Roto-member, farmer, Gold Ridge Resource Conservation District board member, and schoolboard member **Torrey Olson**, introduced our program speaker <u>Brittany Heck</u>. Brittany is the Executive Director of the Gold Ridge Resource Conservation Dist.

> **Torrey** said that Brittany has worked at the RCD for 9 years and she has been the Executive Director for 3 years. **Torrey** went on to say that Brittany is dedicated, devoted, forthright, and concise at board meetings.

Brittany grew up in SoCal surfing and sailing. She is a graduate of SSU, lives in Marshall, and is engaged to a sheep rancher from Tomales. **Torrey** says that having her as the Executive Director makes him proud to be on the board.

The Resource conservation districts were created by President Roosevelt as a result of the 1930's dust bowl. President Roosevelt called on Governors' of all of the states to conserve water & soil.

The district is funded by taxes and federal, state, local and foundation grants. Gold Ridge Conservation District is 95% funded by grants.

One-half of their funding goes to Salmon habitat restoration.

Water is our most precious resource......In the 1800's Mark Twain said, "Whiskey's for drinken, Water's for fighten."

Brittany said that the District is charged with providing education, monitoring, planning, community outreach, regulation compliance, pollinator habitat, Salmon habitat, soil conservation, water conservation, and climate adaptation.

The RCD annual budget is \$1.8 million, and for the years 2014-15, it is \$2.5 million.

The District works with local contractors, consultants, engineers, RCD staff, manufacturers, equipment suppliers, and nurseries. [There is a un-substantiated rumor going around the Roto-Palace that **Rick Williams**....... (Not to be confused with **Rick Wilson**) is offering a 75% discount on all plants purchased for habitat restoration of our gardens. All you have to do is mention the secret code phrase....... The Gold Ridge RCD goals are community building, education, pride & ownership, perpetual stewardship, safety & security, innovation, and the preservation of culture.

Once again the Rotary Club of Sebastopol has opened up the application process for their Community Grants Program. "Since 1925, Sebastopol Rotary Club has given more than \$1.38 million to hundreds of local organizations, putting Rotary's "Service Above Self" motto into action," says Rotarian David Schreibman. "Last year alone we awarded approximately \$42,000 to 27 deserving organizations." This program is made possible through fundraising efforts at this year's Great Gatsby Gala with 100% of the monies going directly to those who need it. The current application period starts December 10, 2014 and runs through February 10, 2015. Applications are available on the Sebastopol Rotary web site <u>http://www.sebastopolrotary.org/</u>. On the main page, click on "Grants" from the top banner and choose "Community Grants" to get your application and further instructions. Award announcements will be made before April 2015.

While grant requests for any purpose will be considered, preference is generally given to grant requests that meet the following criteria: Sebastopol/West Sonoma County focus, long-term impact, community impact/number of people affected, and the lack of alternative funding sources.

One of the most popular programs of The Rotary Foundation is Group Study Exchange. Since the first exchange between districts in California and Japan in 1965, the program has provided educational experiences for more than 44,500 business and professional men and women who have served on about 9,000 teams.

The GSE program pairs Rotary districts to send and receive study teams. Since 1965, almost US\$79.5 million has been allocated by The Rotary Foundation for Group Study Exchange grants. One of the attractive features of GSE is the opportunity for the visiting team members to meet, talk, and live with Rotarians and their families in a warm spirit of friendship and hospitality. In addition to learning about another country through visits to farms, schools, industrial plants, professional offices, and governmental establishments, the GSE team members serve as ambassadors of goodwill. They interpret their home nation to host Rotarians and others in the communities they visit. In recent years, teams of a single vocation or cultural group have been exchanged. Some GSE teams help create humanitarian projects between their countries. Many of the personal contacts blossom into lasting friendships.


Truly, the Group Study Exchange program has provided Rotarians with a most enjoyable, practical, and meaningful way to promote world understanding.

Restoring school bathrooms in war-torn Kosovo

Ethnic conflict in the 1990s took its toll on schools in rural Kosovo. Government resources have been rebuilding roads and homes in the mountain city of Peja, but little of the money has gone to repair ruined sanitation facilities in schools. Rotary members from Colorado, USA, have teamed up with the Rotary Club of Peja on a global grant project to fix or replace sinks, toilets, septic tanks, and leaky roofs in the schools, while teaching healthful hygiene habits.
