Bob Reeves introduced his guest, granddaughter <u>Katlin</u> who is a sophomore at New Technology High School in Napa.





Barbara Beedon introduced <u>Linda</u>, who gave a history of the facility, sharing that the former vets' building was closed by the county as a result of the 2007-08 financial recession. The county offered a 30-year lease that still required some serious local fundraising (approximately \$500,000) to make the center dream a reality.

The center includes studios for ceramics, music, yoga, dance, painting, as well as the main gallery. SAC also offers four weeks of children's camps, featuring art, music, dance and writing.

Future facility improvements include permanent fixtures in the <u>Little Red Hen</u> dining room (which at one time was Sebastopol Rotary's meeting place for many years) and



The Sebastopol Arts Center also oversees the county-wide "Art at the Source", which includes 160 different studios available for visits each October.

<u>Linda</u> introduced <u>Jason Purdue</u>, who is the Film Program Director for the SAC. The SAC, along with the Rialto Theater and the Main Street West Theater, hosts the "Sebastopol Documentary Film Festival" each spring. This event has received national recognition and continues to grow in participation and popularity. Over 5,500 people attended the event this past spring.



To meet the strong interest and demand, the Sebastopol Art Center added "The Best of the Fest", selecting and showing the most popular films/videos from the spring event. This year audiences will be able to see these works at the SAC on August 29, when they will be showing *Finding Hollywood* and *I am Sarah Maple* at 7:00 p.m. On September 12 they will be showing *Levitated Mass* and *Vultures of Tibet*, also at 7:00 p.m.

SAC will also be holding the first LGBT film festival on October 24-25.

<u>THE ABC's of Rotary</u> (Taken from "The ABCs of Rotary", a Rotary International publication originally prepared by <u>Dr. Cliff Dochterman who was RI President in 1992-93</u>) #47: Functional Literacy Program

It has been estimated that a billion people — one-sixth of the world's population are unable to read. Illiteracy among adults and children is a global concern in highly industrialized nations and in developing countries.

The tragedy of illiteracy is that those who cannot read are denied personal independence and become victims of unscrupulous manipulation, poverty, and the loss of human dignity. Illiteracy is demeaning. It is a major obstacle for economic, political, social, and personal development and a barrier to international understanding, cooperation, and peace in the world.

Many Rotary clubs are thoughtfully surveying the needs of their community for literacy training. Some clubs provide basic books for teaching reading. Others establish and support reading and language clinics, provide volunteer tutorial assistance, and purchase reading materials. Rotarians can play a vitally important part in their community and in developing countries by promoting projects to open opportunities that come from the ability to read. For example, Australian Rotarians developed Lighthouses for Literacy projects in four schools in Thailand. This innovative teaching method proved so successful that the Thai government adopted it for all the nation's schools. Other Rotary clubs have used this model to develop literacy projects in Bangladesh, South Africa, Brazil, and other countries
