Natalie Wong RAC WA

If you thought our local Automobile Club was just there just to help us when our car breaks down or to cover our vehicle insurance, you'd be very wrong. Natalie, from RAC WA's Community Education centre, gave us a run-down this week on many of their innovative ideas that aim to keep us safer on our roads.

Natalie travels around WA speaking at schools and at community groups like ours and told us about some of their programs like

ⓒ *bstreetsmart* where speakers and a life-like car crash reenactment are aimed at educating youth about to get P plates or their licence.

ⓒ *Elephants in the Wheatbelt* where, in WA's highest fatality region, life-sized elephants have been built from crashed cars to get people talking about road safety.

② *Paraplegic Benefit Fund* that shows the consequences of crashes and encourages better decision making behind the wheel.

A staggering 1.9 million people are killed on the world's roads each year so in 2011 the United Nations General Assembly proclaimed "A Decade of Action", an initiative designed to stabilise or reduce the global road toll and save the lives of 5 million people over the ten years. But Natalie told us WA's road toll rose last year to 195, the highest it's been since 2008 so there is still a long way to go.

RAC is promoting a four point program of *Safer Speeds, Safer Roads, Safer Road Users* and *Safer Vehicles*. Natalie told us about more sophisticated red light and speed cameras now being utilised to reduce speeding. These include average speed cameras where your travel time is calculated between two cameras and a hand held camera which can see up to 700 metres ahead to not only check speed but drivers using their phones or seatbelts not being worn.

Programs like *Black Spot, Road to Recovery* and *Risky Roads* highlight roads and roadsides that require funding for their improvement. But they compete with future requirements as a Congestion Survey has recently predicted 1 million extra vehicles will be on our roads by 2020 and the cost of that congestion will reach \$1.2 billion.

Natalie reminded us all of the "2 second rule" for estimating safe following distances but said more is better. She said 62% of motorists surveyed recently said the focus should be on making drivers safer and programs now include cycle safety and that of pedestrians and motor cyclists.

She said the RAC advocates driving only 4 or 5 star vehicles noting you are twice more likely to be killed in a 1 star vehicle. They are proactive in developing safer vehicles and are trialling automated vehicles which are predicted to be the way of the future. Natalie suggested we can take a ride in the RAC IntelliBus, their driverless bus on its trial at South Perth, for a look at the future.

World President Ian H. S. Riseley

Ian H.S. Riseley, of the Rotary Club of Sandringham, Victoria, Australia, is a chartered accountant and principal of Ian Riseley and Co., which specializes in income tax and management advice for individuals and small businesses and has a strong interest in international affairs. Prior to starting his business in 1976, Ian worked in the audit and management consulting divisions of large accounting firms and corporations. He has a master's degree in taxation law and graduate diplomas in accounting and income tax.

A Rotarian since 1978 Ian has served Rotary as treasurer, director, trustee, RI Board Executive Committee member, task force member, committee member and chair, and district governor.

Ian has been a member of the boards of both a private and public school, a member of the Community Advisory Group for the City of Sandringham, and involved in Sea Scouts and sporting groups, as well as honorary auditor or advisor for a number of charitable organisations. He is also a former member of the Australian Polio Eradication Private Sector Campaign.

Ian's honours include the AusAID Peacebuilder Award from the Australian government in 2002 in recognition of his work in Timor-Leste, the Medal of the Order of Australia in 2006 for service to the Australian community, and the Distinguished Service Award and the Regional Service Award for a Polio-Free World from the Rotary Foundation.

In 2016, Ian accepted an invitation to become the Patron of Australian Golfing Fellowship of Rotarians Inc., the golf tournament that the Rotary Club of Ascot was pleased to host in Perth in April of this year. Although Ian was unable to attend the tournament his well wishes for its success were well received.

Ian and his wife, Juliet, a past district governor, are Multiple Paul Harris Fellows and Major Donors and Bequest Society members of The Rotary Foundation. They live on seven hectares at Moorooduc, where they practice their personal philosophy of sustainable and organic living. They have two children and four grandchildren.



Ian's Theme for 2017-18 is Rotary: Making a Difference, and he said "Whether we're building a new playground or a new school, improving medical care or sanitation, training conflict mediators or midwives, we know that the work we do will change people's lives - in ways large and small - for the better."

An interesting article appeared in July's **Rotary Down Under**.

The Rotary Club of Uralla, NSW, had a membership of 13 and was struggling to stay alive. Desperate, they implemented a series of radical changes and produced a staggering 300 per cent increase in membership growth. Now 40 members strong and growing, the club has a bright future thanks to their reinvention.

The Club dispensed with the weekly meal, replaced it with a one-hour fortnightly meeting followed by a meal for those who can make it. They varied the restaurant too so that several local businesses benefitted.

One of the biggest barriers to membership, especially among younger people today, is the "Baggage" offered at Rotary Meetings.

Rotarians who have grown up with the traditions of club meetings that date back to the last century may feel comfortable with the routines and fellowship. However, younger business and community leaders are used to a much faster pace of life and find all these traditions and attitudes a barrier to their genuine interest in Doing Good in the World.

Invocation, toasts, presidential chains, top tables, sergeants, fines sessions, national anthems and uninspired speakers are not part of the meeting culture these people are used to. Instead they want meetings with purpose and agendas where decisions are taken.

So they changed to meet the needs of a new generation of Rotarians and succeeded in rejuvenating their club.



Mike replied, "Yes, maybe but it's important Ann sees what a man looks like after he's given up drinking and golf!"


