- Our club was located in District 245
- Membership that first year was 28
- Norm Bell was announced as the incoming DGN for 1970-
- Gren Courtland was Community Services Director
- Widge Wyatt was the first Club President
- Norm Bell and Duggan Anderson were the programme coordinators that year.
- The annual subscription for the Bulletin was 20c
- They met weekly at lunchtimes at the Rendezvous Room, Rivervale Hotel.
- Half yearly subs were \$10.00
- They enjoyed a number of guest speakers at their meetings
- The annual conference was held in March and opened by Gough Whitlam MP
- At one meeting in May they had 22 visitors attend
- Some 317 Rotarians and guests attended the Charter

Night which was held at the Subiaco Civic Centre—formal attire requested.
