Aidan Wood Recent trip to Vietnam

Aidan and his wife Tania recently completed a 14 day tour of Vietnam and found it to be one of the most friendly countries in Asia. Aidan said that despite it being in parts, a 3rd world country that is now becoming quite commercialised, it is very picturesque and much cleaner than most other countries of Asia.

Their travels started in Hanoi where he said the real estate in the old town is twice the price of that in New York. Consequently, houses are built on narrow blocks and are built up to accommodate growing families of often 3 or 4 generations. The city is busy and loud, highly populated and, as in much of Asia, bikes and scooters dominate the roads. Their experiences in the capital included a visit to see the Water Puppets, a visual show that incorporated many of the cultural stories of Vietnam.

Ha Long Bay is a scenic World Heritage site that covers 1500sq klms with thousands of limestone islets and is very popular with tourists. As many as 300-400 tourist-filled boats can be on the water at one time but Aidan said they are well coordinated, comfortable and the food is good so they enjoyed an overnight cruise that allowed them to experience the spectacular views the bay offers.

An overnight "sleeper" bus then took them to Sa Pa in the mountains to the north-west. Aidan said the coach had a row of bunk beds, two high, on each side of the bus that accommodated about 40 people. He said it was "the" way to travel but although very comfortable, Aidan didn't sleep so was able to enjoy the scenery of rugged mountains and very green fields of what he thought looked like marijuana. Once there, their tour guide, who accompanied them on the first of two half-day treks, confirmed the crop was indeed hemp but it was mainly used for making clothing. The area is mountainous and culturally diverse and the newer part of Sa Pa town didn't exist ten years ago but has been built to cater for tourists who flock to the "alps of Vietnam" to trek. Aidan said



their second trek, of 13 klms, was down through spectacular scenery to the village of Cat Cat where they were introduced to subsistence farming, hemp growing and cloth making, rice harvesting and local dances and added that the many ethnic groups, the H'mong being the largest, appear to live in harmony and are happy to stick to their village life.

Their experience of an overnight train trip from Hanoi to Da Nang in a "sleeper" carriage was quite different to the overnight bus trip to Sa Pa and back as there were three changes of passengers in the other two beds in their compartment during the night! However, their next destination of the ancient city of Hoi An was one of Aidan's favourites of their trip. The UNESCO World Heritage village dates back to the 15th century and is a blend of many cultures and home to well-preserved buildings and historic bridges. Aidan and Tania enjoyed several days exploring the old town on foot, checking out its local food markets, eating the local food and riding bikes through paddy fields and little villages away from the tourists.

They also visited the former capital, Hue on the "Perfume River" and Aidan noted that with its warm and humid conditions he was pleased to find Vietnam, perhaps because it was cleaner, was not generally as "perfumed" as most of Asia. Finally a visit to Ho Chi Minh City left Aidan's head spinning as it was just so busy and he said there were people everywhere! Thanks Aidan for sharing some of your travel experiences with us.
