Tom Lambert introduced Analy High freshman <u>Alexis</u> <u>Trinei</u>, who will be going to France this summer as our club's short-term Youth Exchange student. After her return, Alexis and her family will host a student from France.



Yvette Williams van Aggelen introduced Analy sophomore <u>Sylvia Luna</u> and Sylvia's mom, <u>Monica Luna</u>. Sylvia will be the club's outbound student, leaving for France in August. The Luna family also brought tasty, home-made/packaged



desserts for sale after the meeting -- to help with travel expenses.



Elizabeth Fritzinger brought along the two men in her life, **Matt** and <u>Atticus</u>. She thanked the club for its mini-fundraiser for baby Atticus the previous week.



Prez Bob noted that the Learn-to-Swim program is in full swim(g), but could still use some adult help. He pointed out that the club is closing in on providing 10,000 youngsters with valuable skills over the 30-year history. To boost volunteer confidence, he shared that each adult helper is provided a laminated instruction sheet, guaranteed not to sink (and can be used as a flotation device in an emergency).



Gene Nelson had one last opportunity to plug the Saturday "Rebuilding Together" project. He struck a note with the curious when he mentioned that there are some 'interesting things' to deal with in the backyard of this year's rebuilding site. [No gold or other treasure but the crew managed to fill a huge dumpster and another large dump truck **–Ed**.] **President Bob** also reminded everyone about the District Conference, May 16-18, at the Doubletree in Rohnert Park. He noted that the club's water project may be one of the event's highlights. As a result of the District Conference, there will be no Friday (May 16) meeting. Members who do not attend the conference are expected to 'make up'.



West Sonoma County Schools superintendent **Keller McDonald** pointed out that this year there were some new guidelines for these awards -- one additional honored teacher and consideration of teachers at all grade levels. As in the past, each of the recipients receives \$1,000.

Lynn works with English language learners while creating and supporting efforts to make the school an inclusive community for all students. Mary Fitch, Twin Hills Charter School

Mary teaches eighth grade science and regularly makes this subject engaging and fun as well as educationally valuable. Mary is responsible for a number of school science events that....let off steam, fly through the air, make loud noises, expand boundaries and disappear! She makes science 'magical'.

Sasha Prosser, SunRidge Charter School

Her peers and administrator describe Sasha as someone who truly embodies the Rotary motto, "Service Above Self". Her lessons described as consistently creative, fun, and challenging. Another comment: "With everything her students do, they are always learning and practicing respect". One project this year was an exchange with Kashia School Native American students.

Note: **Sally Ewald** also thanked **Rick Williams** for donating the plant arrangements at each table.





Hoping to squeeze in some Rotary Business, **President Bob** took a giant leap of faith (without a parachute) in calling for action on (1) the District Governor selection process, (2) a Club By-law change and (3) the use of the club's emergency reserves. Despite his efforts, somehow the matters were not resolved amidst friendly debate, and several hand raisings and countings.

Frank and **Kathy Mayhew** introduced a program near-and-dear to their hearts, "Project Amigo". Actually, **Kathy** was able to wrestle the mic from Frank and let <u>Susan Hill</u> and <u>Ted</u> <u>Rose</u> talk about this remarkable project.

<u>Project Amigo</u> helps poor children in the Colima region of Mexico, providing programs that motivate them to stay in school, promoting literacy, and improving their access to higher education. The Amigo site includes housing for youth coming from long distances to take advantage of a wide variety of educational programs.

Project Amigo can also be very attractive to Rotarians based on (1) the opportunities available and (2) the success rates.

<u>Successes</u>: Working with families living in tough conditions, Amigo is able to reach children in life-improving ways. While just 39% of U.S. students and 5% of Mexican students who start college finish with a degree, 70% of the youngsters in the Amigo program who enter college finish with a degree. One such Amigo grad, <u>Dr. Conny Fonseca</u>, is a pediatric surgeon in Mexico where she is one of only four in the country.







<u>Opportunities For Rotarians and Others</u>: Project Amigo has plenty: (1) Literacy Service Weeks -- volunteers deliver books, listen to children read, give support, (2) annual Christmas Fiesta/Celebration of the Virgin of Guadalupe -- volunteers package gifts, mostly new clothing/shoes, for children during the holiday and help with celebrations/games, (3) teaching/tutoring in English, (4) supporting homework clubs, and (5) volunteers learn Spanish, taught by Amigo graduates/tutors (this is a three-week program).



<u>Ted Rose</u> was asked the question, "What's the cost for someone to help Project Amigo?" He noted that it is extremely affordable and guests/volunteers are put up in first-class housing during their stay.



Prez then rang the bell, ending the meeting at 1:30 p.m. Next week Rick Williams will emcee the Vocational Awards.

#33: Opportunities for Fellowship

Most Rotarians are successful professional and business executives because they hear opportunities knock and take advantage of them. Once a week, the opportunity for Rotary fellowship occurs at each club meeting, but not all members hear it knocking.

The weekly club meeting is a special privilege of Rotary membership. It provides the occasion to visit with fellow members, to meet visitors and new members, and to share your personal friendship with other members.

Rotary clubs that have a reputation for being "friendly clubs" usually follow a few simple steps. Members are encouraged to sit in a different seat or at a different table each week or to sit with a member they do not know as well as their longtime personal friends. Members are asked to invite new members or visitors to join their table and share the conversation around the table rather than merely eating in silence or talking privately to the person next to them. Rotarians also should make a special point of trying to get acquainted with all members of the club.

When Rotarians follow these easy steps, an entirely new opportunity for fellowship knocks each week. Soon, Rotarians realize that warm and personal friendship is the cornerstone of every great Rotary club.

And, by the way, Toowoomba meets every Monday at 1800 hours, Pondicherry on Wednesdays at 1930, and Recklinghausen on Mondays at 1900. Now, that's good to know!
