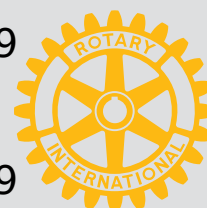

MEETING 23rd OCTOBER 2018 ORGAN AND TISSUE DONATION GUEST SPEAKER– PROFESSOR PHILIP O’CONNELL

Previous Dinner Bulletins have carried the story of a kidney organ donation to the grandson of Maurie and De Stack, from Taree.

As a former District Governor, Maurie is seeking to mobilise all Rotary Clubs in Australia to urge families to register and discuss their organ and tissue donation decisions to help save more lives.

We are very fortunate to have Professor O’Connell as our Guest Speaker, an international expert on organ transplant research and on the critical need for organ and tissue donations. More than 1,500 Australians are currently awaiting transplant treatment.

Professor O’Connell is a Professor of Medicine at the University of Sydney, Director of Transplantation at Westmead Hospital and a founding Director of the Centre for Transplant and Renal Research at the Westmead Institute of Medical Research.

Professor O’Connell is a Past President of the international professional body - The Transplantation Society and was a guest speaker at the Rotary International Convention in Seoul in May 2016.

He was a member of the Australian Government Organ Donor Task Force that recommended the establishment of the Australian Organ and Tissue Authority to oversee organ donation in Australia. He is committed to the establishment of ethical solutions to the world wide organ shortage.

This is an ideal opportunity for us, our families and friends to hear what we need to know about making a decision that may help save more lives.

Please bring as many visitors as you can to give this important speaker a strong audience. Let Avis or Neil know if you intend to bring guests as soon as you can so that we can have an early gauge of numbers.

We have informed many Clubs in the District of Professor O’Connell’s evening and invited their members, partners and friends to attend out meeting. For catering purposes, heir attendance numbers must be received by FRIDAY 19 OCTOBER, 2018.

Notice calling for Proposed Resolutions and Proposed
New Institute Committee(s)

Resolved that this Conference urges Australian District Governors on an ongoing basis to encourage their clubs to promote DonateLife Week each year including the issue of a press release to their local media.

Further resolved that this Conference set up a committee with the terms of reference and membership below.

Reason for Proposed Resolution

The Organ and Tissue Authority (OTA) leads the implementation of the Australian Government's national program for increasing organ and tissue donation for transplantation.

1 organ & tissue donor can save and transform the lives of many people. With around 1,400 Australians waitlisted for a life-saving transplant at any one time, and a further 11,000 people on dialysis, the generous act of organ and tissue donation has a far reaching effect, changing the lives of both transplant recipients and their families.

Under the national program introduced in 2009, Australia has doubled the number of organ donors & increased the number of transplant recipients by 75%; however, our consent rate has remained stable at around 60%.

Lifting our national consent rate is fundamental to saving more lives through transplantation. This can be achieved by increasing the number of people on the Australian Organ Donor Register and the number of families who know each other's donation decision.

Registration has a direct influence on higher consent rates. 90% of families agree to donation when their loved one is a registered donor. The consent rate drops to 44% when the deceased is not a registered donor and the family has no prior knowledge of their wishes.

Currently 1 in 3 Australians has joined the Register. Rotary has an opportunity to partner with the OTA to encourage more Australians to register to save lives.

To optimise every potential organ and tissue donation, **DonateLife Week**, at end of July each year aims to encourage Australians to join the Australian Organ Donor Register and to share their decision with loved ones.

The strength of the proposal is that it:



- costs Rotary nothing
- simply involves
 - o the DG passing on the press release and at his or her option included reference to it in PETS/district assemblies
 - o the club president including his or her name and the club name in front of a suggested quotation and then emailing the press release to the local media
- provides great media coverage right across Australia for Rotary
- will save lives by increasing organ donation rates in Australia.

Effect of Proposed Resolution

We have Rotary clubs in most communities throughout Australia. By those clubs issuing a Press Release prepared each year by the proposed committee, we can greatly increase the reach of DonateLife Week.

We can thus help to change the lives of those who are waiting desperately for a transplant, whilst enhancing our own national image.

Preparation of annual Press Release for issue to local media by Rotary Clubs in Australia prior to DonateLife week each year; liaison with DG's for the distribution of that Press Release amongst their clubs; promotion of any other activities during DonateLife week as seem appropriate.

1 PDG; 1 rep of the DG's; 1 rep of the DGE's; 1 rep of the DGN's; 1 rep of the Organ & Tissue Authority

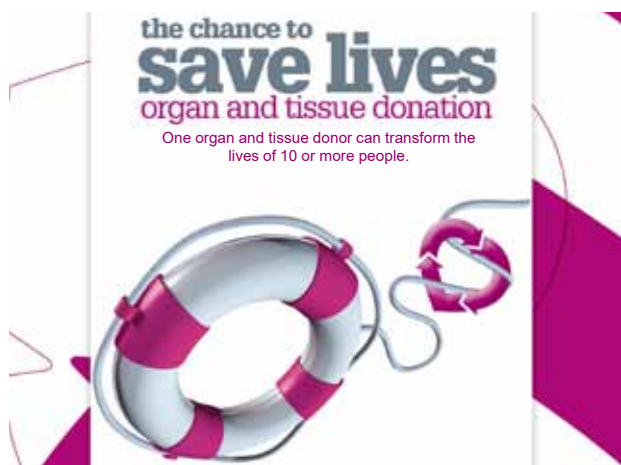

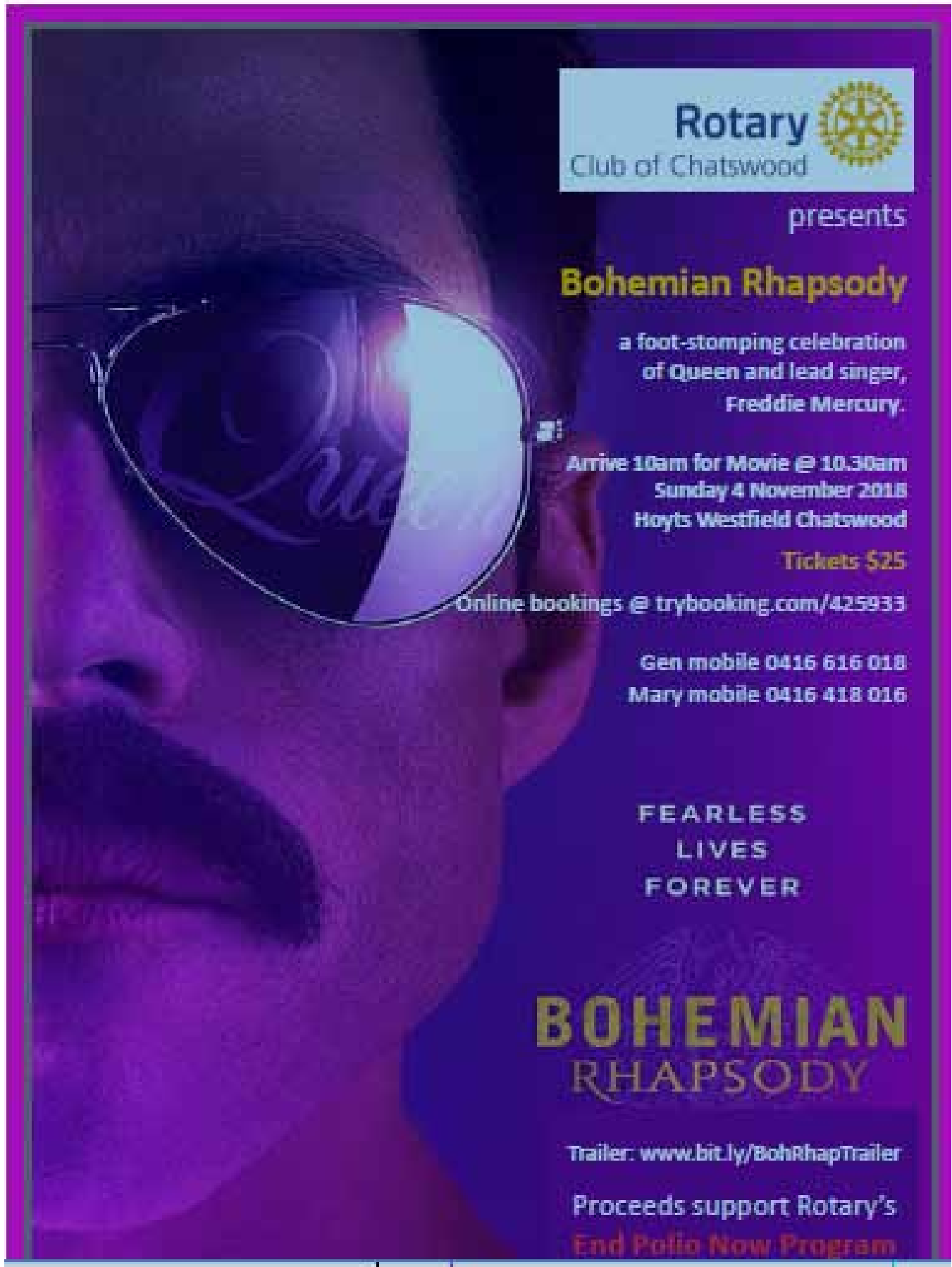

CROMEhurst SPECIAL SCHOOL ASSISTANCE WITH SCOUT JAMBOREE - ADELAIDE

Elyse Lenehan, is a university student and a Rover who assists the Cromehurst Scout Group. The Group is planning to attend a Scout Jamboree in Adelaide. At the last Board meeting the Board agreed to donate \$200 towards the cost of 4 scouts and Elyse's attendance at the Jamboree with the Group, .

Following is a short article contributed by Elyse about the Scout group.

1st Cromehurst Scout Group (Motto: Unica et progressus – Unique and going forward) is a special needs scout group, catering towards medium and high functioning youth with disabilities. Cromehurst members range from 16 to early 30s and participate in a modified version of the Scouts Australia programme.

Cromehurst aims to develop the social skills and independence of the scouts, with the members being supported through the activities. In 2019, Cromehurst is expanding to include a Venturer unit, to enable some of the members to continue to work towards their goals. Many of the members have been with Cromehurst for years, and the creation of a venturer unit allows these members to continue with the scouting movement, whilst providing them with the support of 1st Cromehurst. The members of 1st Cromehurst participate in a range of activities catered to the needs of the individual scouts. Examples of activities include; water activities, short, medium and long-distance hikes, camp craft (tent care, basic camp skills etc) and often attends various camps..



ROTARY YOUTH LEADERSHIP AWARDS (RYLA) CALL FOR NOMINATIONS
