


This meeting, held on Thursday in lieu of the regular Friday meeting, allowed as many club members as possible to participate in setting the club vision for the next five years.

The brainstorming session of 2009 yielded many goals and ideas. Various projects were proposed, many of which came to fruition, and others fell by the wayside. The Club also embarked on many projects not anticipated in 2009 but with wonderful results. The goal of tonight's program was to brainstorm again, looking into the future and developing a five year plan.



Maureen Merrill and her team commenced with the program. Using breakout groups and reporting back to scribes, the assembled club went through various exercises. To warm up the brains for brainstorming, the various tables submitted various adjectives to describe the club.

The breakout groups were then asked think about the club on January 1, 2019 and describe a vision for the future. Breakout groups were reconfigured and groups were assigned the concept of Rotary without limits - what goals would you set if there were no limits.

Table groups were assigned to think about what criteria should be used when selecting projects - since reality dictates that there are limits to everything. After the various criteria were voted on by the group, tables were assigned to describe real projects for the Rotary Club of Sebastopol for the next five years. These projects were also voted on by the group.

Maureen and her team worked tirelessly to capture all of the rapid fire ideas coming from the forty-five to fifty assembled club members. Even as the hour got late, the ideas kept on flowing and the enthusiasm did not ebb. Finally the promised end time of 9 pm drew near and the walls were nearly covered with flip charts full of ideas.

Yvette Williams van Aggelen, Jack Dunlap and Mia Del Prete volunteered to compile and collate the ideas for the club and assist the vision and planning team. The raw data will be assembled and distributed for the entire club.

#19: More Rotary Firsts

- Rotary established the "Endowment Fund" in 1917, which became the forerunner of the Rotary Foundation.
- Rotary first adopted the name "Rotary International" in 1922 when the name was changed from the International Association of Rotary Clubs.
- Rotary first established the Paul Harris Fellows recognition in 1957 for contributions of US\$1,000 to The Rotary Foundation.
- The Rotary emblem was printed on a commemorative stamp for the first time in 1931 at the time of the Vienna Convention.
- The first Rotary club banner (from the Houston Space Center) to orbit the moon was carried by astronaut Frank Borman, a member of that club.
- The first Rotary International Convention held outside the United States was in Edinburgh, Scotland, in 1921.
- The first head of state to address a Rotary convention was U.S. President Warren G. Harding in 1923 at St. Louis.
