Tyana Orlando

My experiences as Leader at the National Youth Science Forum 2021



This morning was not the first time we have heard from Tyana. She was sponsored by our club to attend the National Youth Science Forum in January 2020; and has previously spoken to us about that experience. Today she wanted to talk to us about the opportunity that came out of her attendance there. She was invited to return and take on one of the student staff leadership roles for the event run this year.

Since hearing from Tyana last time, she has finished her studies at Ursula Frayne and is now at the University of WA studying medicine. Tyana indicated that the NYSF she attended was indeed a life changing experience and has made her realise how much she enjoys the interaction between people. This has made her want to change somewhat the direction of her studies and her current aim is to get into Rural Medicine once she finishes her studies.

Due to Covid issues the format for the NYSF program had to be totally revamped for this year. Much of the training Tyana did was on line; but there were opportunities to do 'in-person' training as well. The programme for the students this year was very different from the one she went on just 12 months ago. This year's program was partly on line and partly in person. Her role was as a facilitator and chair of the Zoom meetings and question and answer sessions.

They also held 3 in-person days in 10 hubs around the country. Places where she supported the current students included at Curtin University; Murdoch University and Sci Tech. Her role during these visits was to engage the students socially and ensure the events went off well. She was also paired with another leader based in Queensland and they worked with a smaller group of 16 in a series of zoom meetings.

Tyana indicated that they faced a number of challenges; but that despite those they were able to run a successful hybrid model of NYSF. She learned that when faced with challenges you can still be inspired to achieve amazing things.

She has been accepted into the program again for next year to take on another leadership role. The aim for 2022 is to have a program that runs for 5 days on line and 5 days of 'in-person' activities.

Tyana finished by thanking the club for enabling her to have the initial experience which has grown into a passion for her.

Thank you Tyana for allowing us an insight into the work that you have done with the National Youth Science Forum program. We'd love to hear more from you after next year's experience.

We wish you well in your studies.

ROTARY INTERNATIONAL

Did you know:

- * That the reason Rotary is called by this name, was because during the first year members rotated their weekly club meetings between the offices of those involved.
- The first 'international' club was formed in Winnipeg, Canada.
- The name was changed to Rotary International in 1922 (some 17 years after the first meeting).
- Rotary has worked with the United Nations since it started in 1945.
- Rotary is open to business and professional leaders aged 18 and upwards, with no regard to economic status.
- * Rotary's biggest project so far is to eradicate Polio. Since beginning this project in 1985 Rotarians have contributed over \$US850 million and hundreds of thousands of volunteer-hours. Currently only Afghanistan and Pakistan are yet to have it eradicated.
