President Elect Ron Puccinelli was called upon to give the thought for the day. He presented an American Proverb:



- and there are plenty of angels in Rotary."




The lone visiting Rotarian was our guest speaker <u>Brian Bauer</u> from Sebastopol Sunrise.

<u>Brian Bauer</u>, Sebastopol Sunrise Rotarian, <u>Stanford grad</u>, and successful businessman (Tri Access Technologies) was introduced by **Richard Power**. Brian recently rode in the <u>Race Across America bicycle race</u> and presented the program.

There are <u>many types</u> of bicycle racing. <u>Fun runs</u>; sanctioned or unsanctioned local oneday races called criterion; more well-known <u>stage races</u> like the Tour De France or Tour de California. But there is <u>only one marathon, clock never stops, 3,000-mile-race-across-</u> <u>America known as RAAM</u>. Brian and three other cyclists, plus a team of attendants and assistants, competed in this most grueling of all races.



Brian and team resolved to <u>leave Oceanside with a destination of Annapolis</u> riding in a relay fashion. As a team, their goal was to ride as fast as possible for short bursts. Normal runs were (up to) 12 hour sequences but, for steep grades, they often rode for <u>twenty minutes – all out</u> – and then traded off with a partner. The RAAM allows a maximum of nine days to finish. Their team averaged 22 mph clocking in over 300 miles a day.



The course (the USA), needless to say, is not flat. The combined altitude gained in the various climbs is the equivalent of five Mt. Everests. Brian's team was running with the leaders of the pack when disaster struck in the Rocky Mountains.



A teammate was hit by a wind squall while riding full speed and hit the pavement hard. He was shaken up, covered with <u>road rash</u> and suffered a conk on the head. Fortunately, <u>Brian's team included a neurosurgeon</u> (never leave home without one) who adjudged the crashed-and-rashed teammate fit to continue.

The race held many challenges, not least of which was logistics. The team had to determine how far ahead to take the days non-riders, get food, and find shelter. The riders had to rest, eat, and recover when not sprinting. They also had to keep riding all night.

Brian's team finished a solid fifth out of twenty teams even with a 12 hour deficit due to the accident. They finished the course in six days and 21 hours. Although the race was a few years ago, it appears that Brian may be considering giving it another go, this time in the masters division of over fifty years old.



President Bob thanked our speaker, <u>Brian Bauer</u>, for relating his interesting adventure and presented him with a donation in his name to Polio Plus. He then rang the bell, ending the meeting at 1:30 p.m. [Traditional time for club members to get back to work. **–Ed.**]

THE ABC's of Rotary

#17: Women In Rotary

Until 1989, the Constitution and Bylaws of Rotary International stated that Rotary club membership was for males only. In 1978, the Rotary Club of Duarte, California, invited three women to become members. The RI board withdrew the charter of that club for violation of the RI Constitution. The club brought suit against RI, claiming a violation of a state civil rights law that prevents discrimination of any form in business establishments or public accomodations. The appeals court and the California Supreme Court supported the Duarte position that Rotary could not remove the club;s charter merely for inducting women into the club. The United States Supreme Court upheld the California court, indicating that Rotary clubs do have a "business purpose" and are in some ways public-type organizations. This action in 1987 allowed women to become Rotarians in any jurisdiction having similar "public accommodation" statutes.

The RI constitutional change was made at the 1989 Council on Legislation, with a vote to eliminate the "male only" provisions for all of Rotary. Since that time, women have become members and leaders of clubs and districts throughout the world.
