Birthdays:


Greg Gill on Jan. 21. He also managed to squeeze in a trip to Vail for some skiing. Total recognition came to \$40.



The Program - Mary Radu - Live Smart After 50!





Barbara Beedon introduced our speaker, life coach <u>Mary Radu</u>. Mary's overall theme was how we can gain better control of our lives and <u>live smart after age 50</u>. (Although, thinking theologically, can any of us ever really say that we are in control of our lives?) She acknowledged that <u>Sonoma County is aging</u> and that each of us is a part of that aging process. So it makes sense to plan for uncertain times and to imagine the future we want for ourselves. She introduced us to some exercises and questions designed to help us focus on that future and think beyond our day-to-day routine. Some of those questions:

What is the elephant in the room? What is worrying you, keeping you from moving forward?

What choices to you need to make now to position you to have the future you want and reduce your anxiety about the future?

Just what would you like your life to look like ten years from now?

What values are guiding you as you move into the future and how can your life express those values?

Just how much money will you need ten years from now?

<u>The time for life planning is now</u> and she emphasized that a number of resources are available. We do not have to make this journey alone. No more whining! We can be far more than simply victims of circumstance if we start seizing control of our lives now. Give me an Amen!



Highlight your name (top left) and click profile on drop down menu

Click "Donor History Report" - find in mid page right

Under "Individual" select "Donor History Report"

On the bottom of this page:

The first page is "Overview" of all your history of giving to the Foundation. - bottom of the page

Select "Transaction Detail" at bottom of page to see detail of total history of your transactions

Voila! Your complete history of transactions with RI is before you. You can now answer all questions on who you gave a PH when and give your tax accountant details of dates and amounts contributed to RI Foundation

THE ABC's of Rotary

#35: Types of Membership

There are two types of Rotary club membership — active and honorary. An active member is one who has been elected to membership in the club under a classification of business or profession and enjoys all the obligations, responsibilities, and privileges of membership as provided in the RI constitution and bylaws. Active members may hold office in their clubs and serve RI at the district and international levels. They are expected to meet attendance requirements, pay dues, and bring new members into Rotary.

Honorary Rotary membership may be offered to people who have distinguished themselves by meritorious service in the furtherance of Rotary ideals. An honorary member is elected for one year only, and continuing membership must be renewed annually. Honorary members cannot propose new members to the club or hold office and are exempt from attendance requirements and club dues. Many distinguished heads of state, explorers, authors, musicians, astronauts, and other public personalities have been honorary members of Rotary clubs, including King Gustaf of Sweden, King George VI of England, King Badouin of Belgium, King Hassan III of Morocco, Sir Winston Churchill, humanitarian Albert Schweitzer, Charles Lindbergh, composer Jean Sibelius, explorer Sir Edmund Hillary, Thor Heyerdahl, Thomas Edison, Walt Disney, Bob Hope, Dr. Albert Sabin, British Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher, and many of the presidents of the United States
