Rotary Club Xanten (Germany)

Their club, in district 1870 was chartered in 2004 and meets twice a month on Tuesday evenings and another twice on Wednesday evenings at a restaurant at Hotel van Bebber in Xanten. They have 42 members. Their club motto is "You can, because you should". Their focus is on friendship, togetherness and the Rotary motto that unites all members: "Those who serve others also

win for themselves."

With funds they raise from selling waffles, spekulatius biscuits and popcorn, along with their "Lucky" wooden eggs, they support elementary education in Bely—a rural village in Sierra Leone. More recently they have worked with other organisations to help set up a vocational school in neighbouring Mathen,

GUEST SPEAKER: DIANNE REED

Club member Dianne gave us an interesting insight into her "transition to retirement". Upon nearing retiring age from her Education Department job, she found out that unless teachers have something to do in retirement, they are often dead with 18 months. Having not long been married, she wanted more time with her husband than 18 months so when the opportunity arose for her to become a Thermomix Consultant she quickly snapped it up. She has been consulting for a number of years and a number of machines, including the TM31, TM5 and TM6 and is awaiting the arrival of the latest machine—the TM7 in about August this year.

The role of the consultant is to teach new owners how to get the most out of their Thermomix so they get great value for money when they purchase their machine.

She demonstrated how easy it is to make pizza dough using the TM6 that she brought along with her. By using the machine to make pizza dough it saves you at least 18 minutes over doing it by hand. Several members got to take a piece of the pizza dough home with them so they can have pizza some time this week.



Thermomix is sold by Vorwerk, a Germany based family owned business which has been around since the 1880's. The company's focus on using a direct selling method, so to see what the Thermomix can do you need to contact a consultant. If you don't already have one, talk to Dianne if you are interested to know more about the TM6 or TM7.
