For over 100 years Rotarians have established the <u>Calgary Foundation</u> to play a key role in the development of the Children's Hospital, The Mount Royal University, Calgary Stampede and City Council.

The Club has also contributed to the Polio Plus Eradication programme.

<u>GUEST SPEAKER</u>

Our talk today was given by June Wade, Shelter Box Area Coordinator & ShelterBox Project Chair Rotary District 9465, who has been a supporter of ShelterBox since its inception.

ShelterBox was the idea of Tom Henderson of the Rotary Club of Helston Lizard in Cornwall England, after watching a disaster on the TV. It was adopted by the 40 members as their Millennium project. The ShelterBox headquarters is still in Cornwall. We are project partners with Rotary International

The ShelterBox is sent worldwide where there are natural disasters or conflicts. Contents can vary but generally include a tent, 10 sleeping bags, stainless steel cooking pots, plates, mugs and cutlery together with a bag of tools for fixing homes, a bag of

items for children, a Thirst Aid Station for water purification, Mosquito net and Solar lights. (Cost \$1000 delivered).

Volunteer ShelterBox Response Teams (SRT) undergo extensive training and go to countries around the world where the ShelterBox aid is distributed working with Rotary Clubs, the Scouts and other Non-Government Organisations to ensure the aid goes to the most needy.

Shelter Kits are an alternative option with items designed to help people repair their homes.

The aid is supported by donations from Rotary Clubs worldwide as well as the general public.
