## **Report for Club Administration 2015-16**

2015-2016 was another successful year for the Rotary Club of Roseville Chase and its weekly meetings at the Roseville Golf Club. The meetings have generally been well run, well organised, with a variety of interesting speakers.

## **Graffiti Busters Report**

The current team began in January 2014 following the resignation of John Chinn. Since then there have been 90 jobs logged in the data base and action taken to remove the graffiti.

Some of the logged jobs have had more than one site and graffiti tags etc included. Therefore the actual number of graffiti vandalisms removed will be more than 90. A number of sites have had repeat visits as the vandals have made return visits. However, the program aims to remove the offensive material as soon as practical, to dissuade them from coming back.

## **International Service Report      2015-2016**

Our first initiative was to support a solar panel project for Taveuni Island in Fiji with a donation of \$2000. The project will allow students to use light from solar panels to assist with their homework. Without solar lighting the students have to rely on kerosene lighting.

In February Mr Indy Singh, who started the charity *Vision Beyond Australia* presented to the Club. *Vision Beyond Australia* provides free eye surgery for impoverished and disadvantaged adults and children in a number of countries including India, Myanmar, Nepal and Cambodia. The Club later made a donation of \$2000 to this charity to assist in undertaking their current projects.

Our final initiative was to make a donation of \$2000 to assist with a surgical team visiting Nepal and undertaking various surgeries, particularly for the local female population.

**KYDS** For the first time our club supported a local group situated in Linfield. KYDS supports Local Youth in the Lindfield, Roseville & Killara areas, counselling on Depression, family issues, drugs etc. A representative of KYDS attended a regular Club meeting to explain the importance of this service in our District.

## The Rotary Foundation Report 2015-2016



### **Introduction**

The Committee members this year were Neil Howie with John Hammond (also on International Service Committee) and Malcolm Pilcher (also on Community Service).

An important goal for this year, and as a 5 year visioning goal, was for the Club through its Foundation, International and Community Service committees to better utilize the programs and funding that are available from the RI Foundation through District and Global Grants.

Other goals were to:

- continue to familiarise Club members with the programs of the RI Foundation;
- achieve a strong level of contribution to the Annual Programs Fund of the RI Foundation from which its Grants are funded;
- continue to support the RI goal to maintain funding necessary to finally eradicate polio;
- encourage members to participate in the Centurion program by making a tax deductible donation of \$100 each year to the Annual Programs Fund;
- promote to members other options for direct donations to the RI Foundation through the Paul Harris Society and through bequests to the Permanent Fund; and



- recognise members and others in the community as Paul Harris Fellows thereby also achieving donations of US\$1000 for each to the Annual Programs Fund from credits due to our Club from the RI Foundation.

Our Club attended the District Training Assembly in April 2015 and the District Foundation Dinner in November 2015 where the guest speaker was the Rotary International President Elect for 2016-2017.

### **Uganda Water and Sanitation Global Grant Project**

In May 2015 the Club contributed US\$2000 to the RI Foundation to assist in the funding of this major international project which was approved as a Global Grant in June 2015 and which will be completed in 2016-2017.

The Club was introduced to the project by “Texas” Jack Wallace. It is steered by the Houston Rotary Club in Texas and by the Calgary Rotary Club in Canada.

The project for 10 schools in the very poor rural areas of the Rakai and Kalung Districts on the western coast of Lake Victoria will provide:

- training of children, parents and teachers in hygiene management ;
- a reliable water supply;
- uncontaminated drinking water; and
- safe and uncontaminated sanitation facilities

The project is funded by grants from the RI Foundation of US\$126,000 to match contributions from 21 Clubs in 8 countries and their 17 Districts for total project funds of US\$310,000.

The project was launched in September 2015 with the commencement of Phase 1 for the education of the participating schools and communities in Water, Sanitation and Hygiene practices before the proposed installation or upgrade of facilities.

### **Cromehurst School Sensory Garden**

Following completion of the construction of the garden for well under its budgeted expenses, District Foundation has paid the District Grant totaling \$1349 to our Charity A/C for this very successful Community Service project.

### **Fiji Power to Learn Project**

This International Service project provides for the supply and installation of solar photovoltaic standalone power systems for 2 remote Fijian schools to run computers . The proposal came from the Rotary Club of Taveuni Island, Fiji in conjunction with the ‘Its Time Foundation’ (Rob Edwards) which has previously installed several similar systems in other remote Fijian schools.

Initially the proposal was for a Global Grant but the application was rejected by the RI Foundation.

Our Club (\$2000 contribution) participated with the Lindfield Club (\$7000), and the Ku-ring-gai Club (\$5000) in providing funding from the Clubs of \$14,000, with further funding from The ‘Its Time Foundation’.

Our funds have been allocated to the Bouma District School on Taveuni Island . The installation has been completed but is undergoing repairs following damage from Cyclone Winston in December.

Our Club has been invited to hear Rob Edwards speak about these projects at the Lindfield





Club on a date to be fixed in August. It is likely that a further application will be made for a Global Grant for other schools.

### **Laos Water Project**

Our guest speaker at our meeting on 17 November 2015 for Rotary Foundation month was PP Charlie Barnett from the Mosman Rotary Club.

Charlie gave us an overview of the programs of The Rotary Foundation and District Foundation and an excellent account of his experience over many years setting up and co-ordinating water and sanitation projects in South East Asia.

Of particular interest were his experiences with the Lao Water Project sponsored by RAWCS (Rotary Australia World Community Service) and funded by a RI Foundation Global Grant. The project was a joint effort by 5 North Shore Clubs: Mosman, Lindfield, Kuring-gai, Crows Nest, and Berowra Clubs and District 9685 as well as from 6 Clubs in WA and their District.

The project is now nearing completion having provided to date, for a budget of A\$81,000, thirteen reticulated potable water points for villages of very poor Lao ethnic minority people.

### **Annual Programs Fund**

This year the Club has made a contribution to the Annual Programs Fund of A\$4,000 (Our initial budgeted goal was A\$9,000). The reduced contribution was necessitated by the very significant reduction in this year's fundraising.

The Club this year has contributed a total of A\$6400 to the Annual fund from the Club contribution, members Centurion donations, and other donations. A very pleasing result in the circumstances of our reduced fundraising this year

### **Annual Fund Centurion Member Donations**

This year Club members have strongly supported the Centurion program by making tax deductible donations to the Annual Fund.

At the time of this report, 20 members have renewed or become Centurion members for this Rotary year by donating A\$100 each.

### **Polio**

This year the Club has made a contribution to the End Polio Now program of A\$ 1500 (Our initial budgeted goal was A\$6,000). As for the Annual Fund, the reduced contribution arose from the very significant reduction in this year's fundraising.

For every \$ raised by Rotary, the Gates Foundation contributes an additional \$2 making up our contribution to a total of \$4500.

### **Recognition of Paul Harris Fellows**

At the Changeover Dinner on 14 July 2015 District Governor Gina Growden presented Peter Bowden, Ian Garrard and Andrew Black with certificates of recognition as Paul Harris Fellows and Rob Brell with a Sapphire Pin . At a later meeting Past President Andrew presented Bob Warland with his certificate of recognition.

At the annual Club Changeover Dinner on 5 July 2016, The Club will again recognize a number of its members as Paul Harris Fellows.

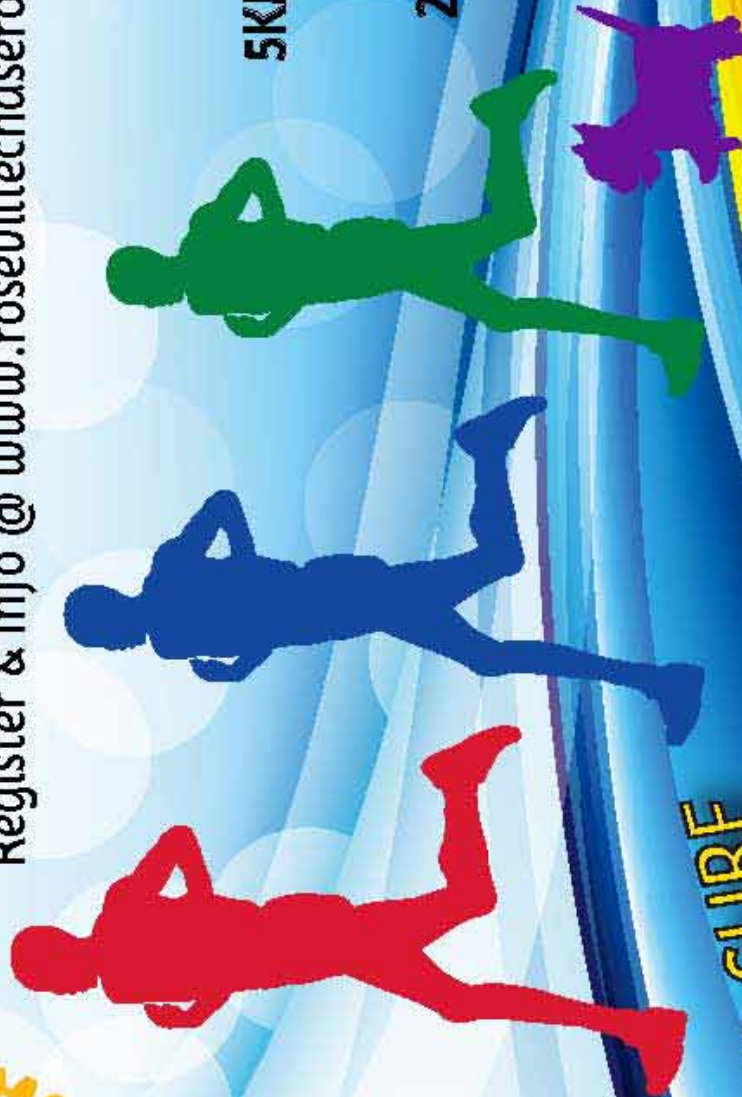

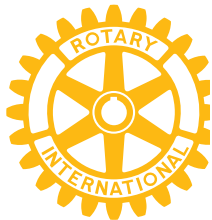

- FOURTH. The advancement of international understanding, goodwill, and peace through a world fellowship of business and professional persons united in the ideal of service.

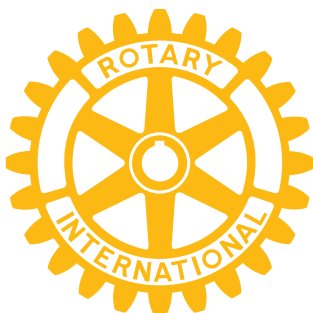
