MEETING 23 OCTOBER 2018 “DONATE LIFE” GUEST SPEAKER– PROFESSOR PHILIP O’CONNELL

Our 22 May Bulletin included a very interesting story, from the May 2018 issue of Rotary Down Under of a kidney organ donation to the grandson of Maurie and De Stack, from Taree. Maurie, a lawyer, is a friend and colleague of Neil Howie.

As a former District Governor, Maurie is seeking to mobilise all Rotary Clubs in Australia to urge families to register and discuss their organ and tissue donation decisions to help save more lives.

We are very fortunate to have Professor O’Connell as our Guest Speaker, an international expert on organ transplant research and on the critical need for organ and tissue donations. More than 1,500 Australians are currently awaiting transplant treatment.

Professor O’Connell is a Professor of Medicine at the University of Sydney, Director of Transplantation at Westmead Hospital and a founding Director of the Centre for Transplant and Renal Research at the Westmead Institute of Medical Research.

Professor O’Connell is a Past President of the international professional body - The Transplantation Society and was a guest speaker at the Rotary International Convention in Seoul in May 2016.

He was a member of the Australian Government Organ Donor Task Force that recommended the establishment of the Australian Organ and Tissue Authority to oversee organ donation in Australia. He is committed to the establishment of ethical solutions to the world wide organ shortage.

This is an ideal opportunity for us, our families and friends to hear what we need to know about making a decision that may help save more lives.

Please bring as many visitors as you can to give this important speaker a strong audience. Let Avis or Neil know if you intend to bring guests as soon as you can so that we can have an early gauge of numbers.

LAST MEETING - 14 AUGUST 2018 MICHAEL WERE - OPEN HEART INTERNATIONAL

Michael Were provided a very interesting address on the creation of Open Heart International (OHI) and on the many overseas surgical operations and projects that the not-for-profit organisation has undertaken since its inception in 1986.

The degree and breadth of the volunteering of time and resources by the participants, such as doctors, nurses, theatre nurses, recovery personnel and others is quite impressive. The volunteers who assist with the overseas surgical procedures come from all over Australia, with many using their annual holidays from their professional work, to join the overseas teams. They also meet their own travelling costs.

Michael provided a range of statistics about the locations, countries and cities in the third world where the organisation has undertaken surgical procedures, and the extent of the equipment that needs to be transported to most locations.

A major achievement and point of satisfaction is the training of locals in the overseas countries to eventually undertake some of the medical services, which is a significant focus of OHI.

On Sunday 21 October 2018 it's time to take ownership.

It's time to be proud. It's time to Love Where We Live by taking part in Graffiti Removal Day!

The aim of Graffiti Removal Day is to highlight the problem of graffiti across NSW and encourage people to volunteer to remove and prevent graffiti. Graffiti vandalism costs the NSW Government and residents more than \$300 million every year and it has to stop.

The results speak for themselves –

- Since its inception in 2012, the number of GRD volunteers has increased from 597 to over 1800 in 2017.
- In its first year, 100 sites were nominated. In 2017 volunteers removed graffiti from 428 nominated sites.

Overall, roughly 120,000sqm of graffiti has been removed by GRD volunteers since the inception of the event. That equals a community service value of about \$8.8 million value in savings for private owners and the Government.

THE Dstream HEAD 32 CHANNEL MR COIL



A project that the Club has decided to support is the endeavours of the Pink Ladies at the RNSH to assist with the acquisition of a dStream Head 32 Channel MRI coil. The equipment costs around \$75,000. The Pink Ladies have invited the club to contribute 50% of the cost.

The product enables advanced clinical applications and and new frontiers in neurofunctional exams. It is designed to provide high resolution volumetric imaging of the cortex, while maintaining an excellent signal-to-noise ratio in the centre of the brain.

The Coil supports detailed morphological and functional assessment of the brain, for instance, during pre-surgical planning. Fast scanning times are possible through parallel imaging in the three measurement directions.

The club is seeking the involvement of other North Shore Rotary Clubs and District grants to assist with the acquisition.



CASTLE COVE SUBURB - SOME OF THE HISTORY



In the Bulletins during last Rotary year, I featured some history and photos of early Echo Point, Roseville and Chatswood.

Below is some of the history about the Castle Cove suburb in which our Club was initially founded. (Apologies for the lack of clarity in some of the images).

The Cammeraygal People: The Cammeraygal people of the Guringai nation lived in the Willoughby area until the 1820s and are recorded as being in the northern parts of the Sydney region for approximately 5,800 years. By 1830 there were no Aboriginal people following a traditional lifestyle in the area.

Early times: Governor Phillip explored the area in 1788, but the rugged terrain did not attract him. The area was inhabited until 1820 by the Cammeraygal people, an Aboriginal family group.

Name: Originally Castle Cove was referred to as “Middle Harbour” as well as “Little Sugar Loaf Peninsula”. The land in this area remained largely undeveloped until the 1950s. Walter Burley Griffin named the area “Castlecove” in 1920 due to the prominence of **Innisfallen Castle**. It became “Castle Cove” in 1987.

Pioneers: The first grant purchase was in 1858, by Dr. H.G. Alleyne. By 1878 almost all the land on the peninsula had been sold except Yeoland Point Reserve. In 1886 most of the area had been resold to Andrew Armstrong who formed the Cammeray Estate Land Company with a view to developing the area, but with the depression of the 1890s the Company went into liquidation in 1893.



Willis Family: The first permanent residents of Castle Cove were the Willis family who acquired 52 acres from a default mortgagee Dr Haynes Gibbes Alleyne in 1858.

In 1903/4 Willis built ***“Innisfallen Castle”*** a grand, castle-like house. Innisfallen is Irish for “Isle of the fields.” The family engaged in some light farming in the early years and lived under relatively primitive conditions until the 1960s. It was not until 1967 that the house was connected to town water and electricity.

Henry Willis (1860-1950) was the Member for Robertson in Australia’s first three Parliaments (1901-1910). One of his sons Dr Henry Willis was an Alderman on Willoughby Council from 1938-53 and Mayor in 1943 and 1944. In the 1960s the Willis land, with the exception of the house, was sold to Headlands Developments. Dr. Henry Willis died in 1973.

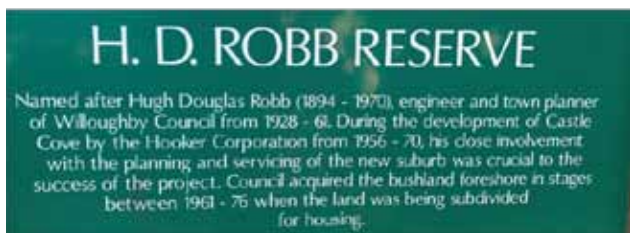
Innisfallen Castle has NSW State Heritage status.



Development from the 1950s to the 1970s: The Greater Sydney Development Association (GSDA) (Walter Burley Griffin’s company) which had owned most of Castlecrag, Middle Harbour and Castle Cove, had not developed the Castle Cove area. In 1958 the Hooker Corporation bought a controlling interest in the Company. From 1956 to the 1970s Headland Developments and Hooker-Rex Estates developed Castle Cove. Water and sewerage were installed by the developers.

Parks and Reserves: Parks and reserves in Castle Cove include **H.D. Robb Reserve** and **Explosives Reserve**, the latter of which was originally established as a buffer zone for the explosives magazines at Bantry Bay, this 31.4 ha reserve features some of Sydney’s most untouched bushland areas.





H.C. Press Park commemorates Henry Christian Press who purchased land on Middle Harbour in 1909 with the intention of building a house and farm. Press operated boat sheds around Sydney harbour and began his Castle Cove operations around 1912 with three sheds, picnic grounds and tables with bench seating. This later expanded in 1939 to include a wharf, swimming pool and dressing sheds which Press called the Palmer Pleasure Gardens.

Willis Park, bounded by Eastern Valley Way and Castle Cove Drive & tennis courts, is named after Dr Henry Hastings Willis, owner of *Innisfallen Castle*.

Castle Cove Park was created by dedication and by purchase when Council approved the Deepwater No 6 Subdivision in 1953. The park pavilion is named after Laurence Frederick McGinty MBE (1921-91), local resident activist, Middle Harbour Ward Alderman 1957-68, Mayor 1960-67 and Member of Parliament for Willoughby 1968-78.

Headland Lookout is named after the roadway that encircles the north-west promontory of the Castle Cove headland. The reserve was acquired in 1961 and 1968 from Headland Developments Pty Ltd. when the land was subdivided into large housing blocks. Denawen Park is named after the aboriginal word meaning "to barter". As the main land developer of Castle Cove, the Hooker Corporation elected to highlight the Aboriginal inhabitation of the Lower North Shore by choosing Aboriginal names for the new street names in each new housing subdivision in Castle Cove. The land was given to Willoughby Council in 1979

Schools: Castle Cove Public School, Kendall Road, opened in 1952 as Roseville East Infants School with 75 students. It was renamed Roseville East Public School in 1953 and had 300 students by 1956. It became Castle Cove Public School in 1957. A new school hall was built in 1999 and new library in 2006.

Library: Watermark Castle Cove, located in Deepwater Road, near the Castle Cove shops, is the first facility of its kind to have a Community Library on the premises. The Library is operated by Willoughby City Council.



Castle Cove Country Club: This golf course was designed and promoted by Walter Burley Griffin in 1924 as a centrepiece of the Castlecove Estate. While the development of the Castlecrag Estate remained the priority, Griffin began drawing up plans for the golf course in 1928 and work commenced in 1930. By this time the Depression had severely impacted on the finances and prospects of the GSDA, but development of the nine-hole course continued. (Below golfers on the 9th green with clubhouse in background).



It opened on 12 April 1932. Griffin designed the small “shelter shed” in 1931 which featured a shallow reinforced concrete domed roof and distinctive French doors. The clubhouse was subsequently enlarged, but the building was destroyed by fire in 1957.

A new clubhouse was opened in 1965 by Laurie McGinty, Mayor of Willoughby.

Paul Harris

The world's first service club, the Rotary Club of Chicago, Illinois, USA, was formed on 23 February 1905 by Paul Harris.

Rotary is a worldwide organisation of business and professional leaders that provides humanitarian service, encourages high ethical standards in all vocations, and helps build goodwill and peace in the world. More than 1.2 million Rotarians belong to over 34,100 Clubs in 210 countries and geographical areas. Rotary Club membership represents a cross-section of the community's business and professional men and women. The world's Rotary Clubs meet regularly and are non-political, non-religious, and open to all cultures, races, and creeds.

The Rotary motto is ***Service Above Self.***

OBJECT OF ROTARY

The Object of Rotary is to encourage and foster the ideal of service as a basis of worthy enterprise and, in particular, to encourage and foster:

- FIRST. The development of acquaintance as an opportunity for service;
- SECOND. High ethical standards in business and professions, the recognition of the worthiness of all useful occupations, and the dignifying of each Rotarian's occupation as an opportunity to serve society;
- THIRD. The application of the ideal of service in each Rotarian's personal, business, and community life;
- FOURTH. The advancement of international understanding, goodwill, and peace through a world fellowship of business and professional persons united in the ideal of service.
