

The Program - Dave Mitchell - Small Town News & Big Rewards





So the Academy orchestra music is softly playing in the background reminding **Pres. Ron** that he's now into the speakers time......**Pres. Pooch** calls **Rollie Atkinson** up to introduce our speaker for the day.

Rollie, the stood-up-birthday-boy introduced us to <u>David Mitchell</u>. While I did not get the details of Rollie's introduction, his respect for David & his accomplishments were quite evident. Rollie said to the effect, what David has accomplished in his career is what Journalists dream about. (Personally, I'm saying that Rollie, my hometown hero, gets the big "P" while he's still in the vertical state of being. Rollie introduced <u>Dave Mitchell</u>, the former editor of <u>The Point Reyes Light newspaper</u> and 1979 winner of the <u>Pulitzer Prize for Journalism</u>. <u>David has received 108 awards during his 27 year tenure at the Point Reyes Light</u>.

In 2014, he received the International Society of Weekly Newspaper Editors highest honor for career achievement as the

editor of a weekly newspaper the Eugene Cervi Award. He is a Stanford Graduate... twice;.....What's the deal? Did they hold him back the first time? David was editor of the Sebastopol Times from 1973 to 75 during Norm Stupfel's Roto-Presidential term of the Sebastopol Rotary club. It must've also been the time of the infamous Ernie Joiner's ownership of that paper. Ernie was famous for instigating anger with his readers to increase the subscription readership. Ernie was also famous for keeping a bottle of Jack Daniels either in his second or third drawer of his desk. It has been said the more the people got mad at him the more papers he sold. For those of you that knew Ernie, he was very liberal and used to anger the conservatives... Okay I'm just kidding about that. David Mitchell also spent two years at the San Francisco Examiner covering guerrilla actions and turmoils in Guatemala and Central America. David has just finished a book that we did not get to hear about or see, but there were a stack of them at the greeting table. Dave started his program by reading a police log from the 1950's era and it produced many chuckles. David gave us a recap of his history with Synanon, a semireligious drug rehabilitation cult that existed in California in the 1970's. investigation of Synanon, he dealt with police and witnesses from all over the United States. Dave then passed a picture of Charles E "Chuck" Dederich, the founder of Synanon. On October 10, 1978 members of the Synanon cult placed a 4 foot rattlesnake in attorney Paul Morantz' mailbox as a threat and that was the beginning of the cult's downfall. Shortly after this event, the I.R.S. brought suit against Synanon for non-





payment of \$17 million in back taxes. This litigation essentially broke the cult's financial back and in 1991, Synanon was formally dissolved. Dave talked about Dederich and of his past.

During the course of his investigative reporting of this cult David and his wife were sued for \$17,350,000 in by Synanon [Synanon eventually paid \$100,000 to end the libel suit. -Ed.] Your Scribe knew David about 40 years ago and it was great to see him again still creating and practicing his craft. Sadly, Roto-time ran out but there were still many unanswered questions so it was decided those that needed to leave could leave and those that wanted to stay would.



With that, Pres. Puccinelli tapped the sacred bell and members of the congregation slowly drifted away.....hh
