





Kathie Mayhew announced last Uganda trip this summer. interested in making the trip information about the trip, for late July, or early August.



President Ron proceeded to host the raffle. Our guest speaker Xerxes pulled <u>Randy Seelye's</u> winning ticket, who, although he did not win any money, did win a bag full of chocolate bars.





Barbara Beedon introduced our guest speaker, <u>Xerxes Whitney</u>, who was Teacher of the Year at Windsor Middle School, where he teaches 6th Grade P.E. He also coaches tennis at Windsor High School. This would not necessarily be noteworthy, but Xerxes does this while having Cerebral Palsy.

Xerxes immediately took the mike, took the floor, and took the club. This **Scribe** tried to get every word he said, because they were all wonderful, but it was simply impossible. He talked about having to introduce himself as a kid, and having to answer all manner of questions about his name, which is the name of a Persian king. "Are you Persian?" no just named after a king. He has to persuade people, especially kids, to take a chance on him, and get past the Cerebral Palsy.



He said he is lucky, because he only has a mild case of Cerebral Palsy, and he is able to walk, run, and talk. His goal has always been to get people to get over first impressions and get to know him. He is very competitive, as evidenced by the fact that he was three before he walked and only began after his younger sister started walking. He immediately liked sports because unlike other activities, you either do them or not. They were his saving grace growing up.

He played little league, and he played tennis in high school. He went to UC Santa Cruz, and intended to be a college coach. Although others put limitations on him, he placed none on himself.

He said his biggest challenge was to get others to see him, despite their fear. He finally accepted his condition would not go away, and his name became a strength. He celebrates his disability, and it is no longer a cloud over his head. He became a PE teacher in 2000 when he convinced someone he could do the job. In fact, in any situation where he is challenged, he feels that "He can figure it out" and get it done.



One of his mottos is "Relationships are the key to everything." You need others to accomplish anything. Xerxes also says we need to "play more." When we play, we are like children, and are our truest selves. We are in the moment. For some reason we forget to play as adults. He stresses being positive when talking to kids. Never say, "Don't do it", just say "I can."

We have to overcome the human brain's being wired for survival, which means it discourages us from doing something new and challenging. In fact it takes 5 positives to overrule one negative thought or action. Xerxes encourages kids to high-five their neighbor, and then go to class to do it with schoolmates because high-fives build positive energy.

He loves himself, his students, and his peers. If you can't love yourself first, you can't love others. "Appreciate, and acknowledge others", Xerxes says, and you will add value to yourself, and you will really feel good. Speaking of feeling good, you should exercise; sleep well; be mindful; and eat well. He himself has completed several full marathons, and now runs half marathons. He enjoys catching up to those who have started out ahead in the race, then reel-them-in. [That's competitive, thinking like that in a Marathon! **–Scribe**]

He wants to know he did his best to touch and inspire others. And to teach others to turn their weaknesses into strengths. To that end he would like to speak to more groups.

Questions from the audience:

Harvey Henningsen stated without uncertainty that Xerxes is the most excellent speaker he has ever heard. **Robin Maybury** suggested he check Excite, and other speaker opportunities. Xerxes reminded us that **Barbara Beedon** did see his Ted talk and that's what got him here. **Harvey** followed up by asking Xerxes when he turned his negative into a positive. Xerxes replied "When I faced discrimination in my 20's I turned to the truth." As Keats said, 'Truth is Beauty, and Beauty is Truth...'".

Xerxes said that his parents did not treat him any differently than normal children. He told the story of the bus ride he took to and from school as a kid. The bus driver would help him on and off the bus, but he had to climb up and down the hill to his house by himself. "He had to figure it out!" And it taught him a lot.

John Blount stood and pointed out that Xerxes in fact had made us overlook his disability, by speaking and allowing us to get to know him. Just as Xerxes had hoped. Xerxes went on to say "If we ask and take the time to find out, we discover we all want the same thing. To be liked and to be heard."

I am afraid this **Scribe** could not do justice to the speaker, you had to be there to fully understand and appreciate he impact he has as a speaker.



After his conclusion, **President Ron** thanked <u>Xerxes</u> and honored him with a donation in is name to Pathway Home, a non-profit that helps returning vets from the Middle East conflicts reintegrate into civilian life.

Our next meeting, Friday December 19, will feature the "Uke-Stars". The meeting after this Friday will occur in 2015, January 9, to be exact.

Sebastopol Rotary Community Grant Applications Open December 10

Once again the Rotary Club of Sebastopol has opened up the application process for their Community Grants Program. "Since 1925, Sebastopol Rotary Club has given more than \$1.38 million to hundreds of local organizations, putting Rotary's "Service Above Self" motto into action," says Rotarian David Schreibman. "Last year alone we awarded approximately \$42,000 to 27 deserving

organizations." This program is made possible through fundraising efforts at this year's Great Gatsby Gala with 100% of the monies going directly to those who need it.

The current application period starts December 10, 2014 and runs through February 10, 2015. Applications are available on the Sebastopol Rotary web site http://www.sebastopolrotary.org/. On the main page, click on "Grants" from the top banner and choose "Community Grants" to get your application and further instructions. Award announcements will be made before April 2015.

While grant requests for any purpose will be considered, preference is generally given to grant requests that meet the following criteria: Sebastopol/West Sonoma County focus, long-term impact, community impact/number of people affected, and the lack of alternative funding sources.

THE ABC's of Rotary

#64: Campaigning Prohibited

One of the interesting bylaws of Rotary International provides that "No Rotarian shall campaign, canvass, or electioneer for elective position in Rotary International." This provision includes the office of district governor, Rotary International director, RI president, and various elected committees. The Rotary policy prohibits the circulation of brochures, literature, or letters by a candidate or by anyone on behalf of such a candidate.

After a Rotarian has indicated an intention to be a candidate for one of the elective Rotary offices, he or she must refrain from speaking engagements, appearances, or publicity that could reasonably be construed as furthering his or her candidacy. The only information that may be sent to clubs relating to candidates for an elective position is that which is officially distributed by the general secretary of RI.

A Rotarian who becomes a candidate for an elective position, such as district governor or RI director, must avoid any action that would be interpreted as giving him or her an unfair advantage over other candidates. Failure to comply with these provisions prohibiting campaigning could result in the disqualification of the candidate. In Rotary, it is believed that a Rotarian's record of service and qualifications for office stand on their own and do not require publicity or special promotion.
