History of Belmont

As the Local History Curator for the City of Belmont's Museum, Bridget told us this week that the history of the Belmont area dates back thousands of years to the Noongar aboriginal people who called it Goorgyp, meaning "cold place", when much of it was then low lying swamp land. She told us the first recorded Europeans to make contact with the area were the French who mapped our Swan River in 1801 during the Baudin expedition aboard "Le Géographe".

Today the City of Belmont covers a large area and includes the suburbs of Ascot, Redcliffe, Belmont, Cloverdale, Kewdale, Newburn, Red Gum Forrest and Rivervale, and includes Perth airport and Ascot Racecourse, after which our club is named. Horse racing has been very much a part of the district from its earliest years with many stables in existence then and today many local streets are named after horses and racing identities. Others streets are named after those in other cities, such as Orrong Road named from a street naming theme in Melbourne, and other are named after local families.

Pottery was another important industry in the area's early days and our own member Gren Courtland's family was a significant part of Belmont's history from 1903 when Gren's grandfather started the family business, Courtland Pottery, which then continued over three generations until 1996 when Gren retired.

Our past member Norm Bell was also honoured for his part in Belmont's history. Norm started Altona Hatchery in 1942 and it played an important part in another industry dominant in Belmont's past, when chicken farming was forced out of Perth and many moved into the Belmont area. Bridget also mentioned Tomato Lake as part of the chicken farming industry as it was named after the tomatoes grown on it by a local poultry farmer for chicken feed.

Member Fred Rae was also noted as a significant part of Belmont's history, being Belmont's Mayor for 10 years (Belmont Shire Mayor 1977-1979 and the City of Belmont's first Mayor 1979-1987) and Rae Gardens are named after him.

Belmont Museum is currently temporarily located in Belmont's Public Library in Faulkner Park ahead of the development of a new three-storey community centre. The Library is named after another significant local identity, Ruth Faulkner, who in 1968 became the first woman elected to the Shire of Belmont and became Deputy Shire President during her term. Bridget told us Ruth's son, Dave Faulkner, is one of Belmont's best known sons. He is the singer-songwriter, guitarist member of the rock group Hoodoo Gurus.

On display at the Museum is a collection of five "Hampton Cheeses", large rounds of jarrah used to pave our roads in the 1860's. These were uncovered in a 20 metres stretch during the 2012 upgrade of Great Eastern Highway near Belmont Avenue and are named after Governor John Hampton. Although more were unearthed, most disintegrated during excavation and only five survived. Ian McLeod, who was responsible for the conservation of the "Batavia", helped to ensure their preservation and they were acquired by the City of Belmont for display.

The Museum is open Monday to Friday, 9am to 5pm and hosts visiting groups and holds special events and exhibitions. In addition they offer a large collection of on-line history and are currently running a Local History Photographic Competition. More information can be found at www.belmont.wa.gov.au/museum

Guiding principles

These principles have been developed over the years to provide Rotarians with a strong, common purpose and direction. They serve as a foundation for our relationships with each other and the action we take in the world.

Object of Rotary

The Object of Rotary is to encourage and foster the ideal of service as a basis of worthy enterprise and, in particular, to encourage and foster:

FIRST: The development of acquaintance as an opportunity for service;

SECOND: High ethical standards in business and professions; the recognition of the worthiness of all useful occupations; and the dignifying of each Rotarian's occupation as an opportunity to serve society;

THIRD: The application of the ideal of service in each Rotarian's personal, business, and community life;

FOURTH: The advancement of international understanding, goodwill, and peace through a world fellowship of business and professional persons united in the ideal of service.

The Four-Way Test

The Four-Way Test is a nonpartisan and nonsectarian ethical guide for Rotarians to use for their personal and professional relationships. The test has been translated into more than 100 languages, and Rotarians recite it at club meetings:

Of the things we think, say or do

1. Is it the TRUTH?
2. Is it FAIR to all concerned?
3. Will it build GOODWILL and BETTER FRIENDSHIPS?
4. Will it be BENEFICIAL to all concerned?



Avenues of Service



We channel our commitment to service at home and abroad through five Avenues of Service, which are the foundation of club activity.
