



The Program – Dr. Frank Chong – SRJC Update



Keller McDonald stepped forward to introduce our speaker for the day <u>Dr. Frank Chong</u> Superintendent/President of Santa Rosa Junior College. Prior to that position Dr. Chong served as Deputy Assistant Secretary for Community Colleges at the United Department of Education in Washington DC. Dr. Chong has served as President or on boards of other educational entities within California as well as assistant to Willie Brown, speaker of the California Assembly. Dr. Chong has many awards and accolades, to many to list here.

He was here to talk about Santa Rosa Junior College (SRJC) and here is what he had to say. SRJC will have its 100th Anniversary in 2018. SRJC is the 10th oldest JC in the country and second oldest in the state, (second- only to the Modesto JC.) SRJC is #1 in the country in endowments for JCs, having over \$47 million. Dr. Chong recognized Sebastopol Rotary Club member, **Paul Yeomans**, as incoming President of the SRJC foundation.



Dr. Chong emphasized that SRJC gives high school graduates an alternative to attending UC schools or Cal State Schools for the first two years of their higher education -- at a very reasonable cost. Eight out of ten graduates from SRJC who apply to the UC system are accepted. They can also get a two year academic degree or a technical degree as medical technician, dental technician, law enforcement, or other first responder.

UC schools accept 10% of applicants, State schools accept 20% of applicants, and the SRJC accepts 100%. The cost per course unit is \$47, a fraction of the cost to send a child to a UC School or State School. In addition the Exchange Bank Doyle Scholarships have been partially restored, providing added financial assistance to students. This gives parents and students a great opportunity -- in these tough economic times -- for a chance acquire an excellent education that they can afford.

While SRJC has a beautiful campus, many of the buildings are 60-70 years old and need to be upgraded and it is a continuing challenge to keep pace with necessary technology upgrades. It is also necessary to make sure that the teaching is relevant to jobs in the market as many folks are coming back to SRJC to start new careers.

Scholarship Committee Gets a New Mandate

With approval from the Sebastopol Rotary Club Board and the Board of the Sebastopol Rotary Education Foundation our new focus will be on providing \$4,000 scholarships to Santa Rosa Junior College (SRJC) exclusively for west Sonoma County residents or graduates. These scholarships will be in one of three areas; (1) new students in the health specialties such as pharmacy tech, nursing, dental hygiene, or radiology,(2) new students in the STEM areas (science, technology, engineering, and mathematics), and (3) continuing students in the transfer track, planning to attend a 4 year college after SRJC graduation.

The deadline for application is April 11 with normal SRJC admission and scholarship procedures being followed, including notification by the student of their interest in the Sebastopol Rotary Club Scholarships. Contact Scholarship Committee Chair Henry Alker for further details.

The ROTARY CLUB OF SEBASTOPOL is now accepting applications for THE SEBASTOPOL ROTARY TEACHER MINI-GRANT PROGRAM.

Teachers from public and tax-exempt private schools within the boundaries of the West Sonoma County Union High School District are eligible to receive one-time grants in the amount of \$50 to \$400 to purchase classroom materials or to implement programs that might otherwise go unfunded.

To be considered in the next funding cycle applications must be postmarked by April 14, 2014.

Since its inception in the Fall of 2002, the Rotary Club of Sebastopol has distributed over \$189,000 in Mini-Grants to local teachers.

THE ABC's of Rotary

(Taken from "The ABCs of Rotary", a Rotary International publication originally prepared by Dr. Cliff Dochterman who was RI President in 1992-93)

#26: Tolerance of Differences

Occasionally, there is a temptation to criticize the laws, customs, and traditions of another country that may seem strange or contrary to our own. In some instances, illegal practices or customs of one nation are completely lawful and acceptable in another.

As members of an international organization dedicated to world understanding and peace, it behooves Rotarians to exercise restraint in judging our Rotary friends and citizens from other countries when their behavior seems unusual to us. A Rotary policy has existed for more than half a century relating to this dilemma of international relationships.

The statement, adopted in 1933, says that because it is recognized that some activities and local customs may be legal and customary in some countries and not in others, Rotarians should be guided by this admonition of tolerance:

"Rotarians in all countries should recognize these facts and there should be a thoughtful avoidance of criticism of the laws and customs of one country by the Rotarians of another country." The policy also cautions against "any effort on the part of Rotarians of one country to interfere with the laws or customs of another country."

As we strive to strengthen the bonds of understanding, goodwill and friendship, these policies still provide good advice and guidance.
