MATTERS TO BE FINALISED FOR FUN RUN

Tonight Neil Howie, in Mike Harrowell's absence, will be seeking to finalise a number of matters required on days before the fun run, for the successful running of the Fun Run next Sunday, 21 July. Some of these jobs and roles may have been sorted by now, however they are listed for both allocation and confirmation.

Following is a status report from Neil Howie.

Subject to availability of BBQ's and whether it will be feasible to run it, with a bit of tweaking we should be able to fill all the spots.

If you have confirmed that you are coming, please check your job on the circulated sheet prepared from the responses. Some of the jobs have been re-allocated. Some of you were not on the original list.

A decision has not yet been made on the BBQ as this depends on sourcing 2 BBQ's and predicting a profit on that activity.

We may have help from Chatswood Rotary for some of the unallocated jobs but that will not be needed if we don't BBQ.

Please let me know if you can do any of Mike's list of jobs before the Run day:-

In addition members/partners/friends are required to assist with any of the following jobs before the Run day: (Where the role has been agreed already is shown in red - to be confirmed as still OK on the night)

1. Before close of business **Friday 19th July** – collect 140 traffic cones from Willoughby Council Depot Gibbs St, and deliver to Mike's home at 183 Deepwater Road (heavy and bulky)
2. Before close of business **Friday 19th July** collect EFTPOS machine from bank (**Peter Lefmann has this in hand**)
3. **Friday 19th July** Open Holly St Oval gate to allow access for mobile toilet delivery, be on site to correctly locate toilets and ensure they are shut with plastic ties.
4. **Friday 19th July** collect PA system from Microhire Artarmon, the generator from Coates Penshurst St Willoughby,



5. **Saturday 20th July** purchase fruit (not oranges supplied by a sponsor) drinks and BBQ food if required. (Sue Ward for fruit).
6. **Saturday 20th July 4.30pm** at Holly St Oval for handing out Marshall equipment, assisting with loading the equipment into the shed.
7. We need 12 tables for registration, water, BBQ. (Roseville Public School are supplying but we will need to collect on Saturday afternoon and return on Sunday morning)

Roles on Fun Run day. In the schedule circulated by Neil's email, the "Yes" and "No" responses mean that you are coming to do the job allocated or not coming. This column also includes notes as to various action to address substitutes for the jobs, clarify responses etc. If you are in a column with a "?", could you let me and Mike know whether you are coming and happy to do the job allocated?

At our meeting on Tuesday 16 July, we will go through any particular points as to what still needs to be done and answer any queries you may have.
Don't forget that Mike is unable to attend the meeting but will be at the Fun Run.

NEXT MEETING - 16 AUGUST 2019 DALLAS BOOTH

Dallas is Chief Executive Officer at the National Insurance Brokers Association of Australia. The Association followed the Royal Commission very closely, and made a submission to the Royal Commissioner in relation to insurance broking.

The main role of the Association is to represent the interests of insurance brokers to governments, Members of Parliament, ASIC and other agencies. Dallas has been in this role for 8 years.

Prior to NIBA, Dallas ran the James Hardie asbestos compensation trust for a number of years, worked on behalf of insurance companies at the Insurance Council of Australia, and worked in the NSW Government overseeing compulsory third party insurance. Prior to that he was a policy adviser to a number of NSW Attorneys General.

Dallas is admitted as a barrister at law in NSW, although he is not a practising lawyer. He is a Fellow of the Australian Institute of Company Directors.

In the presentation, Dallas will provide an overview of the background to the Royal Commission into Misconduct in Banking and Financial Services, the key findings of the Royal Commissions, and observations on what the Royal Commission means for banks, insurance companies, and financial advisers in the future.

Background

- Ron Tacchi was first introduced to RYLA by his mentor, Walter Dickman, the grandfather of the speaking industry. Walter was a benefactor to many community groups and charities. He regularly donated his time and expertise to support Rotary activities and specifically the RYLA Program. Walter introduced Ron as his associate and assistant in late 1970, and gradually phased himself out as Ron became more active.
- By the early 1980's Ron was regularly invited to the annual program either as a workshop leader in communication skills and/or to speak at the graduation gala dinner.
- Over the years Ron made many friends within Rotary and continued to communicate with many of the Rotary RYLA graduates.
- Ron, through his exposure with RYLA, was invited to work with countless Rotary Clubs in the District, primarily to promote young achievers and conduct communication seminars.
- Ron's passion for helping young people to achieve their full potential and develop their communication skills springs from the support he received as a school boy and as a young man starting out in the business world.
- Ron appreciated that the continuation of RYLA is an important contribution to extending these opportunities to outstanding young leaders in our community.

Why the "Ron Tacchi Award"?

- Ron was an honorary member of the Rotary Club of Roseville Chase for many years.
- Sadly Ron passed away from leukaemia on 25 February 2010.
- The Rotary Club of Roseville Chase sought to do something worthwhile in Ron's memory, and agreed to sponsor the "Ron Tacchi Award" at RYLA.

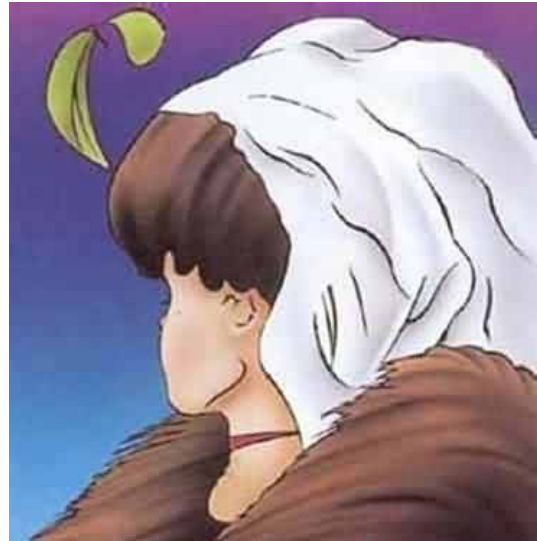

LONGEST PLACE NAME IN ENGLISH SPEAKING COUNTRY

Llanfairpwllgwyngyllgogerychwyrndrobwlillantysiliogogogoch , pronounced (llan-vire-pool-guin-gill-go-ger-u-queern-drob-ooll-llandus-ilio-gogo-goch), usually shortened to Llanfair-pwll or Llanfairpwllgwyngyll, is a Welsh word that translates roughly as "St Mary's Church in the Hollow of the White Hazel near a Rapid Whirlpool and the Church of St. Tysilio near the Red Cave".

The Town is a small, quiet town on the Island of Anglesey off the northwest coast of North Wales, famous for having the longest place name in an English-speaking country. Apart from its name it is similar to other nearby villages.

The world's first service club, the Rotary Club of Chicago, Illinois, USA, was formed on 23 February 1905 by Paul Harris.

Rotary is a worldwide organisation of business and professional leaders that provides humanitarian service, encourages high ethical standards in all vocations, and helps build goodwill and peace in the world. More than 1.2 million Rotarians belong to over 35,000 Clubs in 210 countries and geographical areas. Rotary Club

membership represents a cross-section of the community's business and professional men and women. The world's Rotary Clubs meet regularly and are non-political, non-religious, and open to all cultures, races, and creeds.

The Rotary motto is ***Service Above Self.***

OBJECT OF ROTARY

The Object of Rotary is to encourage and foster the ideal of service as a basis of worthy enterprise and, in particular, to encourage and foster:

- FIRST. The development of acquaintance as an opportunity for service;
- SECOND. High ethical standards in business and professions, the recognition of the worthiness of all useful occupations, and the dignifying of each Rotarian's occupation as an opportunity to serve society;
- THIRD. The application of the ideal of service in each Rotarian's personal, business, and community life;
- FOURTH. The advancement of international understanding, goodwill, and peace through a world fellowship of business and professional persons united in the ideal of service.
