

JOHN LANSER and THE OPEN AIR SCHOOL

The Open Air School

The disappearance of Harold Holt in December 1967 briefly revived memories of a long-forgotten North Shore school he briefly attended ... Abbotsholme College in Greengate Road, Killara, opposite the Greengate Hotel.

Better known, from its classes conducted on exposed verandahs, as **The Open Air School**, it was the only school to be exempted from closure during the Spanish influenza epidemic of 1919.

Privately owned, it did not long survive the death of its benefactor principal, John FitzMaurice, but alumni from its 17 year existence included two future prime ministers, a Reserve Bank deputy governor, the head of Woolworths, and the artist Cedric Emanuel.

Born in Waverley (Sydney), educated at Gordon Public School and Barker College, graduate of Sydney, New South Wales and London Universities, retired solicitor, part time university lecturer and member of the RAAF Specialist Legal Reserve, former chairman of the NSWAFL Disciplinary Tribunal, past president of the Australasian Pioneers' Club, member of Royal Prince Alfred Yacht Club, the National Trust, the Royal Australian Historical Society and the Australian Cinematographers Society.

In addition it is also understood that John taught Allan Farrar Economics when he attended Grammar!!

Bankwest (Western Sydney) Stadium

Alastair Baxter is a Principal and practicing registered Architect with Populous, Sydney, a global architecture and design practice specialising in sports stadiums and events and elite sports training facilities both in Australia and Asia. Alastair is an Australian retired rugby union player having played his entire professional career with the Waratahs in Super Rugby.

Alastair graduated from the University of Sydney in 2001 with both the Sir John Sulman and Sunlord Perpetual awards for design, and he began working for as an architect on a part-time basis whilst playing professional rugby. On completion of his rugby career in 2011, he became registered as an architect and moved back full-time specialising in sports, convention + exhibition and master planning projects both in Australia and South East Asia. Some projects of note that he has been involved in are:

- The SCG Northern Stand, Sydney
- The Indonesian International Exhibition and Convention Centre, Jakarta
- The Royal Botanic Garden, Sydney and Domain Master Plan, Sydney

The Bankwest (Western Sydney) stadium, officially opened in April 2019. It is owned by the NSW Government, designed by Populous Architects and built by Lendlease with at a cost of \$360 million. Bankwest Stadium is a 30,000-capacity rectangular stadium located on the site of the old Parramatta Stadium.



Most importantly, applicants MUST:


- Be at least 18 years and under 27 years of age at 1 January 2020

Graffiti Removal Day chairman Bob Aitken AM said preventing graffiti is the focus for this year's event on Sunday, 27 October.

"Graffiti vandalism costs our community over \$300 million each year," Mr Aitken said. "Since the event started in 2012 volunteers have removed more than 141,000sqm of graffiti, saving the community \$10.4 million.

"This year, as well as removing graffiti we want to see ugly tags with no artistic merit covered by colourful murals to help stop graffiti from occurring in the first place."

To help inspire people we are running a competition to find the best mural in the state with a \$1000 first prize.



How to Give a Cat a Pill

- 1. Pick cat up and cradle it in the crook of your left arm as if holding a baby. Position right forefinger and thumb on either side of cat's mouth and gently apply pressure to cheeks while holding pill in right hand. As cat opens mouth, pop pill into mouth. Allow cat to close mouth and swallow.
- 2. Retrieve pill from floor and cat from behind sofa. Cradle cat in left arm and repeat process.
- 3. Retrieve cat from bedroom, and throw soggy pill away.
- 4. Take new pill from foil wrap, cradle cat in left arm, holding rear paws tightly with left hand. Force jaws open and push pill to back of mouth with right forefinger. Hold mouth shut for a count of ten.
- 5. Retrieve pill from goldfish bowl and cat from top of wardrobe. Call spouse from garden.
- 6. Kneel on floor with cat wedged firmly between knees, hold front and rear paws. Ignore low growls emitted by cat. Get spouse to hold head firmly with one hand while forcing wooden ruler into mouth. Drop pill down ruler and rub cat's throat vigorously.
- 7. Retrieve cat from curtain rail, get another pill from foil wrap. Make note to buy new ruler and repair curtains. Carefully sweep shattered figurines and vases from hearth and set to one side for gluing later.
- 8. Wrap cat in large towel and get spouse to lie on cat with head just visible from below armpit. Put pill in end of drinking straw, force mouth open with pencil and blow down drinking straw.
- 9. Check label to make sure pill not harmful to humans, drink 1 beer to take taste away. Apply Band-Aid to spouse's forearm and remove blood from carpet with cold water and soap.
- 10. Retrieve cat from neighbour's shed. Get another pill. Open another beer. Place cat in cupboard, and close door on neck, to leave head showing. Force mouth open with dessert spoon. Flick pill down throat with elastic band.
- 11. Fetch screwdriver from garage and put cupboard door back on hinges. Drink beer. Fetch bottle of scotch. Pour shot, drink. Apply cold compress to cheek and check records for date of last tetanus shot. Apply whiskey compress to cheek to disinfect. Toss back another shot. Throw T-shirt away and fetch new one.

- 12. Call fire department to retrieve the cat from tree across the road. Apologise to neighbour who crashed into fence while swerving to avoid cat. Take last pill from foil-wrap.
- 13. Tie the front paws to rear paws with garden twine and bind tightly to leg of dining table, find heavy-duty pruning gloves from shed. Push pill into mouth followed by large piece of steak fillet. Be rough about it. Hold head vertically and pour 2 pints of water down throat to wash pill down.
- 14. Consume remainder of scotch. Get spouse to drive you to the emergency room, sit quietly while doctor stitches fingers and forearm and remove pill remnants from right eye. Call furniture shop on way home to order new table.
- 15. Arrange for RSPCA to collect this cat from hell, and call local pet shop to see if they have any hamsters.

ABOUT ROTARY



Paul Harris

The world's first service club, the Rotary Club of Chicago, Illinois, USA, was formed on 23 February 1905 by Paul Harris.

Rotary is a worldwide organisation of business and professional leaders that provides humanitarian service, encourages high ethical standards in all vocations, and helps build goodwill and peace in the world. More than 1.2 million Rotarians belong to over 35,000 Clubs

membership represents a cross-section of the community's business and professional men and women. The world's Rotary Clubs meet regularly and are non-political, non-religious, and open to all cultures, races, and creeds.

The Rotary motto is Service Above Self.

OBJECT OF ROTARY

The Object of Rotary is to encourage and foster the ideal of service as a basis of worthy enterprise and, in particular, to encourage and foster:

FIRST. The development of acquaintance as an opportunity

for service;

SECOND. High ethical standards in business and professions,

the recognition of the worthiness of all useful

occupations, and the dignifying of each Rotarian's

occupation as an opportunity to serve society;

THIRD. The application of the ideal of service in each

Rotarian's personal, business, and community life;

FOURTH. The advancement of international understanding,

goodwill, and peace through a world fellowship of business and professional persons united in the ideal

of service.
