Either way, he sure has fun with it, and we're glad to help him through the process! But if you've done anything lately, start preparing yourself financially for the hit that may be coming!


The Raffle [AKA Rotarian Powered Slot Machine]

The Program Yvette Williams van Aggelen introduced us to Naomi Tickle, an interesting woman who is a world renowned face-reading expert. President of Face Language International, she was responsible for developing the Career and Personality Assessment Profile (CAPA). She has written books on the subject, the latest of which is called "What Makes People Tick – and Why". She has also developed several decks

The science of Face Reading or Physiognomy, the study of the face, has come down from Aristotle about 2,700 years ago. Along with Phrenology, a systemized study of the lumps and bumps of the head that was popular in the nineteenth century, and later the study of three body types, or somatotypes, all lead to the current profiles that were developed by a judge in Los Angeles in the 1930's. He observed the behavioral traits of people who appeared before him in court, and was fascinated by how much they

predicted aspects of a person's personality. The system he developed uses 68 traits, has an accuracy rating of over 90%, and is valid across all cultures. Judge Jones' system was applicable to jury selection, personal development, understanding children, and for career assessment.














The work has been shown to be an effective tool for understanding people, helping to determine a person's interests and potential. Additionally, its effectiveness and potential is a tool that works whether someone is a child or an old person. Naomi shared a couple of anecdotes of instances where she has "read" the person's interests. In some instances, she was able to "reveal" to the person something they knew about themselves but had squashed down, thinking it was not a worthwhile or practical thing to do.

There are many traits to look at, all of which together can provide a profile of a person's personality traits, talents and dreams.

The first trait is determined by the eyes, that of Tolerance. The width between the eyes was illustrated by a Rotarian, whose eyes are close set, detail oriented, somewhat serious, and they indicate a person who is good with details, but can get overwhelmed sometimes by the amount of detail they need to work with.



The "Analyst" trait is determined by the eyelids.... For this, Naomi chose a Rotarian and your humble Scribe, **Barbara Beedon**. This Rotarian's eyelids indicated that he is a person of action, a "low analytical" who likes to get to the bottom line, and just get on with it. By contrast, **Barbara** is a "high analytical" person, who loves to find out how and why something works. They like to research all aspects of a situation before making a decision. Lots of agreement there!

"Administrative" or "Service" traits are indicated by the nose. A convex or Aquiline nose, that points down, indicates the person is usually good at business, good at delegating. If the nose also points down, as does another Rotarian's nose, it indicates someone who wants to know what does it cost? Can I get it for less?

By contrast, a "Ski Jump" nose indicates someone generous, who volunteers for everything, is open and trusting, and wants to know how they can help. This was illustrated to a T by another special Rotarian! [and by Bob Hope! **–Scribe**]

"Thinking Style" is observed through the angle of a person's forehead. If it leans back, it's someone who is an objective thinker, someone who allows their automatic reactions take over, based on past experiences. In contrast, the vertical forehead of a sequential thinker (pointing out **Barbara** again) indicates someone very bright who likes to take in all the detail, and go over it all until it's clear. Once they understand all the pieces, they are clear and decisive. Sequential thinkers benefit from playing music while studying a topic.

Before concluding, Naomi shared her experience on the Sharon Osborne TV show. She was supposed to "read" Sharon, but concluded that she had had so much surgery, she would not get an accurate reading, so she read Sharon's dog instead!



Naomi's presentation was thought provoking and fun and she sold many of her books after the meeting, giving a "spot" reading to anyone who purchased a book!

### THE ABC's of Rotary

(Taken from "The ABCs of Rotary", a Rotary International publication originally prepared by Dr. Cliff Dochterman who was RI President in 1992-93)

#1: Definition of Rotary

How do you describe the organization called "Rotary"? There are so many characteristics of a Rotary club as well as the activities of a million Rotarians. There are the features of service, internationality, fellowship, service, classifications of each vocation, development of goodwill and world understanding, the emphasis of high ethical standards, concern for other people and many more.

In 1976 the Rotary International Board of Directors was interested in creating a concise definition of the fundamental aspects of Rotary. They turned to the three men who were then serving on Rotary's Public Relations Committee and requested that a one-sentence definition of Rotary be prepared. After numerous drafts, the committee presented this definition, which has been used ever since in various Rotary publications:

"Rotary is an organization of business and professional persons united worldwide who provide humanitarian service, encourage high ethical standards in all vocations and help build goodwill and peace in the world."

Those 31 words are worth remembering when someone asks, "What is a Rotary club?"

### **ROTARY APPROVES \$500,000 EMERGENCY GRANT FOR SOMALIA**

Rotary has approved a \$500,000 Rapid Response grant to the World Health Organization (WHO) to address a recent polio outbreak in Somalia. The outbreak occurred in the Banadir region of Somalia, where a large number of children had not been vaccinated against polio due to inaccessibility.

As of 14 August, 110 cases of wild poliovirus have been reported in the Horn of Africa—100 cases in Somalia and 10 in Kenya. This is the first outbreak in Somalia since 2007 and in Kenya since 2011.

The Rotary grant will cover operational costs, including human resources, training, and transportation of health workers, aimed at immunizing children under 10 in all accessible areas of Somalia in August.

To date, five vaccination campaigns have been held in Somalia, three in Kenya, two each in Ethiopia and Yemen, and one in Djibouti. Additional campaigns are planned through the end of the year.

Drawing on lessons learned from previous polio outbreaks, the first vaccination campaign was carried out within a week after the first case was confirmed.

"Until polio transmission is interrupted in the endemic countries, outbreaks such as the one in Somalia are to be expected," says <u>Dr. Hamid Jafari</u>, director of Polio Research and Operations at WHO. "So long as the budget for the new <u>Polio Eradication and Endgame Strategic Plan</u> is fully funded, we're well-equipped to pursue endemic and outbreak priorities simultaneously."

Rotary's emergency funding for responses to polio outbreaks in Somalia and other countries has been critical to ensuring that immunization activities proceed without interruption, thereby minimizing the risk of the disease's further international spread.

In addition, the governments of the United Kingdom and Japan recently announced financial commitments of \$15.3 million and \$1.3 million, respectively, to fund similar emergency vaccination campaigns in the Horn of Africa.

The United Nations has warned that without further intervention, polio could quickly develop into an epidemic across East Africa and put countless lives at risk. The UK's assistance will allow WHO to immunize 6.1 million people most at risk from the disease in Somalia, northern Kenya, and other countries in the region. This new funding is in addition to a \$457 million pledge to the <u>Global Polio Eradication Initiative</u> in April.

Japan's emergency grant will pay for more than 5 million doses of oral polio vaccine for supplementary immunization activities in November and December, expected to reach more than 2.8 million children under 10.
