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

After the official opening of the District Conference by a ring of the bell by DG Helaine Campbell, and presentation of the flag, she briefly introduced RI President's Rep PDG Claudia Mertl from Atlanta GA. Claudia gave us a quick lesson in pronunciation of such Georgia favorites as "Hi All, Y'all" and the plural form, "Y'alls" and then, of course, welcomed us all.



Update on Polio





Our President Bob Rogers was then called to the podium to introduce District End Polio Chair Larry Myers... as follows:

Six years ago, I was attending my first District Assembly at Mendocino College in Ukiah and I was walking down the pathway between classes, when someone from behind me says, "How long ago did you have polio?"

Stunned, I turned around to see this kindly faced gentlemen and I responded, "How did you know I had polio?" He said, "I could see it in the way you're walking, with that certain limp." Heck, I didn't even realize I had a limp.



But that's how I met Larry Myers, fellow polio survivor. We immediately formed a bond, born of our common experience. Since then, I've been honored to serve under Larry on the District PolioPlus Committee, or as he calls it, the "End Polio Committee", which he has chaired since 2002.

Back then, PDG Terri Clark must have been clairvoyant, because when she asked Larry to head up that committee for a major fundraising push, she had no idea that he had had polio as a child. And indeed, her choice was a good one...because Larry raised over \$405,000 that year for Polio Eradication.


It is no wonder then, that he was named District 5130 Rotarian of the year that year, 2002-2003.

Larry has been a charter member of South Ukiah Rotary since its founding in 1973 and served as our District Governor in 1984-85.

For his work in ending polio, he also received the "Regional Service Award for a Polio Free World" from the Rotary Foundation in 2008-2009.

Not one to rest on his laurels, Larry just recently received the "Citation for Meritorious Service" from the Rotary Foundation.

It is with great pleasure that I introduce to you, the District 5130 End Polio Chair, Past District Governor Larry Myers.



Larry gave us an update on the fight against polio.

The biggest problem is in North Pakistan, where the border is like a sieve, and even though it has been declared that any and all leaving the country should be inoculated, many are not. Cases year to date total 61 compared to last year's eight cases.

the good news is Nigeria. There have been only 2 cases to date this year (Scribe Note: a 3rd case was just reported today, occurring on April 19th.) and there is hope that we may be able to declare Nigeria polio free by the end of the year and start the clock on the 3 year confirmation period. Last year's count was 22 cases, so great progress has been made.

At the end of his talk, Larry Myers gave a little preview to something that will be announced at Foundation Dinner South sometime in November. That announcement was that our club's PolioPlus giving, currently at \$57,223 (versus our goal of \$10K) makes us #1 in the district with us contributing 40.6% of the total district's 140,727 giving for polio to date. Larry thanked **Sally Ewald** for an especially generous contribution.

Larry was given a standing ovation for his work against polio and he was later, along with our own John Blount, entered into the "District 5130 Rotarian Hall of Fame" by DG Helaine.

Laguna de Santa Rosa Presentation – David Bannister






District Green Chair Richard Power then introduced the main speaker. David Bannister is the Executive Director of the Laguna de Santa Rosa Foundation and he gave us a great basic education on where the Laguna boundaries are, what it does for us, and how they are working to preserve this valuable resource.

He first explained that the RAMSAR Convention on Wetlands (so called because it was signed in Ramsar, Iran in 1971) is an intergovernmental treaty that provides the framework for national action and international cooperation for the conservation and wise use of wetlands and their resources. There are presently 162 Contracting Parties to the Convention, with 2,040 wetland sites, covering 193

million hectares (477 million acres or 745,177 square miles), designated for inclusion in the Ramsar List of Wetlands of International Importance.

At the RAMSAR Convention, the Laguna was ranked as 5th in importance to California, and 29th in importance to the United States. The Laguna provides a "Hundred Year Flood Plain",



Other interesting details he shared:

Over 200 bird species rely on the Laguna de Santa Rosa, both as home and as a waypoint for those migrating over our area.

Many mammals make their home in the Laguna as well, including mink and river otters.

Reptiles are in abundance as well - including king and gopher snakes. (Gopher snakes can be mistaken for rattlesnakes, both because of their appearance and their actions.)

Amphibians - ("Ribbit")

Many endangered plants, and several Vernal Pools


The Laguna has also benefitted people for over 10,000 years, by:

Flood Control

Building supplies for early Native Americans (tulles for housing and boats)

Leisure –Victorian ladies enjoyed time in rowboats on the Laguna, as do many "kayakers" today.







The Laguna attempts to correct such man made things as:

Altered drainage system – channeling flows, etc.

Forests cut down

Habitat lost

Water quality compromised

Garbage dumped (mercury has been found in samples as well)

Three main Invasive species – Ludwigia, Pepperwood, and the Himalayan Blackberry

The Laguna Foundation works through conservation, restoration, and education (especially elementary school children). From their Offices in the restored Stone Farm, The <u>Laguna Foundation</u> oversees and protects this valuable resource for all of us. As a relatively small non-profit, they are in constant need of both volunteers and financial resources. David invited everyone to come out to experience the Laguna for themselves.

A resounding round of applause was given up for David at the conclusion of his presentation.



Panel Discussion - Richard Power





Continuing with the conservation theme, after the lunch session was over, Richard Power led a <u>panel discussion on the District's "River Projects"</u>, which ranged from our project at the Laguna to Rio Ameca in Mexico,

which flows to the sea at Puerto Vallarta. This was the project of the Rotary Club of South Ukiah, and they recruited many of the local Rotary clubs in Mexico to make it a major restoration project. All because of the idea of individual Rotarians...first DG Helaine...then Rico Salvador of South Ukiah who picked up the ball from



there. And also, many other clubs who performed "major surgery" to waterways in their area. Congratulations Helaine...little did you know how much of an impact your "Water Project" idea would have. That's what it's all about ©

























How to get your personal donation information online

THE ABC's of Rotary

#36: Membership in Rotary International

If you asked a Rotarian if he or she belonged to Rotary International, the individual probably would look puzzled and answer, "Of course I'm a member of Rotary International." But in this instance, the confident Rotarian would be technically wrong. No Rotarian can be a member of Rotary International!

The explanation of this apparent contradiction is simple. The constitutional documents of RI state that membership in Rotary International is limited to Rotary clubs. More than 31,000 Rotary clubs belong to the organization we call Rotary International.

A Rotary club is composed of persons with the appropriate qualifications of good character and reputation and a business or professional classification and who serve in an executive or managerial capacity. The Rotarian belongs to a club — the club belongs to Rotary International. This technical distinction is not obvious or even known to most Rotarians and seldom does it create any problems or complications. It does explain, however, why the Rotary International Board of Directors places expectations upon and extends privileges to Rotary clubs, rather than to individual Rotarians.

If someone asks if you belong to Rotary International, your most accurate answer would be, "No, I belong to a Rotary club?" But it is doubtful anyone would understand the difference, or, in fact, would really care.

Activities roundup

Districts <u>5360</u> (parts of Alberta and Saskatchewan, Canada) and <u>5370</u> (parts of Alberta, British Columbia, Northwest Territories, and Saskatchewan) raised CA\$350,000 as part of a joint campaign with the Alberta government, which matched that amount for a total of \$700,000.
