Pres. Bob recognized the passing of Nelson Mandela who just passed away at age 95. Until age 72 he was imprisoned for 27 years by the pro-apartheid government. Pres. Clinton is quoted as asking Nelson Mandela "Didn't you hate those people when they let you go?" He said "Briefly I did. But when I was walking out of my compound for the last time, I said to myself, 'they had you for 27 years. If you hate them when you walk

through that door, then they will still have you." He said "Reconciliation is more powerful than revenge. Forgiveness is a gift to be given." **Pres. Bob** noted "Yes, he was the President of South Africa but he had also been called President of the Republic of Morality. May he rest in peace."

Shelter Box

President Bob announced that at our last meeting when we passed the magic hat to raise funds for Shelter Boxes for the <u>relief of the Philippine Hurricane victims</u>, that we had raised \$4,268. It turns out there was a misunderstanding and a miscount...the actual number was \$2,783. **President Bob** found this out about 5 minutes after making the \$4,268 donation to Shelter Box online via his credit card. He immediately called Shelter Box to rectify the situation, but their headquarters being in Florida (3 hour time difference), they were already closed for the weekend. After an "anxious" weekend of waiting, he was

able to contact them on Monday and get a partial credit. That being said, he stated that \$2,783 is still a respectable amount and will provide "almost" 3 Shelter Boxes, enough to give 30 more hurricane victims emergency shelter.



Larry Ford reminded that the Holiday party is 12/6 from 6:00 to 9:00PM and that **Richard Power** will be assisted by **Bob Cugini** in his wheel chair directing parking traffic in the rain!!!!! Be careful out there.

Pres. Bob announced that the Pacific Coast Air Museum will have a new plane flying in on the historic day, December 7, an EA-6B Prowler. Photo slides were shown. Rick Wilson announced, without benefit of microphone, that the <u>CRAB FEED</u> is scheduled for <u>Sat. 2/8/2014</u> and that a short meeting of the Crab Comm. will be held after today's meeting.



Foundation Month

Sally Ewald announced the results of Foundation month. Our Fall Drive raised \$10,832 for the Foundation (\$13,513 total for the year). For <u>Polio Plus we raised \$5,790</u> (including the **Bob Cary** inspired bump of \$3500) plus a \$17,000 anonymous donation, and \$30,000 from my consulting company (LSA Global). With the matching grant from Gates Foundation that means <u>\$158,370</u> towards ending Polio......Not bad for a modest club in west Sonoma County. "Wu Wu"

Sally Ewald presented **Tim Moore** who is making a \$1,000 Paul Harris contribution to Rotary to honor his daughter Morgan as a Paul Harris fellow. **Tim**'s fourth. Sally also presented Steve **Beck**, 8th Paul Harris; **Larry Ford**, 6th; and **Dave Madsen**, 5th.



The Raffle [AKA Rotarian Powered Slot Machine]

Pres. Bob was successful in conducting a RAFFLE with assistance of 3 guests <u>Jill Lowry</u> and two young interactors <u>Maki</u> and <u>Isabel</u> who acted as human slot machines (without parental consent?) **Mark Stevens** was a \$10 winner.



The Program -- Social Advocates for Youth Director, Matt Martin



Chris Dawson introduced <u>Matt Martin</u> head of Social Advocates for Youth (SAY) who is the first executive of SAY who was born after its founding in Sonoma County in 1971. SAY provides counseling, housing and jobs for youth in Sonoma County, many who come from foster care or are homeless, and some are on probation. SAY operates three primary facilities; the <u>Dr. James E Coffee House Teen</u> <u>Shelter</u> in Santa Rosa named after its benefactor, the <u>Tamayo Village</u> in Santa Rosa which provides apartment style housing for youth, and



<u>Stepping Stone</u> which serves former foster children. SAY helps about 2,000 youth annually and has helped about 35,000 youth and families in Sonoma County since it was founded. The Tamayo house has apartments for about 25 youth who pay rent and put up a Security deposit. The goal is to get the residents to move on to other housing and jobs and has been 80% successful. The housing is secure and there have been very few security or law enforcement problems.

The <u>Dream Center</u> is a pending project that will use the old Warrack hospital in Santa Rosa. Warrack is owned by Sutter Hospital and has been closed since 2008. The goal of the Dream Center is to obtain a transfer from Sutter and then spend approximately \$6,000,000 for improvements. The source of funding will be donations from local contributors. The Dream Center will eventually provide housing with 63 units similar to the Tamayo house, Warrack also has a fully equipped kitchen and cafeteria where the residents can cook their own meals. The current operations at SAY's rented Airway office will move to the Dream Center including administrative offices, counseling programs – for ages 5-24 – and employment programs – for ages 12 to 24. There is additional space for potential commercial renters.

The cost of living per individual in Sonoma County is \$29,626 whereas many of SAY's kids are lucky to find full time work at minimum wage earning about ½ of what is needed to afford to live here. There is a growing need for this type of assistance. In 2011 there were 700 youths in Sonoma County who fit the need for this assistance and now there are 1,128 between ages of 12-24. Youth in the SAY programs are encouraged to volunteer in SAY and community youth programs, including help with local sporting activities. Local Rotary clubs have supported SAY and are encouraged to continue.

After questions, President Bob Rogers thanked and honored <u>Matt</u> with a donation in his name to PolioPlus. Rotary took on the task of eradicating polio worldwide in 1985, when 350,000 children per year contracted the virus. Today, we are down to 341 cases so far this year.





Next week's program will be presented by Ryan Power, **Richard Power's** son, and the topic will be "Small Scale Farming."

The meeting was adjourned at 1:30 pm with the ringing of the Rotary bell.

Regarding Sebastopol Rotary Education Foundation (SREF) here are the facts. The club funded over \$67,000 of educational programs last year WITHOUT SREF funds. SREF did fund separate from the club, \$31,000 for Maker Project, Teacher of the Year awards, and Scholarship program for Analy Maker students last year. This year SREF is granting the club almost \$32,000 to use to expand the club's educational programs expenditures, and they plan to do so for the next 4 years.

#14: International Responsibilities

of a Rotarian

As an international organization, Rotary offers each member unique opportunities and responsibilities. Although each Rotarian has first responsibility to uphold the obligations of citizenship of his or her own country, membership in Rotary enables Rotarians to take a somewhat different view of international affairs. In the early 1950s a Rotary philosophy was adopted to describe how a Rotarian may think on a global basis. Here is what it said:

"A world-minded Rotarian:

- looks beyond national patriotism and considers himself as sharing responsibility for the advancement of international understanding, goodwill and peace;
- resists any tendency to act in terms of national or racial superiority;
- seeks and develops common grounds for agreement with peoples of other lands;
- defends the rule of law and order to preserve the liberty of the individual so that he may enjoy freedom of thought, speech and assembly, and freedom from persecution, aggression, want and fear;
- supports action directed toward improving standards of living for all peoples, realizing that poverty anywhere endangers prosperity everywhere;
- upholds the principles of justice for mankind;
- > strives always to promote peace between nations and prepares to make personal sacrifices for that ideal;
- urges and practices a spirit of understanding of every other man's beliefs as a step towards international goodwill, recognizing that there are certain basic moral and spiritual standards which will ensure a richer, fuller life."

That is quite an assignment for any Rotarian to practice in thoughts and actions!
