Introduction of Will - Peter McKeown

Will Rogers will tell of his & Louise's recent experience working as a BlazeAid volunteers at BlazeAid camp in Tooma in the Snowy Mountains. Later they went back to Batlow for a month to help with the Hazelnut harvest on a farm that suffered major losses in the horrible New Years Dunns Road Fire.



BlazeAid – a volunteer-based organisation that works with families and individuals in rural Australia after natural disasters such as fires and floods.

Working alongside the rural families, our volunteers help to rebuild fences and other structures that have been damaged or destroyed.

Equally important, volunteers also help to lift the spirits of people who are often facing their second or third flood event after years of drought, or devastating losses through bushfires.

BlazeAid volunteers work in a disaster-affected area for many months, not only helping individuals and families, but also helping rebuild the local communities.

CRAIG AND BINDI'S ACCOUNT OF THE BUSHFIRE ATTACKS!



Not once, not twice, it was three damn times from different directions! It's over a week since burnt leaves starting falling on the farm (west of Batlow) from the Dunns Road Fire.

Dec 30th: We started watching the blaze heading our way from the west, seeing the flames race up Kendall's Fire Lookout during the night. Like many thunderstorms we have watched over the years though, the fire took a turn and headed off to our south. We kept an eye on it until nearly 4am and were later to find out this first threat to us ripped through Laurel Hill.

Dec 31: About 3.00 pm on New Years Eve under a strong south west wind the flames roared over the planted pine hill across the road and jump Lower Bago Road into our place. We always predicted this would be the direction a nasty fire came from and it did with much ferocity. The fire was hot and all consuming but we kept to our fire plan and stopped it progressing too far into our hazelnut orchard or entering the sheds. We enacted our fire plan with 50% of the farm burnt to some degree. The swirling winds knocked many nuts off trees across the farm this day.

5th Jan: Fast forward five days and we weren't quite expecting this mongrel fire to then come at us again. This time from the north at 2am. This was the fire that burnt through Batlow on the Saturday and we weren't quite expecting anything to happen to us ~10km away, thinking the fire had moved on, but no. It's like it came back for a final strike to see if we we're being complacent but we were up watching. It reignited mature pine to our north on Greenhills Road that had already burnt a few days earlier but only in the blackberry understorey. The fire raced across the crowns in a couple of minutes. Even though it was 500 metres away the sky lit up and we could hear it roaring.



So, for a third time we were under threat, ready for ember attack as it was unlikely to burn through the neighbours orchard and ploughed paddock. We still think if we hadn't been here the fire would have crept through the mown grass up the gentle slope until it found something combustible to burn like our native shrubs and sheds.

Fortunately we dodged a bullet like the first fire threat but it's only today (Jan 7) after a shower of rain and cooler weather we can wind down a bit. This evening it was a chance to also have a good look over the farm and be grateful that we didn't get wiped out when so many have lost more.

Ember attacks started many grass fires through the orchard, No water as poly pipe melted. Fences burnt, neighbours hungry cattle foraging in our orchard

LAST MEETING 12 MAY - MARTIN ROGERS. HOW I BUILT MY COBRA REPLICA SPORTS CAR

Sixteen members, plus former member and past president Will Rogers and partners Janette Kay and Lori Farrar, listened to a very interesting and sometimes incredible address by Martin Rogers, about the COBRA replica sports car he has built.

Martin is a man who likes the challenge of building things.

His finished COBRA product has been created from using the parts from a “donor car”, a Commodore V6 purchased at an NRMA auction, Ford and other wrecked cars, found in car wrecker’s yards.

There are 2 categories of COBRA cars followed by different designers and builders - the genuine, where accuracy is paramount and expensive, to replicas like Martin’s. There are “Kit Manufacturers” including professional welders, painters, fibreglass manufacturers to create the shell to fit the chassis and specific part producers which Martin used, to create his COBRA.

There were several modifications made to the “donor car” parts to create the chassis and the installation of 4 computers in the car (which all “talk” to each other); 1 for the engine, 1 for the gearbox, 1 for the ABS braking system and 1 for body control.

Building his car took 3 years from completion of design details required for compliance with ADRS specifications, to testing for compliance, insurance and registration for on-the-road.

Despite the use of donor car parts, its the shape which makes it a COBRA.

CHATSWOOD ROSEVILLE ROTARY CLUB NEWS

ANNUAL MEMBERSHIP DUES - 2020/2021.

The Provisional Board of the merged club has met and adopted the following resolution for submission to both clubs;

“Resolved to recommend that the Club set the annual membership fees for 2020-2021 at \$300 payable as a first instalment of \$150 on 1 July 2020 by no later than 31 July 2020 and as a second instalment of \$150 payable on 1 January 2021 by no later than 31 January 2021.”

The new by-laws require the annual membership dues to be adopted by the Clubs. Accordingly, as previously agreed by both clubs, Ross Symons, as Returning Officer, within the coming week, will conduct an electronic ballot of the current members of both clubs, to vote on the Board recommendation.

The proposed dues represent a reduction of \$40 over the current Roseville Chase dues of \$340.

WATER AND SANITATION HYGIENE PROJECT OLOKASA SCHOOL OSSU TMOR- LESTE

Chatswood Rotary Club has been working with Willoughby Friends of Ossu (a Willoughby Council supported local community group) on a project to provide much needed functional sanitation at Olokasa School.

The project will include provision of toilets and washing facilities with education of students in personal hygiene management.

After initially approaching our Club to join in a Foundation Global Grant application, Chatswood RC proposes to scale back the project funding to an initial A\$12,000 and will now apply for A\$6,000 through a Foundation District Grant which must be lodged by the end of this month. **31 May 2020.**

Chatswood RC has set aside A\$5,000 as its Club donation.

At its Zoom Board meeting last Tuesday 19 May, our Board has agreed to contribute A\$1,000 for this project to make up the necessary Club funds of A\$6,000 for the lodgement of the application.

Our contribution will be transferred to the merged Club- Chatswood Roseville RC -after 1 July as part of the funds remaining in our Charities Account on 30 June 2020.

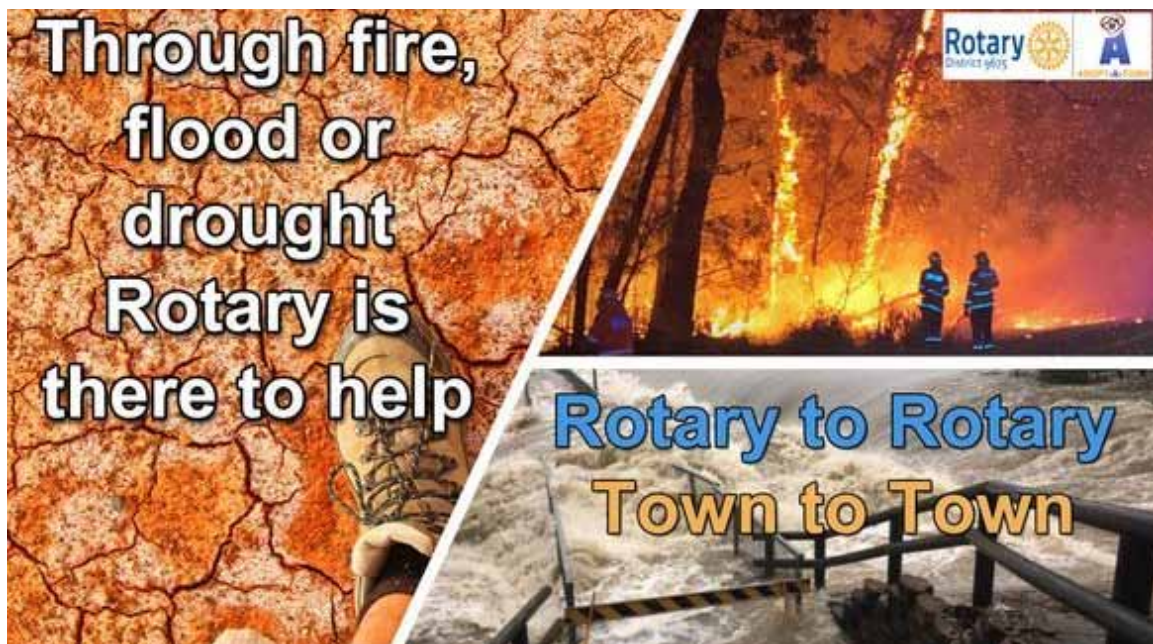
