

## Guest Speaker David Wilson Introduction by Ian Garrard



David Wilson,

Manager, Major Stakeholders, Parramatta Light Rail Infrastructure and Place, Transport for NSW

David Wilson is the Stakeholder Manager for Parramatta Light Rail. Prior to joining the project team 2 years ago, David was Departmental Liaison Officer to the Hon Andrew Constance MP, Minster for Transport and Infrastructure.

David's background is in community engagement and communications, having worked for two Federal MPs before starting with Transport for NSW in 2014.

David has lived in north-west Sydney all his life and currently resides in Northmead with his wife Alyssa.

In his current role, David works with all major stakeholders for the Parramatta Light Rail, including the City of Parramatta Council, NSW Health, the Land and Housing Corporation, and the Western Sydney Business Chamber. This role is the key point of contact between stakeholders and the project team.

David was Deputy Director for RYLA in District 9685, and a member of the facilitation team, for four years (2012-2015) and was awarded his PHF from the Rotary Club of Pennant Hills in 2015.



#### **WORKING WITH CHILDREN CERTIFICATES**

The Office of the Children's Guardian is an independent statutory authority in NSW Government. It protects children in NSW by promoting and regulating quality, child safe organisations and services.

Many members who previously applied for clearance for Working with Children, will have received or will be shortly receiving, email notice that their clearance is about to expire, and setting out the process for applying for renewal of the clearance.

The application can be made online, and the email sets out the procedure to be followed in the online process, and the subsequent need to attend at a NSW Services Centre with appropriate identification documents to complete the renewal application. There is no fee for "volunteers" which covers Rotary.

Peter Lefmann is the confidential "keeper" of the information for our Club. When you receive notification that your application has been cleared and your certificate renewed, please forward a copy of that advice to Peter Lefmann.







## BEING A VOLUNTEER - WHAT IT MEANS AND IS THERE A CASE FOR REMUNERATION

The nature of being a volunteer, no matter what community service organisation you may be a member of, is something unique. Below are some selected paragraphs from an article by a volunteer with a Northern Beaches Rural Fire Brigade, on her thought about being a volunteer, and whether there is an argument for payment to some volunteers.

"As a volunteer firefighter, I don't want to be paid for the work I do, and don't know many fireys who do, although when asked "why", we find it hard to explain.

Being a volunteer owes nothing to the marketplace. Volunteers get their kick out of giving themselves to communities. Making a gift of labour to someone who really needs it is a very powerful motivator. It connects them with people, it deepens their connections with communities and gives them a chance to experience purpose in their lives. And, OK, some enjoy the thrill but that's not me. The happiest my brother (a Rural Fire Service captain) has looked in recent times was when he told me that he'd saved four houses from burning down that day.

It's powerful in other ways, too. As a volunteer you get to decide whether you can or will turn up today. Every time you go out, it's your decision. It also gives you the power to say, no, you're not going to light up a backburn without proper resources (something I had to do this season) or even to leave the fire ground because you're not confident about the operation.


The broader message of these displays of volunteerism is a reminder that money doesn't have to underwrite everything we do. So much of our lives are spent in the work-spend cycle and so much of our national debate is about the income-expenditure equation that we've forgotten there are other ways of operating and that the incentives and rewards of these other spheres are hugely powerful.


But the nature of this season and no doubt those to come means we have to address the financial stress that extended fire seasons place on a limited number of volunteers (NSW RFS has 72,000 volunteers, it's estimated only about 18,000 are active and fewer than 5000 are available for out-of-area strike forces). Few are fans of the compensation system that was agreed upon (in NSW) last month. For instance, many fireys are tradies. It would be impossible for those working in the gig economy to make a case for how many gigs they might have won or for farmers to estimate how much they would have earned on the farm for each shift at the fire front.

Whatever the solution, it should respect the power and the fragility of the social contract because even if those thousands of firefighters are some of our bravest most resilient citizens, the contract they have with you and me is a delicate one."


- will have a display area of 19.79 sqm, and

You are to be commended for seizing that brief window of opportunity, and also for debiting my account £30 by way of penalty for the inconvenience caused to your bank.

My thankfulness springs from the manner in which this incident has caused me to rethink my errant financial ways. I noticed that whereas I personally attend to your telephone calls and letters, when I try to contact you I am confronted by the impersonal, overcharging, pre-recorded, faceless entity which your bank has become. From now on, I, like you, choose only to deal with a flesh-and-blood person.

My mortgage and loan payments will therefore and hereafter no longer be automatic, but will arrive at your bank by cheque, addressed personally and confidentially to an employee at your bank whom you must nominate. Be aware that it is an offence under the Postal Act for any other person to open such an envelope. Please find attached an Application Contact Status which I require your chosen employee to complete. I am sorry it runs to eight pages, but in order that I know as much about him or her as your bank knows about me, there is no alternative. Please note that all copies of his or her medical history must be countersigned by a Solicitor, and the mandatory details of his/her financial situation (income, debts, assets and liabilities) must be accompanied by documented proof.

In due course, I will issue your employee with PIN number which he/she must quote in dealings with me. I regret that it cannot be shorter than 28 digits but, again, I have modelled it on the number of button presses required of me to access my account balance on your phone bank service. As they say, imitation is the sincerest form of flattery.


Let me level the playing field even further. When you call me, press buttons as follows:

- 1 To make an appointment to see me.
- 2 To query a missing payment.
- 3 To transfer the call to my living room in case I am there.
- 4 ^ To transfer the call to my bedroom in case I am sleeping.
- 5 ^ To transfer the call to my toilet in case I am attending to nature.
- 6 To transfer the call to my mobile phone if I am not at home.
- 7 To leave a message on my computer (a password to access my computer is required. A password will be communicated to you at a later date to the Authorized Contact.)
- 8 ^ To return to the main menu and to listen to options 1 through to 8.
- 9 To make a general complaint or inquiry, the contact will then be put on hold, pending the attention of my automated answering service. While this may, on occasion, involve a lengthy wait, uplifting music will play for the duration of the call.

Regrettably, but again following your example, I must also levy an establishment fee to cover the setting up of this new arrangement.
