. More than 125 countries were polio-endemic and thousands of families watched in anguish as the disease killed or crippled 1000 people a day, most of them children.

For 30 years now, Rotary and its partners such as the World Health Organization, UNICEF and the US Centres for Disease Control, have worked tirelessly to rid the world of polio. So far Rotarians have raised over US\$1.3 billion to help fund this program.

Since 1985, more than two billion children have received the polio vaccine, and five million children destined to be polio victims are walking today because of global immunisation. Reported cases have dropped 99.8% and only two countries Afghanistan and Pakistan remain endemic.

The final challenge

In 2011, India, which has been one of the most endemic countries, went one full year without a single case and has now been removed from the endemic countries list. This year Africa, the continent, has now also achieved one year polio free, including Nigeria which was one of the 3 endemic countries. However, the virus knows no borders and can quickly spread from endemic countries into polio-free countries.

The greatest battle now is financial. The World Vaccine Summit in Geneva, estimated that Polio can be eradicated within the next 3 years and that the cost will be US\$5.3 billion. Fortunately, world governments and other agencies have committed \$4.4 billion leaving a short fall of \$1.3 billion which is another fund raising challenge for Rotary in conjunction with the Gates Foundation. Rotary has now sent out the call for Rotarians to raise \$33 million per annum which will be matched by the Gates Foundation 2:1.

Visiting Rotarians can visit local club projects, club meetings and district activities. Visiting Rotarians can also be encouraged to support proposed local and international projects.

It is possible for sister clubs to participate in important club meetings via internet video connections. Club bulletins should be exchanged on a regular basis and project reports. It is important to maintain regular contact with sister clubs to build a strong relationship and knowledge of each other and each other's country.

BOWELCARE ANNUAL REPORT 2017

BowelCare Rotary Club of East Gosford Inc. District 9685 together with District 9710 and parts of Districts 9675 and 9670 have successfully completed their 27th annual bowel cancer awareness program in the community.

For the third year we chose to use the Australian made Faecal Immunochemical Test (FIT) manufactured by Clinical Genomics, which was branded under the Rotary banner for our BowelCare Program. The test kit again was well received by our participants, but sales were down on the previous year. This is mainly due to the National Bowel Cancer Screening Program increasing their eligible age brackets for the free screening kit. However there is a strong need for us to continue as the age bracket 75 and over are not included to receive the free Government test. The table below gives a good indication of our need to continue with the BowelCare program.

GRAFFITI REMOVAL DAY - REPORT BY PETER LEWIS

Our small team of Graffiti Busters had a very successful day on Sunday – on the annual Graffiti Removal Day (a NSW state-wide campaign supported by NSW Govt and many other organisations).

Peter Lefmann and Peter Lewis were out from about 9:00 to 1:00 with the Graffiti Busters trailer and visited 16 sites. We were joined by President Peter and partner Janette for part of the morning.

We cleaned off (mainly painted over) almost every one of them. One site, we found to have been already cleaned by another, unknown, party.

We would like to thank our Rotary Friends John Hammond and Will Rogers for identifying a number of sites – we need the continued help of ‘spotters’ to advise us of new defacing of private and public property (the vandals, somehow, should be made aware that it is a criminal offense – not just a ‘youthful expression of ‘ (??). Young offenders may get a ‘slap on the wrist’, community service orders etc but there can be large fines and even prison sentences imposed).

In addition to being a ‘spotter’, Friend John has also been active in his area, painting over graffiti on a number of occasions. Thank you John!

One of the biggest concerns, and disappointments, is that sub-species have attacked the Rotary Roseville Chase Playground. A number of sandstone blocks have had black ‘tags’ sprayed on them. We tried some removal solution and stiff brush on one of the tags – but with little effect. It would need the high-pressure water jet to make any impression. We were unable to locate any water tap at the site and would, maybe, have to seek the help of a neighbouring property across Griffith Ave. We would appreciate any suggestions, help, that any other members can give. The quicker the graffiti is removed, the better – graffiti often attracts other morons.

Graffiti on sandstone and similar surfaces is notorious – difficult to remove and often leaves a visible ‘shadow’. A an effective, but less desirable answer is to paint over it with a sandstone or similar matching coloured paint. Our experience with various brick walls, is that the ‘paint-over’ blends in quite well, is not very noticeable, and makes any revisits by idiots easy to combat. Again, any suggestions, help – will be gratefully received.

I will be making our official report-back to the Graffiti Removal Day organisation on our work on Sunday
