


Announcements

Birthdays



The Program - Dennis Crandall - Hanna Boys Center





Mike Carey introduced our speaker, Dennis Crandall, now Principal of the Hanna Boys Center. Dennis was an Analy grad, captain of the football, basketball, and baseball teams. He went to UC Davis in Atmospheric Science, made it into the UC Davis Baseball Hall of Fame, and was the all-time, all-UC Davis player at the catcher position.



Dennis went on to teach, coach, and <u>Principal Cardinal Newman for 30 years</u>.

Dennis Crandall told us that the mission of the Hanna Boys Center was to change the lives of troubled boys to become motivated members of society. They have 108 boys, ages 13-18. They have 110 employees and counselors, and their classroom size is 7-8 students. Their funds come 80% from endowments, some fundraising, and private donations. Started in 1945 by Archbishop Hanna, 94% of the students get high school diplomas. Many graduates go on to higher education. The Hanna Boys School helps troubled boys become successful. What could be more worthwhile to society than that?

President Bob Rogers thanked our speaker, Dennis Crandall, for an interesting talk about Hanna Boys Center and then presented him with a donation in hhis name to Polio Plus. With that, he rang the bell, adjourning the meeting.


THE ABC's of Rotary

#41: TPresidents-elect Training Seminar (PETS)

The Bylaws of Rotary International require that the governor-elect of each district, in cooperation with the current governor, schedule and conduct a training seminar for the incoming club presidents of the district, preferably in March. This two- or three-day Presidents-elect Training Seminar, commonly referred to by its acronym, PETS, is a motivational and leadership training session designed to prepare the future club presidents for the office they will assume on 1 July. Among the subjects covered are the presentation of the RI theme for the coming year as well as information about effective service projects and The Rotary Foundation. Time is also devoted to reviewing the role and responsibilities of a club president. Incoming club presidents also learn about goal-setting, selection and preparation of club officers, club administration, membership recruitment and orientation, and RI and district resources. In some areas of the world, two or more neighboring districts conduct Multidistrict PETS. Multidistrict PETS groups have found that their larger numbers help them attract popular Rotary speakers, provide incoming presidents with a perspective beyond the district, and generate more diverse strategies for effective club leadership.
