


Karen Daniels led everyone in a well done rendition of *God Bless America*.



Robin Maybury introduced Lorenzo Dueñas, Assistant Sheriff for Sonoma County, to provide an update on Sonoma County Sheriff's Department.

Dueñas, a 27 year veteran of law enforcement, was one of the first Deputy Sheriffs assigned to the Community Oriented Policing Unit in Roseland. After being promoted to Sergeant he supervised several units including the Field Training Unit, Helicopter Search and Rescue Unit and the Multi-Agency Gang Task Force. In 2010 he was promoted to Assistant Sheriff. Before entering into law enforcement he served 6 years active duty in the <u>U.S. Marine Corps</u>. He earned an A.A. degree from SRJC and a Bachelor of Public Administration Degree with a concentration in Law

Enforcement Leadership from the University of San Francisco. Assistant Sherriff Lorenzo Dueñas is currently an active member of the FBI National Academy Association. For fun in his off hours Dueñas loves to sail. He also is familiar with Rotary as he was selected as a GSC from our District to travel to Brazil in 2005.

The Sonoma County Sheriff is an elected position and answers to the Attorney General of California, even though the Sonoma County Supervisors sets budget and funds the Sheriff's Department. The department has 850 employees and 100 volunteers. They are in the hiring mode with eleven open patrol positions and ten open positions at the jail.



More officers are wearing lapel cameras which are having effects on policing; ranging from protecting officers from spurious complaints to increasing officer's awareness of their own conduct. The cameras are relatively new so policies and practices are still being refined and adjusted.

The jail currently has 1,042 persons in adult detention with the seriousness of the offences increasing due to current state policies to reduce the prison population. They are trying to provide more services in the jail for the prisoners (NA, AA, EMP, Starting Point, Parenting classes, Reading classes, etc.). 16% of the population is female.

Dueñas went on to explain about the operations of the Sonoma County Sheriff's Department. They are responsible for staffing and running the jails and staff the county courts and other county buildings. The Marine Unit covers the Coast and the inland waterways. The Helicopter Unit is on the chopping block every year because of cost and budget but this is a very important unit for Sonoma County. This unit serves Sonoma and Marin Counties and saves many lives each year. In the 4 years he served in this unit he personally had over 500 rescues.

There are <u>34 known gangs</u> in Sonoma County, with 3,500+ members or associates. The Sheriff's department works with ICE (immigration services). <u>70% of the crimes in Sonoma County are drug or alcohol related</u>. Medical marijuana use also causes some crimes, theft, forgery, and people acting in a criminal manner while under the influence. Also the lack of mental health services in the county requires the Sheriff's department to fill in the gaps. They have been training Patrol Officers how to understand and work with the mentally ill.

Lorenzo took questions from for the floor:

Question: **Harvey Henningsen** said that he had read that the military was giving cast-off ammunition, weapons and vehicles to the Sheriff's department. How are these items being used by the department? How has the Sheriff's department operations changed over the years?

What about the armored vehicle from Homeland Security?

Answer: Dueñas responded that the department is 45 employees down and now that the budget has increased they are trying to fill those openings. The work ethic for the current generation of officers is different than in the past. Today they want to put in their hours and then go play. Their slogan is "What's Best for Me!" As to the weapons it helps them because the "Bad Guys" have more and better firing power than the department.

The Bearcat (armored vehicle) was funded by a grant – no tax money was used.

Question: Tom Boag asked what was being done to get Patrol Officers out of the cars and back on the street.

<u>Answer:</u> Dueñas answered the Sheriff's department is working in getting more officers out of their cars and onto the streets. Returning to being service orientated and community servants, however is difficult until the department returns to full staffing.

Question: **David Schreibman** said he likes the lapel cameras. He asked if the public have the same access to the tape from the lapel cameras as the department has.

<u>Answer</u>: Dueñas answered it is accessible to the public as long as it is not part of an ongoing investigation. Since they are covered by the public access law to public records, the tapes are part of the public record if not part of a current investigation.

Question: David Schreibman said "You don't have a warrant, but you are looking into someone's home, taking photos."

<u>Answer</u>: Dueñas responded that the officer has the ability to shut the camera off. The officer turns it on as they approach a car or suspect. When they are finished they turn it off, it does not run for their entire shift.

Question: Can you provide some guidance about when 911 should be called versus calling the patrol desk?

<u>Answer: Calling 911 should be reserved for emergencies, assaults, or threats</u>. All other issues should be referred to the Patrol Desk Phone # (707) 565-2121.

Question: What impacts have resulted from the opening of the new Graton Casino?

<u>Answer</u>: Calls are up some but not as much as expected and concern issues in and around the casino. There may be less obvious effects due to losing the money the need to pay rent or buy food but so far there is no hard data.

Question: How is officer training changing as a result of the Andy Lopez shooting?

<u>Answer</u>: The department continues to review incidents to determine whether anything can be done differently. In fact the department is reviewing incidents occurring over the last 10 years to determine how they can be handled differently.

<u>Programa de Becas</u> is a scholarship program run by The Rotary Club of Puerto Vallarta Sur, Mexico that helps good students stay in school beyond age 12. The Puerto Vallarta Sur club works with Social Directors in Puerto Vallarta schools to identify good students who need financial assistance to stay in school. Our club has participated in the *Programa de Becas* since 1996.

The selected students are brought into the program when they are in grades 7, 8, or 9. The Puerto Vallarta Sur club matches up sponsors and students. Sponsors are asked to provide an annual scholarship of \$250 while their student is in grades 7, 8, or 9, increasing to \$300 when their student is in grades 10, 11, or 12 and \$350 when they attend a university or are in career training. Each year, students send their sponsor an updated profile with their picture and a thank you letter. The Puerto Vallarta Sur club is happy to arrange a meeting



picture and a thank you letter. The Puerto Vallarta Sur club is happy to arrange a meeting between sponsors and their students when the sponsors are in Puerto Vallarta.

Several of our club's participating members have had the very gratifying experience of helping their student to graduate from high school or a university. Checks should be payable to: Rotary Club of Sebastopol with "*Programa de Becas*" written in the memo area. Following the August 1 meeting, **Dorothy Rodella** will wire our club's total scholarship contributions for the 2014-2015 school year to the Puerto Vallarta Sur club. *Programa de Becas* students will receive their scholarship at a presentation on August 23rd.

A Sutter Care at Home nurse will be coming to our September meeting to administer flu vaccines for those of you who are interested. She will be administering the Quadrivalent flu vaccine for \$30.00. If you would like to get the <u>preservative free</u> Quadrivalent flu vaccine, the cost is \$35.00. You will need to call or email Denise (see below) to reserve a preservative free flu shot. If you have Medicare Part B (without an HMO), Sutter Care at Home can bill Medicare for you and there will be no charge for the Quadrivalent flu shot. Please bring proof of Medicare Part B to the clinic.

#44: Every Rotarian an Example to Youth

In 1949, the RI Board adopted the slogan Every Rotarian an Example to Youth as an expression of commitment to children and youth in each community in which Rotary clubs exist. Serving young people has long been an important part of the Rotary program.

Youth service projects take many forms around the world. Rotarians sponsor Boy Scout and Girl Scout troops, athletic teams, centers for disabled children, school safety patrols, summer camps, orphanages, recreation areas, safe driving clinics, county fairs, child-care centers, and children's hospitals. Many clubs provide vocational counseling, establish youth employment programs, and promote use of The 4-Way Test. Increasingly, drug/alcohol abuse prevention and AIDS awareness projects are being supported by Rotarians.

In every instance, Rotarians have an opportunity to be role models and mentors for the young people of their community. One learns to serve by observing others. As our youth grow to become adult leaders, it is hoped each will achieve that same desire and spirit to serve future generations.

The slogan accepted over 50 years ago is just as vital today.
