Tickets are slower at this point than in previous years but so far we have sold tickets as far away as Singapore and Melbourne!

Within Western Australia, tickets have been bought in Karratha, Geraldton and Gin Gin, Boulder, York, Esperance, Busselton and Bunbury. But of course, most sales are from Perth so please keep putting out our Bricktober posters and brochures.

# Club Forum

In order to remain a vibrant, viable club we need to attract new members to rein in our falling membership. Our club is aging with many members now over the age of 70 and more than half are retired and frequently away travelling. Health issues have played a factor too. Membership currently stands at 25 but we have seen as few as 9 attending some recent meetings. For a number of reasons, social events and committee meetings have also fallen off too suggesting our current meeting schedule is onerous in today's hectic world, even to our current members.

It's been long identified that a barrier to attracting younger members is the commitment to 4-5 weekly meetings per month and then having additional meetings for Board and project / committee members. As a result, a proposal was put forward by the Club Services Committee for discussion to trial a reduced schedule of meetings for a four month period from January until April 2018.

The proposal was for Meetings to be reduced to two Club meetings per month and one social meeting, with no meeting held on the first Tuesday of each month as these often follow a public holiday which results in low attendance anyway.

- 2<sup>nd</sup> Tuesday - Club Meeting at Belmont Forum
- 3<sup>rd</sup> Tuesday - Social Meeting
- 4<sup>th</sup> Tuesday - Club Meeting at Belmont Forum
- 5<sup>th</sup> Tuesday (if applicable) - Social Meeting



The importance of social interaction and the involvement of our partners are so important to the health of any club so it was proposed that social events be clearly scheduled and not just ad hoc. Joanna suggested a Facebook "Event" could be created to attract young prospective members so they can get to know us in a more relaxed environment. Mike suggested social meetings may also be used as "working" events. This could include physically doing something in or for our community like packing bags or planting trees etc.

Glenys spoke of the importance of everyone being involved in our major events and that new members need to be made more aware of what is required of them. The success of any event requires 100% commitment and we can't just assume everyone knows what is going on, particularly new members.

It was suggested we have only one guest speaker each month and the other meeting be dedicated to a general discussion of the topic of the day, like the Club's current major project so that everyone can become meaningfully involved and Gren suggested projects should be spaced out with no overlapping.

Discussions also included how future Club meetings should be run, by whom and what they would include. This involved whether we still eat breakfast, have the traditional toasts to Queen and Country or a Sergeants session etc. Gren felt strongly that the President should continue to run the meetings and Colin said he'd like to retain the traditional meetings format but that we need to do things better. Further discussions will take place over future months as ideas and agreements evolve.

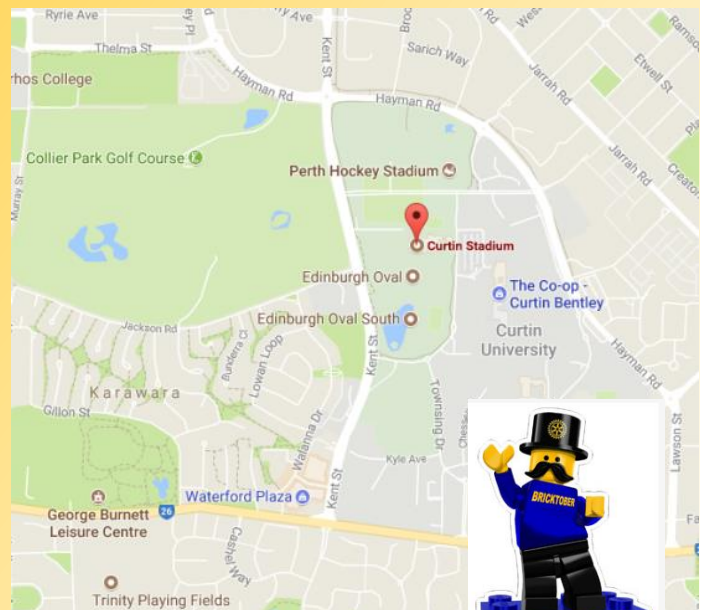
## WHY DO WE DO IT?
