Colin Peacock Land of Contrast

Colin and Judy recently returned from a trip to Jordan and Israel but began with an Avalon cruise from Budapest to Amsterdam, travelling down the Danube into the Mainz and Rhine Rivers. He told us about the boat they were on and its 3 levels - a lower one which is sometimes submerged to get the boat lower into the water to get under the many low bridges, the main deck and an upper deck which is also sometimes modified because of the bridges. Before setting off, they spent a few days in the capital of Hungary, Budapest where Buda is on one side of the Danube and Pest on the other.

En route down the river they passed many UNESCO listed towns and Colin remarked on the castle where Richard the Lionheart was imprisoned on his return from the Crusades and that his ransom cost the English Crown the equivalent of about one third of their wealth at the time.

Generally travelling at night, the boat tied up during the day so they enjoyed sightseeing tours of each of the places they docked. There were lots of castles dotted along the banks of the river, including Cologne Cathedral which surprisingly was not touched in the WWII Allied bombings of Germany, and the closer they got to Amsterdam the more freight barges they saw.



Their cruise ended in Amsterdam and while there they did a canal boat tour and saw some interesting sights. Many of the old waterfront warehouses have now been converted into apartments and with so many bikes in Amsterdam they now have double and triple decker bike parking bays for them. Interestingly, they also saw a lot of cannabis products on sale including a drink, chocolates, and lollipops.

They then flew via Frankfurt to Oman in Jordan which was bigger than they expected. There was a lot of rubbish around the place and while in Europe everything had been lush and green, here it was a desert. They took a tour with about 45 people, mostly from Perth but a few from the eastern states and USA and went to Petra and saw the Treasury before heading on to Wadi Rum where they ate in a Bedouin Tent and noted the camels seem to be smaller than ours. Colin remarked it seems that the area is now paying the price for decisions made by Lawrence of Arabia and his colleagues in defeating the Ottoman Empire and splitting the region up.

A trip to the area would not be complete without a dip in the Dead Sea where, due to the high salt content, you float very high in the water and Colin found it so difficult to get his feet back down that he needed Judy's help to get him upright again! They also visited Masada which overlooks the Dead Sea. Accessible via a chairlift, Masada is an old fortress on the top of a mesa and the site of an early mass suicide in which 900 Jewish people died rather than be taken by the attacking Romans.


They also went to Jerusalem where they got to see the Wailing Wall which is very sacred to the Jews and visiting men are expected to don the small cap. Once not permitted, a separate women's section has been recently opened. Colin presented a timeline of Israel's history which showed the different groups who had been 'in charge' of these lands including the Romans, Bysantine, Arabs, Crusaders, Mamlocks, Ottomans and the British until in 1948 they became their own nation of Israel.

On a Sea of Galilee tour they saw that the fresh water was being taken from the sea to irrigate the local land, turning the deserts green. Many ruins around the Mediterranean Sea are being dug up to better understand history and this research is proving the old stories of the Bible, with the Old Testament showing the history of the Jewish people.

They also visited the Golan Heights and while in Israel they were surprised to see that the Palestinians and the Jews were actually living and intermingling much more than they had thought. Although they live in zones, they can easily move between these. However Colin did say that the whole area is like a tinderbox with armed army personnel wandering around and even the hotel bellboy had a holstered revolver.

In concluding, Mike Bermann suggested that anyone going to Israel needs different and balanced perspectives of the situation and suggested hiring an Israeli guide one day and a Christian guide the next to which Colin added they had both a Jordanian guide and an Israeli and their bus driver also provided his perspective too.


