## Bhineka Tunggal Ika





"Bhinneka Tunggal Ika" phrase acknowledges that although the people

## Christmas in Indonesia

Christmas or "Natal" is celebrated by the majority of Christians in Indonesia.

Like all children

around the world, all of our children who live at Salvation Army children homes start to get excited in the lead up to this special season.

They all know that December means Christmas and there will be a lot of fun, events and guests coming to their home. Christmas also means holiday time, time to break from their



school and normal routine and time where some of them can go home to their beloved families

and spend the special season with them.

The children's homes have a full diary, with momentum starting to build in the middle of November. The Children are fully involved in a series of Christmas events held in every

Salvation Army institution within their locality. They love to sing, dance and play musical instruments. For some they are also invited to hotels and restaurants to perform and to enjoy fellowship with others, usually including food.



For the children who remain in the Childrens Home, they will receive a lot of local guests coming to celebrate Christmas with them. Not only that, but because of the school holidays (2 to 3 weeks), it means they have a break from their usual schedule and more time to themselves or to choose activities such as additional play time and fun.

Christmas Day meetings in The Salvation Army Indonesia commence early (not unusual to be at 5 am!) All the



children will attend this meeting and celebrate Christmas with their

church family.

This year with the amount of sponsorship monies received we plan to send additional money to enable each home manager to purchase an individual gift for each child in their care, appropriate to the childs age and character. If money permits we also encourage the homes to provide more leisure activities and treats across the school holiday period to celebrate the season of Jesus birth, and to create a family festive atmosphere. These special treats are identified through suggestions from the children.
