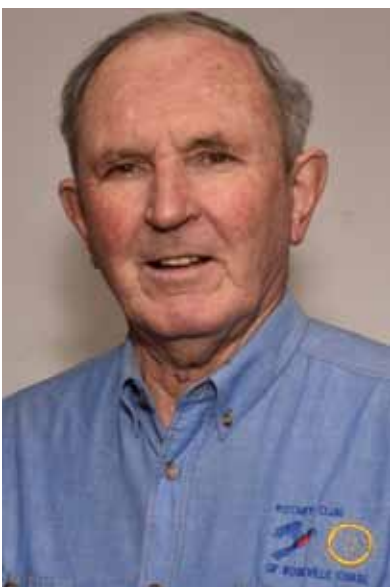

We have had a number of major successes during the year – The Meals on Wheels Project, the Working with Children Policy and implementation, the Annual Fun Run, Clean-up Australia Day, the numerous Bunnings BBQs, the on-going Graffiti Busters work and the numerous Youth Projects and Programs. We have made a number of donations to important charities. These events and activities will be expanded in the reports of the various service Directors.

During the year the Club adopted a revised Constitution and revised By-Laws, based on District recommendations. Our thanks to Ross Symons for his work in reviewing and proposing the required changes. As mentioned above, we also implemented a Working With Children Policy, with Peter Lefmann and Dianne Wilkinson appointed as Verification Officers. Our thanks to Neil Howie and to Peter for their work on this Policy.

As mentioned in the opening comments, we have faced a number of challenges. A significant one is the continued decline in membership. When I joined the Club in 2012 I believe that we had 51 members. (Cont. Next Page.....)



At the start of this Rotary Year we had dropped to 36 and my latest information shows our membership at 32. During 2016-17 we have been unsuccessful in recruiting new members to the Club. The normal attendance at the Dinner Meetings struggles to pass 20 and we are regularly faced with having to pay the Golf Club for unused meals.

We have had a couple of Forum meetings and convened a Task Force to discuss our situation and identify actions to address the issues. We have agreed to change our meeting schedule from weekly to fortnightly – which we hope will be more acceptable to our members and to potential members. The majority of members were against an amalgamation with another, similar, Rotary Club – but with the declining membership, amalgamation might be a future necessity.

President Elect Peter (and President Nominee Richard) will also face many challenges in their years and I wish them every success as they work to continue the great contribution that the Rotary Club of Roseville Chase makes to our community and to the Rotary world.

Vocational Service Director's Report 2016 - 2017 Director; Ted Anderson

1 Stuart Frith, Will Rogers ,Peter Lefmann, Cliff Garret and I participated as supervisors in the STEM inter school challenge at Galstaun College Terrey Hills on 3/5/17 run by Newcastle University.

2 The District Assembly at Kings School 23/4/17 introduced a number of new initiatives including Ethics in business, an exchange of medicos to Uganda (RAWCS) in place of the GSE program which seems to have been discontinued, Interplast vocational training team, National skills week and the end trachoma by 2020 program promoted by the next RI President Ian Riseley a Melbournian.

3 I have agreed to champion this cause and been appointed by the organising team to create a local team in our District. The first meeting was on 19/5/17 to make a promotional plan and discuss possible field teams to assist, apart from clubs financial support.

4 A mentoring team participated again this year at Killara High School doing mock interviews. It comprised Peter Lewis, Neil Howie, Stuart Frith, Richard Wilmott and myself.



5 A new STEM project was announced run by a company called “cuberider” and supported by some clubs, being a program sold to schools and sponsored by Rotary Clubs for senior students to stimulate interest in science and space. Clubs are encouraged to partner with a local school and facilitate the process as well as financial support \$750.

This is one of a number of STEM programs promoted through schools with Rotary support and will be discussed with Killara high in the near future.

6 It was highly recommended to nominate a specific charity for all fundraising events rather than just “Rotary projects” and also to use action pictures to promote Rotary projects. The use of facebook and like media has been successful and will be used for District PR programs. A connection with local Rotoract clubs is desirable.

7 The District Assembly continues to be a valuable source of new ideas and new projects and all members would benefit from attendance.

8 There were no vocational excellence nor pride of workmanship awards made this year.

I would like to thank my worthy committee for their assistance and support this year and look forward to working with them again.

International Service Director's Report 2016 - 2017 Director; David Brand

The International Service Committee in 2016-2017 was David Brand, Sue Ward and Bob Warland.

During 2016-2017 the International Service Committee has undertaken a number of donations to a series of worthy and varied charities.

Our grants totalled \$5,000 against a budget of \$12,100. This expenditure took into account that our revenue for the year was down.

The grants made were the following:

1. **St Jude's School, Tanzania - \$1,500**

Rotary Clubs in Australia have been longstanding supporters of the St Jude's School which was established in 2001 by Gemma Sisia, a young teacher from rural NSW. The school now has over 1,500 students and 300 staff, almost all of whom are locals. Members of the Club attended a joint meeting with St. Ives and Turramurra Rotary Clubs on 15 March 2017 to hear the continuing inspiring story of St Jude's School.

2. **YWAM Medical Ships - \$2,000**

This charity provides medical services by volunteer medical staff to over 6,000 patients mainly in New Guinea. The Club heard about the wonderful work of this charity during a presentation at the Club earlier this year.

3. **Interplast - \$1,500**

Interplast began in 1983 through a collaboration between Rotary and the Royal College of Surgeons. Interplast today operates across the whole Asian region, delivering surgical and training programmes to improve the skills of local medical staff for the benefit of local poor communities.

3) Rotary Youth Program of Enrichment (RYPEN)

The Club sponsored five (5) students for the RYPEN Summer Camp which was held over the weekend of 3 to 5 February 2017.

The students from Shore School were Jack Harvey, Angus Hughes, Xavier Phillips, Ryan Treleaven and Harry Zheng.

The five (5) Shore students spoke about their experiences at the Summer RYPEN on Tuesday 7 March 2017. Their presentations were well received and it was clearly evident that all the boys benefitted from RYPEN.

There was a 2nd RYPEN Winter Camp held in mid June 2017. Two (2) places have been accepted by students at Killara High School, namely, Kate Wildey and Oliver Toop.

4) Rotary Youth Driver Awareness (RYDA)

5) School Awards

6) Model United Nations Assembly (MUNA)

The Shore team, who represented, Nigeria finished 3rd in this District MUNA Program. The boys from both teams will speak at a Club Meeting on 8 August.

7) National Youth Science Forum

The National Youth Science Forum (NYSF) will be held in both Canberra and Brisbane in January 2018. This is a prestigious and highly competitive Program. Two Schools, Roseville College and Killara High School were approached seeking Expressions of Interest from students at the Schools to attend this prestigious

Forum. At the time of writing only one application had been received and this was from Sarah Armstrong who lives in Roseville and attends Loreto.

Sarah was interviewed by Stuart Frith and myself on Friday 23 June and we were impressed by Sarah's academic record and overall capabilities. Her application has been forwarded to the District NYSF Chair. Interviews will be then held by the District in mid July and if Sarah is successful at District Level, the Club will sponsor her attendance to NYSF in Canberra.

8) School Competitions

On Tuesday June 13, the Rotary Club conducted two competitions for students in Year 6 at three (3) Schools, namely, Castle Cove Public School, Roseville Public School and Roseville College Junior School.

The competitions are the Essay Competition and the Public Speaking Competition. The topic of the Essay Competition is student's choice with the length of about 300 words. The Rotary Club chooses the best of the three essays presented and the winner of the competition read their essay at the Meeting and were presented with a plaque and a certificate. The two runner's up received a certificate.

The winner of the Essay Competition, Elise Nicholson-Reid from Roseville Public School was presented with her Award on June 13. The other participants for the Essay Competition were Juliet Borean from Castle Cove Public School, and Grace Khoury from Roseville College Junior School.

In the Public Speaking Competition the School's staff judged the best speaker at their School with the winner representing their School speaking at the Rotary Club Meeting on 13 June 2017. The students spoke between 2 – 3 minutes on a topic of the student's choice though the School can set its own guidelines.

A winner was determined based on the participant's performance on the evening. The winner will receive their Award, a plaque and Certificate at their School at date in July to be determined. The two runners up received a certificate presented at the meeting on 13 June 2017.

The winner of the Public Speaking Competition was Tom Garrett from Castle Cove Public School, The other participants for the Public Speaking Contest were Tiana Pendray from Roseville Public School and Charlize Augustine from Roseville College Junior School.

Centenary of the Rotary International Foundation

The year was a most important year for the Rotary International Foundation being the Centenary of its establishment in Chicago in 1906 when Arch Klumph made the initial contribution of US\$26.50.

Our Club and its members have continued to strongly support the Foundation through its fundraising and donations.

On 9 November 2016 four of our members (with 3 wives and partners) attended a combined celebration dinner arranged by the three Chatswood Clubs to raise funds for the Foundation.

In doing so each contributed \$26.50 to commemorate the Centenary. One of our members managed to win a magnificent bottle of a fine red wine!

Meals on Wheels

The Club, through its Foundation and Service Committees, aims to effectively utilize in its programs, with other Clubs and District Foundation, the funding that is available from the RI Foundation.

This year, we have achieved 2 District Grants totalling \$5,000 towards funding of the purchase of the new MOW refrigerated van by:-

- a grant of \$3,000 to our Club to support its funding of \$7,000; and
- a grant of \$2,000 to the Carlingford Rotary Club paid to our Charity account to support its contribution of \$2,000.

Annual Programs Fund

This year the Club has paid, as its annual donation to the Annual Programs Fund, A\$ 4,000.

In addition, to date, our members have individually contributed to the Foundation as Centurion members through 13 donations to the Fund (\$1,300) in this Rotary year.

District Polio Challenge

This year the Club has paid, as its annual donation to the Polio Fund, A\$3,578 (being equivalent to US\$2,650) accepting the District Polio Challenge to clubs to celebrate the Centenary by this 100 fold recognition of Arch Klumph's original donation to the Foundation.

This amount was multiplied by a factor of 7.5 by matching funds from District Designated funds, the Rotary Foundation and the Gates Foundation to generate to generate effective total funds of A\$26,835.

Recognition of Paul Harris Fellows

At the Changeover Dinner on 5 July 2016 our District Governor Bruce Lakin presented Peter McKeown, Sue Ward, and Di Wilkinson with certificates of recognition as Paul Harris Fellows and Ian Fraser with a Sapphire pin. Jill Lawson, who has been unable to attend meetings this year, has also been recognized as a Paul Harris Fellow.

At a later meeting President Peter Lewis presented Allan Farrar with his certificate of recognition as a Paul Harris Fellow and past member Richard Wilmott (Charter member and our second President) with a Sapphire pin in recognition of his many years of outstanding service to Rotary and our Club.

- FOURTH. The advancement of international understanding, goodwill, and peace through a world fellowship of business and professional persons united in the ideal of service.

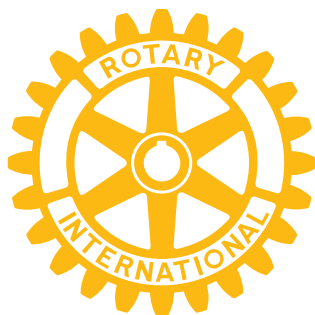
