


Message from PDG and Rotary Foundation Distrixt Chairman David Rands Hi Richard and Neil,

Trundle Central School Profile

Trundle Central School is located in the township of Trundle approximately 65 Km west of the larger townships of Forbes and Parkes. Like many towns in the region structural employment change in agriculture, reduced farm incomes and the competition from overseas markets has caused rural decline. In the last twenty years our town has lost two licenced clubs, supermarket, service station, saw mill, car yard, butcher, bakery and café and many good families have moved away. Then along comes this devastating drought to further place strain on our community both financially and emotionally.

Our school has reached out to larger communities, schools and service clubs such as Rotary. The response has truly reinforced to our students and community the strength and quality of human compassion across this great country. Youth mental help is under the greatest pressure when young people feel isolated.

Our school will continue to a centre of education within our community but it is also a centre of pastoral and community care far after this drought is over. Any help we can receive from outstanding organisations such as rotary is appreciated. I would like thank Roseville Chase Rotary Club for their generous sustainable donation of a water tank. Please send some rain as well but I realise this is out of the power of even Rotary.







countries and geographical areas. Rotary Club membership represents a cross-section of the community's business and professional men and women. The world's Rotary Clubs meet regularly and are non-political, non-religious, and open to all cultures, races, and creeds.

FOURTH. The advancement of international understanding,

goodwill, and peace through a world fellowship of business and professional persons united in the ideal

of service.
